Pediatric Care Coordination Program Update



Greetings!

As we continue a new year, we would like to thank you, our community, for your incredible support of our new pediatric care coordination program. Here at Kittitas County Health Network, we have recently celebrated 3 years of working with Kittitas County residents by supporting access to community-based programs for mental health, substance abuse & recovery, safe housing, and food security. After seeing the growth and success of this initial program, we worked with KVH to expand care coordination to pediatric patients.

We launched our pediatric care coordination program on December 4th, 2023. As of today, there is a caseload of 16 pediatric patients. Currently, five of these patients are what we have considered to be high-risk. High risk within our program means that they are either new patients or patients who are at risk of re-entry to the emergency department, losing housing, or experiencing another form of crisis. We have seen some positive outcomes within the community over the past month that we would like to share.

We are proud of the accomplishments:

- Helping mothers experiencing postpartum depression get access to mental health services
- Providing formula to new mothers
- Helping parents in recovery discover other wellness resources such as yoga
- Helping families apply for SNAP and TANIF
- Connecting children to sports scholarships
- Helping families obtain laundry vouchers so they can wash their clothes
- Helping coordinate specialty care at Children's Village
- Working with the Ministerial Association to provide gas vouchers to families
- Walking alongside families who are trying to reunify with their children in foster care
- Providing clothing to families that are struggling to make ends meet

We know that these are things that are not always the most visible component of children's health, but we want to stress how important your referrals and partnership are. Your compassion and care for the Kittitas community is the driving force behind this great work. On behalf of all KCHN staff, we would like to say thank you and express our gratitude.

Donations Still Needed to Help Keep Our Neighbors Warm this Winter



KCHN is proud to announce that we are the recipients of \$150,000 child care grant from the Yakima Valley Community Foundation.

First, the project aims to address the lack of licensed childcare providers in the Cle Elum/Roslyn community. The second childcare access challenge to be addressed is the 100-spot childcare waitlist at existing childcare centers that accept subsidies. The third challenge to be addressed is the lack of licensed childcare providers in the county. Finally, the fourth challenge to be addressed in this proposal is communicating existing options for all forms of childcare (i.e., before and after school, preschool, infant and toddler, and summer care).

Deliverables

- Develop Network of partners engaged in issues affecting children, youth, and families, including health care industry employers.
- Engage children youth family Work Group in planning expansion in Kittitas County.
- Support new childcare facilities to accelerate the addition of childcare spots in Kittitas County.
- Support childcare facilities with staffing and training expenses to be fully staffed.
- Provide technical assistance and support for the addition or expansion of childcare facilities.
- Conduct outreach to childcare providers and families about the legislative changes in the Working Connections program.
