



#### Rooted in Resilience: **Honouring Italian** Heritage in Canada



#### The man, the myth, the legend

After 33 years in Education, Tony Rosa, a teacher from Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board, is retiring. As former colleagues of the magnanimous and charismatic Tony Rosa, Lisa Radenovic, Maria Falzata, and Lisa O'Donnell had the honor and privilege of trying to encapsulate the vocation of the man, the myth, and the legend in a dynamic speech at his retirement celebration. Here are just some of the highlight reels of the legacies that Tony is leaving the students, the staff, the schools, and the community as he enters his next chapter.

As a Man, Tony is one of those rare people who seems to have more hours in his day than the rest of us. He's always working, always helping, always giving. Tony has always had more than one job—not just in the literal sense, but in the way he's worn so many hats: teacher, counselor, mentor, leader, community builder, and a friend.

Tony is rooted in tradition and proud of where he comes from, carrying those values with him everywhere. At the heart of it all is his love for family.

Over the years, I (Lisa Radenovic) had the honor of working alongside him at St. Michael C.S.S., as he merged both education and his work as a counsellor. He connected the senior design students with local politicians and developers to work on real-world projects—like condos, theatre design, and road reconstruction, just to name a few—giving students meaningful hands-on experiences in their very own community. He is a man of vision. A man of action. A man of his word.

As a Myth, Tony Rosa is Apollo—the God of the Arts, the shining light in the Caledon community, who has illuminated the minds and hearts of all those who have been lucky enough to know him.

Not everyone knows this, but Tony's journey began with a Kindergarten class. Yes, it's true! He planted the seed of artistic creativity and passion for the Arts in those young minds. His work in several high schools, including St. Thomas Aquinas, Notre Dame, St. Roch, and finally St. Michael has left a lasting impression on all who crossed his path. Each student who has ever been part of his classroom or theater production has had the privilege of experiencing a little piece of Tony's incredible spirit.

Over the years, I (Maria Falzata), worked in partnership with

Tony on student success initiatives. I saw firsthand his tireless commitment to ensuring that every student, no matter their challenges, had the opportunity to succeed. As he would always say, "Maria, we need to think outside the box." He thought outside the box because, like Apollo, he was always looking for new ways to inspire, to elevate those around him. His determination and creativity helped countless students find their way and achieve their goals.

As a legend, Tony didn't just teach—he transformed. He led students to arts competitions, directed and produced epic productions like Fame, Annie, The Wizard of Oz and Lend me a Tenor, which he took to the Johnny Carson Theatre at the University of Lincoln Nebraska. This show finished first place in Canada and in the Top 10 productions in North America. This helped to elevate St. Thomas Aquinas to the status of a Regional School of the Arts and led to the creation of a mural dedicated to Tony Rosa in the Arts' wing of the school.

Tony was part of the visionary team that opened not just one, but two brand new schools in Dufferin-Peel; St. Roch C.S.S. and St. Michael C.S.S. His architectural insights and creative vision helped design state-of-the-art facilities.

Tony's impact reaches far beyond the classroom. Having grown up and worked in Bolton , I (Lisa O'Donnell) have witnessed his transformative influence on the Caledon community. From founding The Stage Academy to bring the arts to Caledon, to serving as a Councillor, Tony has made it his mission to unite and uplift. During the pandemic, Tony braved freezing temperatures and the fear of COVID to interview local business owners to highlight their companies during a challenging time for all. Tony Rosa is more than a mentor or a friend to those lives that he has touched—he is a living legend who builds legacies wherever he goes. His impact spans schools, communities, and countless lives.

Now Tony has retired from his 33 year vocation in education as the "Man, the Myth and the Legend". His next phase of retirement is as "Tony, the man with the plan", because he will not rest, instead he will continue to enlighten the world through his political endeavors, his epic theatre productions and by continuing to support his beautiful family in everything that they hope to achieve. But first he will take a trip to Italy to connect with his roots, his family and his heritage. Cheers to "the man with the plan" Mr. Tony Rosa.



# Sam and Max Ciccolini "Two dedicated Brothers of Philanthropy in the Italian Canadian Community"

Sam and Max Ciccolini were born in a small village of Pescosolido, Frosinone in the foothills of the Apennine Region southeast of Rome to Pasquale and Filomena Ciccolini who had six children.

Sam and Max's father, Pasquale Ciccolini, was a soldier in the Italian army in the second World War.

When he finally returned home, he found his village even poorer than before he left to serve.

Since Pasquale had a difficult time finding work, he started his own taxi business. He made his living driving the only taxi in the area, a Ballila a pre-war sedan.

In 1948, their father Pasquale Ciccolini, sold his taxi to his brother. He then made his way

to Canada to search for new opportunities. At that time, he earned 50 cents an hour with part of his pay cheque going to repay the \$250.00 for his move to Canada. The funds were put up by his Canadian sponsor, Giuseppe (Joe) Macciocchi who also provided him with employment.

Every other year, Pasquale would return to Italy to reconnect with his family. In 1951, he took his eldest

son Frank to Toronto. Two years later, he returned to Canada with his second eldest son Mario.

In 1956, the rest of the Ciccolini family, Filomena, Sam, Max and Livio visited Rome three times for travel visas and to pass a physical examination. On November 7, 1956, Filomena Ciccolini and her three boys boarded the S.S. Independence in Naples. The 10-day trip was met with sickness and hardship.

On Saturday November 17, 1956, the ship reached its destination in New York City, where the family finally found relief. After two days of immigration processing, the family boarded a train destined for Toronto's Union station. Upon arrival, they were welcomed by Pasquale and Francesco Biancucci, loyal family friend from Pescosolido. They drove them through the snow-covered streets to their new home.

With the arrival of his family, Pasquale's rented apartment was not big enough to accommodate everyone. Pasquale bought a house on Montrose Avenue and it was ready when the family arrived from Italy on November 19, 1956. The Ciccolini Family along with five others were living in the five-bedroom home. There was a total of twelve individuals living


happily together and contributing to the household expenses.

Sam and Max began their business operations at a very young age. The two Ciccolini brothers worked long hours before and after school. Their days consisted of 4:30 a.m. wake up time



and by 5:00 a.m. they were delivering the Globe and Mail on streets surrounding Little Italy. After school hours, they delivered prescriptions and products for Capp's Drug Store. The brothers would finally reach home at 9:00 p.m. Sam's ambition and entrepreneurial spirit motivated him to find a higher paying job. He was offered a position at Phillips Pharmacy where he went from earning 10 cents an hour to 15 cents an hour, but the job was only offered to Sam. Sam made a counteroffer and stated, "Max and I work as a pair". After a few days the two brothers were hired.

The Ciccolini brothers' motivation and drive lead them to befriend Mr. Crawford a neighbour for whom they cut grass and delivered newspapers. After his passing, Mr. Crawford who was so fond of Sam,

1-4 in section 102. The first 6 months of school were challenging for Sam and Max due to the language barrier. With determination and time, their comprehension improved. After graduating from elementary school, Sam attended Central Commerce Collegiate, where he mastered many life skills that he still uses today. Sam was also highly skilled in penmanship. He was given the opportunity to represent Ontario along with eighteen other finalists in a competition organized by the province. With determination and time, their comprehension improved. Sam Ciccolini secured his first job as a clerk with Maclean Hunter. There he operated a bookkeeping machine with which he was very familiar. He became an expert with the operation and was ready to move up the corporate ladder. When his manager moved back to Ireland, the position was promised to Sam.

His employer led him to believe that he would be promoted, but the position was never offered because he was too young and did not have a family. Sam was so disappointed that he began to look for another job. He eventually found one at the engineering firm of Delew Cather and Company paying him \$37.00 per week. He approached Mr. Bailey of Mclean Hunter, who offered him a matching salary to stay on at Maclean Hunter. Instead of accepting, Sam asked for a pen and paper so that he could write his letter of resignation. When asked why he would do that, Sam's response to Mr. Bailey was, "It was a matter of principle. When you say something, mean it, and do it"

Frank Ciccolini, Sam's oldest brother, found an opportunity to purchase a small agency for \$4,000. He asked Sam to join him in the investment, but

neither had the money. The brothers asked for a loan from their parents. Pasquale, their father, being swayed by Filomena, their mother, agreed to lend them the money. Their office was established at 1224 St. Clair Ave. West on the second floor of a bank known as County Savings and Loan Corporation.

The branch was managed by Con Di Nino.

When Sam needed space for his business, he struck a deal with Con Di Nino for \$25.00 per week for a room the bank was renting. On October 1st, 1966, the Ciccolini and Perzia Insurance Agency Ltd. launched. They kept the Perzia name for continuity and to operate legally under their license. At that time, Sam did not take an income from this business. To make a living, he took on an additional job at Oshawa Wholesale - Ontario Food Terminal on the Queensway. This job helped pay his monthly expenses. In 1972, both partners were finally able to pay themselves \$100.00 per week with a 50/50 bonus at the end of the year.

In 1972, Max joined the family business. He took a pay cut from his teaching position at Danforth Tech. While he was the administrator in the office, Sam and Frank sold insurance. By 1975, their business grew substantially as daily sales increased.

The business expanded by providing insurance policies for house closings. Every month, the Law Firm Gambin and Bratty had 80-85 closings confirmed. To obtain this account, Sam and Max learned how to produce insurance policies to meet the deadlines for the real estate deals.

Rudy Bratty, a partner at the Law Firm, was very impressed with Sam's work ethic, and he referred his services to associated companies such as Marco Muzzo at Marel Contractors. Over the years, Sam has built positive working relationships with all the major players across Ontario. This increased his business dealings tremendously. The Ciccolinis' work expertise and honest business ethics, supported the growth of their insurance agency, not only in the Italian Community, but in Ontario and locations in the US.

In addition to commercial and industrial insurance, the Ciccolinis began offering surety construction bonds. The bond business was a huge learning curve for both Sam and Max. Gary Corby, a specialist at the bond department of Aetna Casualty, assisted Sam with this expansion.

With Gary's teachings, Sam quickly learned the Bond business. In 1981, Sam was so impressed with Gary's knowledge that the Ciccolini brothers asked Gary to join the firm. Masters Insurance was created with Gary managing the Bond Department, Frank controlling Life Benefits and Wealth Management, Max leading accounting and administration, and Sam as the Head of Commercial and Personal Insurance. Today the Bond Department makes up 25% of the business, Commercial Insurance 65% and House and Car Insurance 10%. The Construction Bond business expanded rapidly by managing accounts such as Con Drain, TACC, and Pigott Construction. These companies all have major projects throughout Canada, including Daniels Corporation, Greenpark Group, and Coco Paving who were based in Windsor, now in Toronto.

In 1975, Cristina was born. She was an active child who played with her friends, went everywhere with her family, and enjoyed life. In 1985, Cristina was admitted to the Hospital for Sick Children to begin therapy for an eventual bone marrow transplant. She had a rare blood disease and after many attempts to save her life, she succumbed to her illness on December 9, 1985.

The loss of his daughter prompted Sam to collaborate with a team of doctors to do more research on the disease Cristina battled. Some of her organs still live on today in other individuals. To keep her memory alive, a street was named after her, "Cristina Ciccolini Court" thanks to Fred and Teresa De Gasperis.

Michael shares characteristics of both his parents. Michael, and his wife Rita, have three children Eric,



Cristina, and Jacqueline. Michael is heavily involved in the family business and devotes part of his time to volunteer work and minor hockey.

Max and Marisa married in 1973 and have 3 children, Robert, Anthony, and Dr. Amanda Ciccolini and 4 grandchildren Nello, Eva, Robbie and Sebastian. As a devoted member, Max served on Boards of St. Michael's College School, Villanova College, De La Salle College, and Crestwood Preparatory College for the past 25 years. In 2004, Max was awarded the Order of St. Michael's for his volunteer work at the college. His children Robert and Anthony are currently involved in the family business.

Sam and Max are exemplary individuals who continue to be active members in our community with their ongoing involvement with youth, politics, and amateur sports. They are proud to give back to the less fortunate and marginalized members of our society. Sam and Max are two dedicated brothers who believe in Canada and celebrate the great mosaic of our nation.




