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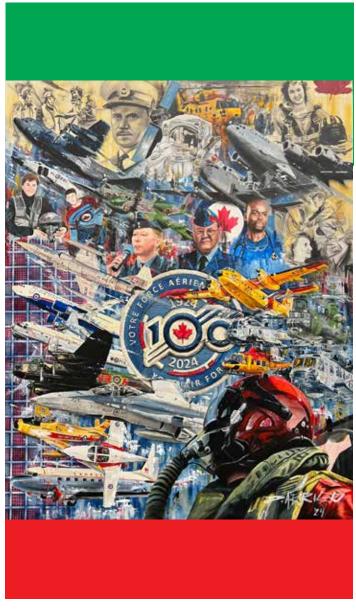
## Le Frecce Tre Colori are invited to Canada to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of The Royal Canadian Air Force

## **Kicking Off Summer with** Passage of C-69:

## Parliamentarians Return Home to Strengthen Community Ties

Silly Season on Parliament Hill wrapped up on June 20th with the passage of important government bills including the Canadian Sustainable Jobs Act, the Countering Foreign Interference Act, and the Budget Implementation Act (Bill C-69), the latter which I was honoured to sponsor and shepherd through the Senate.

As I wrote in last month's column, the BIA includes approximately 65 measures that seek to make life a little better, fairer, safer, and more affordable for generations of Canadians.

One major Budget 2024 measure that does not appear in the budget bill is the government's proposal to increase taxation on capital gains. Instead, the Minister of Finance tabled a Ways and Means Motion in the House of Commons earlier this month, indicating that Parliament should soon expect a new bill to be brought forward based on the provision in the motion.

Although the bill has yet to be tabled and debated by MPs and Senators, Canadians will still start paying tax on two-thirds of their capital gains as of June 25, 2024.

This is an important issue that I expect will take up much of our time in the fall and that will generate a lot of interest across the country from Canadians who are concerned about the financial implications of these changes. Rest assured that I am fully committed and engaged in properly reviewing this proposal once it is before Parliament. I feel the government's approach to this matter is flawed and misses the mark. The unintended consequences could very well be detrimental to our economy. Wealth creation should also be an objective in our great country.

While the summer recess gives parliamentarians an opportunity to return to their respective regions, it also gives us the chance to participate in initiatives that we would otherwise not be able to do due to the parliamentary calendar. I look forward to taking part in three such activities over the course of the summer.

First, my colleague Scott Tannas is organizing an Alberta Familiarization Tour in early July to give Senators an opportunity to familiarize ourselves with the realities and challenges of Albertans, and to have a better understanding of their signific contributions to our economy. We will meet with tourism industry experts in Banff (where my colleague Senator Sorenson served as mayor for over ten years), tour an oil sands facility in Fort McMurray and visit a grain farm and cattle ranch.

Then, in early August, I will be travelling to Oxford University, at my own personal expense, for the Oxford Symposium on Employee Ownership. I'm honoured to be a keynote speaker and offer my views on Canada's commitment to implementing employee ownership trusts (EOTs). In fact, with the recent passage of Bills



C-59 and C-69 (which both received Royal Assent on June 20th), the Income Tax Act will be amended to introduce rules to facilitate the creation of EOTs, including providing owners a \$10 million exemption on capital gains realized upon a sale of a business to an EOT.

The idea behind EOTs is to encourage owners to sell their business to their employees and helps Canadians become owners in the businesses that they work for. As the government advances, EOTs also assist owners who plan on retiring by providing another option for business succession, in cases where they want to preserve the legacy of their business or do not have family members interested in taking over the business. It's a great concept that I endorse, and I very much look forward to bringing a Canadian perspective to this global conference in the United Kingdom.

Not long after, I'll be heading out West again to participate in the Victoria Forum, a three-day conference, held at the University of Victoria and co-hosted by the Senate of Canada, that aims to find solutions to global challenges and pressing economic, social, and environmental issues. This year's theme is "Building Trust for a Shared Future" and I am honoured to moderate a panel on ownership transfer for small and medium sized enterprises. Many of my Senate colleagues will also be participating in the Forum along with an impressive list of academics, experts, and policymakers. Needless to say, my summer promises to be interesting, engaging and highly educational.

Beyond these three activities, I will be spending the summer at home in Montreal where I hope to spend some quality time with my family and friends. While the summer gives us a chance to unwind and decompress, it's also the perfect time to engage with members of the community, to get the pulse of Canadians, and to listen to their concerns, which is exactly what I intend to do (and have always committed to doing). I hope Canadians know that they can always reach out to me.

As always, I hope all Canadians will have a relaxing, yet exciting summer, and I wish you all a very Happy Canada Day. Be well, stay safe and do good!

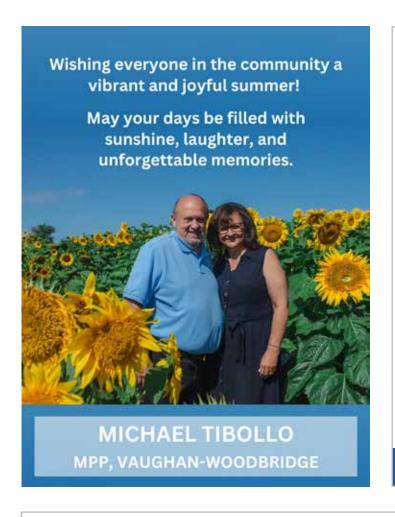














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## John Deere

Born in Vermont in 1804, John Deere was raised by his mother as his father was lost at sea. Deere gained experience as a blacksmith before moving to Illinois in 1837. It was there that he discovered that the cast-iron plows were too weak to handle the hard Midwest soil. In the late

1830s, Deere drew from his years of experience, and determined to try steel instead of iron as a possible substitute for the plow. With this new innovation, the plains were quickly conquered. By the mid-1850s, his company was selling over 10,000 plows a year. His plow was known for its high quality and gained the title of "The Plow that Broke the Plains."



## John Jacob Astor IV

When the Titanic sank, it carried millionaire John Jacob Astor IV. The money in his bank account was enough to build 30 Titanics. However, faced with mortal danger, he chose what he deemed morally right and gave up his spot in a lifeboat to save two frightened children.
