### Program notes

Although an eclectic array of musical selections, this program is thoughtfully compiled after being asked to perform works from my recent album, "Beautiful Dreamer" for the Cal-Western Regional conference of NATS. In addition to wanting music from the album, there was also a request for classical selections at my discretion.

First, I want to provide some background. The album "Beautiful Dreamer" was born during the uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic. In just one weekend, I had an entire year of performances canceled, and like so many, I was swimming in grief. My dear friend, Jared Oaks dared Kurt Bestor on Facebook to write an arrangement of "You'll Be in My Heart" for me, Nicole and Kurt. (I had just posted my first quarantine Karaoke version of one of my favorite songs I sing to my kids, when they are down and in need of comfort.) My offering on Facebook was my way of releasing some of my grief while also offering solidarity and comfort to others.

Kurt graciously took the dare and wrote a beautiful arrangement for me. What a gem of a person. From there, we recorded our portion, alone, in our homes, sent the files to Kurt who offered to mix it and make a video. From there, the video was posted, and support came in with promises of backing for us to make an album!!

They were serious. I was trepidatious and full of self-doubt. Then my phone rang. "Aubrey, listening to your voice and this arrangement was the first time I have felt peace in months. MAKE THE ALBUM."

Six months later and after lots of market research, I came to a decision. I came up with a budget, made a spreadsheet, contacted all the musicians, we agreed upon terms, and off we went. I wanted every person to feel like an important component of the project. Each arrangement was created with them in mind and every person was paid for their work. To say that this project became the very essence of my purpose during the pandemic is an understatement. The more time I put into the people making the music, the more vibrant and beautiful the mission of the album became. As the question of branding came up, I really despised the idea of having me be the center piece for the cover, so I commissioned Liz Lambson, the one and ONLY to create the album cover. It is an actual painting on canvas that we later had digitized so that it could be enjoyed on all platforms. I have let my children know, that if the house is on fire, they must first find each other, then the pets, and then the painting!!

I am so incredibly grateful for the passion that each artist brought to this project. I'm incredibly grateful to the people who supported us in financial backing and in cheerleading. Perhaps the strongest supporter with the quietest voice was my husband Ryan, who never once let me doubt in this project or myself. In the end, we all became "Beautiful Dreamers", and we genuinely hope you too, will be a "Beautiful Dreamer."

# Spirituality, grief, connection, and hope.

In selecting the classical pieces for this program, I felt that it was important to highlight the things in life that make dreaming possible. *Spirituality*: The program begins with the Bach church cantata that I selected for those who may have lost a friend, family member, or colleague during the pandemic. The comfort often provided from spirituality can carry us through hardship. As I reflected on the stories in the news, I kept hearing in my head, the text of "Qui Sedes", from *Gloria*, "have mercy on us." *Grief*: In the bleakest of times, we all experience grief and the uncertainty around grief can be so overwhelming. I instantly thought of Charlotte from *Werther* and her trial to navigate the uncertainty and grief of Werther whose letters plague and consume her. *Connection*: The art songs in this recital were selected to amplify my thoughts about holding fast to dreams. Connection is a crucial component of our ability to believe in a brighter tomorrow. Which is essentially, *Hope*: Holding fast to dreams is often an acceptance and surrender to our own spirituality, and grief. Through connection we find hope. The art song section purposely ends with Florence Price's setting of the famous Langston Hughes poem.

Thank you for this opportunity to present my work to the Cal-Western region of NATS. Thank you to the officers for giving me and my team this opportunity and Ruth Ellis for being an amazing Governor and facilitating the behind-the-scenes: a crucial component to our success as performers. My teaching and singing continues to be more informed with the wealth of knowledge I learn from the people within this amazing organization. Thank you!

Thank you, Carol Anderson, Emily Day- Shumway, Jared Oaks, Liz Lambson, Nic Maughan, Nicole Pinnell, Erin Voellinger, Sally Humphreys and Kurt Bestor!!
