We are all distressed by what is happening in Ukraine, no one more so than our member Olga Dovoric. Olga's mother and brother remain in Ukraine. Her brother has signed up to fight, although he was not a soldier, and her mother continues to go to work to support the country. Our Board voted to donate \$500 from the treasury to a charity of Olga's

choice. With Olga's help, we chose Revived Soldiers Ukraine. This group is providing medical help, equipment and supplies to those injured during the war. A personal article from Olga follows later in this newsletter, along with information about the two charities. Bob and I hosted one of the participants when our club hosted civic leaders from Ukraine in 2013 under the auspices of Open World. A few months later we were in contact with him when we took a river cruise in Ukraine. Recently, we have corresponded with him and learned that he is in Odessa and his family is in Germany. This is a lot about Ukraine but there is a "kindred spirit" here since one of our members is from Ukraine and we have a special concern for her family and the country.

I do wish to welcome our most recent members, Judy and Bill Wilkes. They have extensive experience with hosting international visitors while members of Friendship Force of Western Carolina. You may have met them at our March First Sunday and they will be hosting during our upcoming inbound journey from Northern Colorado.

Update and Invitation to First Sunday (on Saturday) June 4 at 5

You have been reading about this special event for a couple of months now. Here is an update from Pete and Judy Benda.

- The beds at our cabin are now all taken by Doyle Long, Judy Wright, Mike and Elaine Mrakouskas, and Bob and Brenda Gay.
- A few others have already booked their hotel rooms in West Jefferson for Friday and Saturday evening: Molly Kiefer, Carol Dubber, Patricia and Curt DeBoer. Fay Krapf and Bob Wells have rented a small house in town.
- The group rate for both hotels (Holiday Inn Express and Nations Inn) have been extended to include Friday night as well as Saturday.
- We have learned that the Friday evening free Backstreet Concert Series in West Jefferson is beginning its season on Friday evening with Wayne Henderson (world famous guitar builder and player) and friends. We invite everyone coming up on Friday to arrive in time to join us at the concert which runs from 5:30 to 7 PM. Plan to ar-



- rive by 5 PM if possible and bring along your own folding chair. The concert is out-door with limited seating. I will work on booking a private room for the Tavern Restaurant for dinner after the concert. If the weather should be bad, we will skip the concert and meet at the Tavern at 7 PM.
- We propose a group breakfast at Shatley Springs for Saturday morning at 9:30 AM, followed by a visit to West Jefferson's Farmers Market and a stroll through the town with nice shopping and 14 galleries.
- Plan to arrive at our cabin on Saturday by 1-2 PM for games, hiking and/or visiting. The BBQ dinner will be served at 5 PM. Please bring a side dish of your choosing.
- It has been suggested that some of our group may be interested in a two-hour paddle in kayaks on the New River on Sunday before departing back to Raleigh. We own two kayaks, Fay and Bob plan to bring two with them, and there are others which we can borrow from neighbors if there is sufficient interest.
- Please let us know if you plan to attend, which nights you will be staying, and if you want to be part of the Friday concert/dinner group, and/or kayaking group on Sunday.

We invite you to come to the Benda's Ashe County mountain home the first weekend in June for dinner . . . and to provide you an opportunity for a full weekend away from

Raleigh if you choose. Because it is a 3-hour drive from Raleigh, we decided to schedule the *dinner for 5:00 PM on SATURDAY, June 4,* rather than on Sunday. The planned schedule, arrangements, lodging and sightseeing options, are listed below.

After you review and make your decision, please contact Pete and Judy (pete-benda@nc.rr.com or 919-622-9134) to give us your plan to either attend or decline. We will reconfirm with everyone the month before the event and provide detailed directions to our home at 311 Forest Way Dr, Fleetwood, NC 28626.

The plan is for a mountain barbeque dinner at the Benda's cabin. The hosts will provide the main course, coleslaw, hush puppies, and beverages. Guests are invited to bring a side dish, salad, or dessert. Please plan to arrive by midafternoon for games, walking nearby trails, and visiting. If you plan to come up on Friday and/or spend Saturday in the mountains lodging options are below.

- Nations Inn Hotel, West Jefferson, NC. Mention "Friendship Force of Raleigh" and receive a 10% discount providing a rate of \$86 plus tax for Friday or Saturday evenings (a little less for weekday nights). Call 336-246-2080 to book a reservation. This hotel is about 10 miles from the cabin.
- Holiday Inn Express Hotel, West Jefferson, NC. Mention "Friendship Force of Raleigh" to receive a special rate of \$199 plus tax for Friday or Saturday (\$109 plus tax for Sunday). Call 336-846-4000 to book a reservation. This hotel is also about 10 miles from the cabin.
- Information removed regarding staying at the Bendas' since no longer available.

If you come to enjoy a full weekend in the beautiful NC mountains, here are a few things you may wish to consider:

- Ashe County Farmers Market meets on Saturday from 8 AM to 1 PM in downtown West Jefferson.
- The Ashe County Cheese Factory and Store are popular to visit as is the Honey Hole, a unique shop featuring bees, honey, gifts, etc.
- There are 14 art and photography galleries in West Jefferson including the Ashe County Arts Center and the Florence Thomas Art School.
- The two "Churches of the Frescos" are wonderful and inspiring to visit. One is in West Jefferson and the other in nearby Glendale Springs.
- Nearby Shatley Springs would be a great choice for a Saturday breakfast; the River House provides elegant (and expensive) dinners in an old country home (with live music on Sunday afternoons), and the Tavern Restaurant in West Jefferson is popular for casual dining indoor or on their patio.
- The Blue Ridge Parkway provides stunning long-range views and short scenic hikes at places like the Cascades.

This will be a fun weekend away and we hope to have a good crowd to add to the fun.

She posts on Facebook what they are doing and what they need.

As co-editor of this newsletter, I (Judy) asked Olga if she would like to write an article about her personal experience during this war in Ukraine. Next is her personal account and story of life during the first 30 days, an experience that continues. These are her words.

LIFE BEFORE AND AFTER

What day is today? If you ask me, I will not be able to answer you if it is Monday or Tuesday or March 23rd or March 24th ...All I know that today is the 30th day of Russian aggression, 30th day of nightmare, 30th day of the war that took lives of 139 innocent kids and wounded 205 (per March 26rd). February 24th, 2022 is a turning point which divides life as "before" and "after" for many Ukrainians.

This day created two realities for me. One – American and two – a Ukrainian during war time. I still remember that February evening sitting at home and browsing through Facebook at 11 pm. Suddenly, I saw my friend's post (Yuliya is from Kyiv and lives in Apex) saying "The war has begun. They are bombing Kyiv, Kharkiv and other cities." Tears started falling down my face and my hands started to shake. My husband and I started looking for more information in disbelief. How is that possible? What's happening? We have tickets to visit our family in Ukraine on March 15th. How's mom and brother? ...and million other thoughts went through our minds. Still in shock, I dialed my mom's number asking if they are ok, only to find out that the single military air-field in our city, Ivano-Frankivsk, has been bombed.

I cried and cried feeling helpless, being thousands of miles away from my homeland and not knowing how I can help. My heart was aching for my Ukraine and my people.

On February 26th our Ukrainian community organized the March in downtown Raleigh to support Ukraine and each other. There are so many Ukrainians in North Carolina that come from all over Ukraine. I guess that day was more than a day to support Ukraine. It was a day to support each other and find out if our family members are still alive in Ukraine. That day we had so many people to come and support us. There were people from the US, Japan, Vietnam, Portugal, Georgia, Russia, and Belarus.



I will always remember that Saturday. That's the day when my younger brother went to the military office and volunteered to serve and defend Ukrainian sovereignty. I think I hit the breaking point that day. I just couldn't stop crying. I had to do something. I had to do something here and somehow support Ukrainians.



It is amazing how quickly our Ukrainian community with the help and support of our friends in the United States got together to figure out what and how we can help. Many of us were operating on anger and coffee, sleeping 4 hours per night. We collected medical supplies, supplies for Ukrainian defenders, baby formula, diapers, just within few days. In the beginning of March two trucks headed to Delaware from NC. It went to Poland, from there to the Ukrainian border and then to Ukraine. Within the next week we collected, packed, and shipped close to

200 boxes of life saving supplies. We learned very quickly what is a tourniquet, an Israeli bandage, what a military first aid kit contains, and benefits of quick clot gauze.

We were able to transfer funds to a group of volunteers in Southern Ukraine. They then used those funds to buy groceries. They went to feed the elderly and those who were left without any localized efforts where we know our help, however small, can make a huge difference. My friend, Slava, just flew to Poland a few days ago for two weeks. She plans to work with volunteers in Ukraine and send them necessary items and medical supply. No words can describe how grateful we are for all the support we received from our families here, our friends and our local communities.

The scariest part is that 70% Russians support their president and agree with this war. Russia stole our history, twisted, and keep twisting many facts, tried to destroy our identity for many centuries. Right now, since Russian military are met with opposition, they are destroying and bombing whole cities, killing kids and civilians. Russian troops are not allowing for Ukrainian humanitarian convoy to enter cities occupied by Russian soldiers. People are just left without food, water, and any medical assistance. People are starving, dying in the center of Europe in 2022. My friend can-

not locate her elderly brother who lives in Mariupol. She hasn't heard from him since March 12th. We pray that he is alive and not dead and buried somewhere in the yard next to the road or playground, because that's how people are buried there nowadays. Millions of people had to become refugees and leave their home. Many still decided to stay behind. Some of them are defending sovereignty of Ukraine. Some of them are saying how are we going to leave the home where my parents and I were born, where our grandparents are buried. You see, we know our history, we treasure our heritage, we respect our Motherland, and we will fight occupants for our freedom and for the bright future that our grandparents fought for in World War II.



I cannot complain much about my reality. I stay up till 1 a.m. until I receive a message from my mom saying, "Good morning, all is good, I am getting ready to go to work." You see, she still goes to work, because she is an accountant at the emergency room. When we spoke in January, she was excited about this year. She planned to retire once she turns 60 in August and come to the USA for a few months.

Then I text my brother "Hey bro, all good? How are you?" I wish I could ask him more, where he is exactly, what is he doing...Some days I just wish I was there with him or at least I could hug my mom and my brother.

As soon as I wake up in the morning, I text my mom and my brother making sure they are ok, read the news, check on my friends, listen to President Zelensky's latest update and off to my American reality I go.
