DONATIONS, DONATIONS, DONATIONS!!!

We have mentioned donations at the last few meetings and realized that the Guild has many new members that may not understand the process that has been used. Hopefully, this will answer some questions you may have. We always encourage you to get involved and you can contact the President, or Web Master if you want to be involved in the donation process.

How do we get donations?

- Many come through the website communication portal. Individuals write that they are downsizing, or moving, or have family members who are moving or have passed. Often overwhelmed, they ask for the Guild's assistance in sorting and want to donate to the Guild.
- Former and current members have moved and downsized or had family members who as well need to get rid of quilting fabric and supplies.
- Individual friends have contacted members when they have a need to donate.
- Sometimes, (not often, thankfully 😊) the bags/boxes of items are just left at a door step!

How Often do we get donations?

That is a number that is difficult to give. During COVID, everyone was cleaning and we had several donations. In the past year, we have had at least 5-10 donations of various sizes.

What are the next steps in sorting?

- As Carol Carter is the Web Mistress, she gets the majority of the requests. She contacts the President (me and now Penny) to see the viability of accepting the donation. There have been requests from out of SCV and on occasion, the person wants the Guild to buy the fabric. Sometimes, they are just toooooo big.
- If doable, Carol contacts Guild members who are willing and available to sort the donation. In one case there were 5 of us working for 2 days and used 8 car loads to transport the donations. IF YOU ARE INTERESTED IN HELPING SORT AND BEING ON A CALL LIST, LET CAROL KNOW.



What does the sorting team do with all those items?

There are major events throughout the year and committees who use fabric:

- Ways and Means committee are able to select items appropriate for the baskets, or door prizes for membership or Community Service awards
- Thematic fabric is separated for Veteran Quilts, Cowboy Festival, Children Flannel for Pregnancy Center, or Strips for Placemats
- Top notch kits, quilt tops, finished quilts are used for the Block Auction
- Unfinished quilt tops are set aside to be quilted for Community Service
- Quality yardage is put in the storage shed for members to use for Community Service projects
- Smaller yardage is put aside for the fabric sale
- Larger items like mats, rulers, machines may go out to members ASAP for sale
- Some items are put on the free table at meetings

How can Members benefit?

- Thanks to Kathleen D., the storage shed is well organized and there are bins of fabric that members may use for community service projects. Several board and committee chairs have keys to the storage and would be more than happy to meet a member there to select fabric for an existing community service project. There is backing, batting and other yardage available.
- If it is a project that the Guild has not traditionally supported, but a member feels passionately about, the member may make a request to the board following the guidelines in the last section of the Guild Standing Rules.



COMMUNITY SERVICE – SCV SENIOR CENTER

As 2024 comes to an end, I want to take a moment to say thank you so much for your generosity and hard work. We have been successful in meeting our goal and will be delivering to the Senior Center on December 5th. COMMUNITY SERVICE – VA / CALVET VISIT

Melissa Nilsen and Rhea Fetter rode with me to take 16 vests, 6 wheelchair, 7 medium quilts, 1 wall hanging and 7 bed sized quilts to the Cal Vet facility off Wilshire Blvd. We knocked on doors, handed some out in the halls, and took the vests and wheelchair quilts to the memory care unit. Pamela White joyfully escorted us through the halls with a basket full of our donations. Our thanks to her for her wonderful hospitality and so much information about the facility and the vets they care for.

One gifting that touched me was a vet sitting in the hallway across from their help desk. I gave him one I was holding. He sat tracing the quilting - feathering which was beautifully done. After giving him the quilt, our group showed up, ready to knock on a few more doors, and I went back to speak to him. He told me it would be on his bed and we discussed cleaning issues, they tend to wash things every week. He was so pleased.

I missed the memory care portion because I ended up talking to Betty - a vet who remembers painting ladies on the sides of aircraft at El Toro marine base. The memory was triggered by a picture of my father's plane on Tinian with him and his crew. There was a



lady on that plane too! She looked at it very carefully and said she had "all her star points". Betty also told me about the first pizza places - one in Chicago and one in New York that opened in 1950 for the first time. The people in New York didn't think it would catch on. The ones in Chicago were debating about trying it in California - just sure that maybe they might like it. She is a Navy vet, her husband was in the Air Force. She got our X and O quilt with lots of bright colors, a yellow binding and a bright Cherokee fabric with all sorts of flowers on the back. She was torn between which side she would have "up". Like everyone else we gave a quilt to, she kept touching it.

What they really liked was meeting us. Betty is teaching an Arts and Crafts class soon. The first area, where I met the gentleman and Betty, was an assisted living area and they come and go, or have family bring them home for weekends so they have more freedom. Pamela was pointing out how short staffed they were and that they couldn't just visit with people when they had to be sure medications were taken, shots were given, or needs attended to. She was encouraging us to come even without donations and just talk to them. They need the contact with others. We can be in touch with her if you want to try it. Betty was saying we could come to her class.

Anyway, I have at least one volunteer to come with me about April when I would like to take what we have available. Needed: Vests (more info in January), wheelchair quilts (between 36 and 40 wide, max 45 long) best with angled or curved lower corners, medium sized quilts!!!! (throws that could be used to cover legs while reading in a chair or watching TV or even put on top of a bed to add warmth sized from 40x45 up to 45x60), and bed quilts (beds in care units at 50x65ish or for assisted living 70x80). Sizes are approximate and can vary in width or length more than I have provided.

We have been providing kits for block assembly and hope in 2025 to have some kits for assembly of tops for all sizes. I have about 5-6 large quilts available to quilt, and several smaller - medium or wheelchair - that I will be spray basting. Remember please - there is both red/white/blue fabrics and also some Japanese prints that are in the storage unit in addition to backs, binding and battings which are always available. If you want batting, let me know the size you want for quilting (top width x length + inches to make it work on your machine). I also have about 20 labels that I can give you to sew on the back.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH

We will continue working on a cute snowman quilt for the month of December. Kits will be available to be picked up at the December meeting. All blocks will be due at the January meeting. This will be a raffle quilt, and depending on participation, we may have 2 winners.

Each kit will have the fabric needed for a nine-patch block and a snowman block. Please complete both.

Your first block is a nine-patch block made from the provided nine 5" blue squares. Sew them in any order you wish. It is meant to be scrappy.

Your second block is the snowman block. You will use the remaining four 5" blue blocks marked with a diagonal line, one 12.5" white square, an orange nose (that has fusible web ironed on the back), and two black buttons.

To make the snowman: Place one blue square on a corner of the white square, right sides together. The diagonal line needs to run from one side to the other side (not from the corner towards the middle of the block). Sew on the drawn line. Do this for the three remaining corners. Please go to the link if a little extra help is needed.

After the four corner squares are sewn on, trim away the extra triangle material and press.

Next, pull the paper from the fusible web and iron on the orange nose. For the last step, sew on the two buttons for the eyes.
