

Finished IFFI! This is a modern setting. The blocks and sashing had to be hand sewn to match the "lines".


Julips in my Garden






Quilting on the back and label


A quilt for my mother. Made in the early 90's with colors she loved. She gave it to my brother Bob before she died. It was a good lap quilt on cool nights in Georgia





One of my nieces watched me laying it out on my Mother's living room floor (on that same trip). She told her she really liked it and wanted it. She did get it for graduation... as it is labeled. Quilting pattern was used for label. Quilting was freeform.



Another fire survivor, this had been retired to the attic, originally one of two identical quilts for the twin beds in my nephew's room. Made from two kits purchased at **Tuesday Morning** in 1980.




One of what feels like hundreds of tree skirts I have made. This one also survived the fire and was in use under the Christmas tree again! Made 2003

I was not sure if this was Grandmother Lillian, her sister Aunt Gin or my Great Aunt Mattie's work. My brother remembers her saying Aunt Mattie so we put a label on it with her name. That is why all those quilts were out! This one is 100% by hand including the quilting and is made for a double bed with 30's fabrics. The border is sewn to indicate top of the bed. It is a very traditional fan pattern.
