PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I hope your holidays are/were wonderful – I know it's difficult this year, still being at least somewhat isolated, but I hope you were at least able to spend some time with those you love.

This is my 25th article as President of our guild – having served for a couple of years about a decade or so ago. It gets tough trying to come up with something of value for you all to read, so I have decided this term to spend some time talking about the history of our avocation. I hope you enjoy reading it as much as I enjoy researching it.

The word "quilt" derives from the Latin word "culcita," meaning stuffed mattress or cushion. No one is exactly sure when quilting began, but from evidence found in the Temple of Osiris at Abydos, Egypt. It seems that people wore quilted clothing as many as 5000 years ago.

Evidence of quilt work was found in Asia in late BC and early AD years. Quilting became evident in Europe in the 12th century – it was discovered that the Crusaders wore quilted garments under their armor for comfort, warmth and protection. You can just imagine women trying to make the wearing of armor somewhat more comfortable for their men!

One of the earliest decorative quilts made in the 14th century is the Tristan Quilt. Made in Sicily, it is one of the oldest surviving quilts in the world. You can find a section in the V&A Museum in London, England and another in the Bargello Palace in Florence, Italy.

In the 14th and 15th centuries, wealthy and important figures made quilted 'doublets' — fashionable outerwear. From written evidence we know that British people certainly used bed quilts, under and over a mattress, from the 15th Century, but we cannot be sure what they were like because the quilts have not survived.

Quilting as a craft came to America with the Puritans. Quilts were made in those early days in America to serve a purpose, to provide warmth at night and to cover doors and windows to help reduce cold. Quilts were often functional, with little time for women to create decorative quilts. Often, money and other resources were limited so quilts were made with what was available, often old clothing no longer needed by family members. Batting was created by hand from carded cotton. Worn quilts were patched together or cut apart to make another

usable quilt. Those early quilts tell the history not only of early American quilting, but also the early history of the country.

Fascinating, isn't it? What wonderful history we continue to make with our creations! Next month, we will look at American quilting in the 18th Century. I look forward to seeing you all at our January Zoom Meeting! Until then, keep on quilting!

Of course, with additional blocks and/or increasing the size of the blocks, it could be as big as you like.



Not sure if you want to do a workshop via Zoom? It is lots of fun and you don't have to pack up your sewing machine and guess which tools you might need. Stay in your own space and the workshop comes to you. The November workshop by Elizabeth Eastmond was a huge hit with all who attended!

Thank all of you so much for the generous donations of time and effort last year! We are in the process of putting together another delivery in the March/April timeframe. When I go is based on having enough to take. I will be showing some of the finished pieces at the meeting. Currently I have kits (with completed blocks) including sashing/borders or choices of colors for four-patches depending on the pattern which is also included. There are about 10 twin size (approx.) bed quilts to be quilted and check with me about spray basted ones. I have several and will spray them if you let me know. As has been the case, they can be picked up or dropped off on my porch. My house is tucked away and I have not had any problems. The items are in plastic tubs that swing apart on top. There is one tub that is for returns. The sign in/out book is on a table with hand sanitizer and pens. JANUARY BLOCK OF THE MONTH - RAIL FENCE PINWHEEL BLOCK



Your block should be 12.5" UNFINISHED. Finished Size (once sewn into the quilt) is 12". For each block, you will need:

Fabric/Color	<u>Cut Size</u>	Quantity
Blue-1*	2.5" x 6.5"	4
Blue-2	2.5" x 6.5"	4
Blue-3	2.5" x 6.5"	4
White or Off-white (solid or small print)	2.5" x 2.5"	8

*Use at least 3 different blue fabrics, preferably lighter & darker values for a little contrast. Or, you can be totally scrappy and use 12 different blues. Just separate them into 3 piles of 4 strips each.

SEW ALL SEAMS AT 1/4"


Step 1:

Draw a line corner to corner on the back of all 8 of the White 2.5" squares.

Step 2:

Set aside the 4 Blue-2 strips. These will be the middle piece of each sub-block.

Step 3a:



Step 3b:

Cut 1/4" to the right of the stitched line.

Step 3c:

Fold back the white triangle and iron flat.

Step 4:

Assemble 4 identical sub-blocks. Each will use one Blue-1, one Blue-2, and one Blue-3 strip. Lay a Blue-1 on your sewing machine right-side up, and with the white triangle at the top. Set a Blue-2 on top of it, right-sides together, and sew along the right edge. Open and iron towards Blue-2. Then set a Blue-3 right sides together with Blue-2, making sure the white triangle is at the bottom, and sew along the right edge. Open and iron towards Blue-2. The sub-block should be 6.5" square. Repeat with the remaining strips to make 4 identical sub-blocks.

Step 5

Step 4

<u>Step 5:</u>

Sew the 4 sub-blocks together as shown. Rotate each sub-block so that the Blue-3 strips touch in the center to create a pinwheel. The completed block should be 12.5" square.

1 completed block:



If you sew the blocks together with no sashing, you get pinwheels at each joining of blocks. Here's a mockup of how it would look when lots of blocks are sewn together, assuming all blocks have a set of light, medium, and dark blue strips, and they're sewn in the same order.


