

# SANTA CLARITA VALLEY QUILT GUILD

Our mission is to stimulate an interest in quilts, to promote and advance the art of quilt making, to conduct educational programs and services in the design techniques and preservation of quilts and quilt making; and to promote quilting in philanthropic endeavors.

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I hope you all are enjoying these peeks into the history of our craft! This month, we will look at quilting during the Civil War.

Both Union and Confederate women rallied to the war effort when the Civil War broke out in 1861. Patriotic fervor abounded with both sides certain the war would be short and decisive.

Great fairs were held in the North and quilts were among the more expensive items made and donated. Craft bazaars were already a way to raise funds for churches and other causes. Most of the items sold involved sewing. Now that effort went to the war.

Although there were some who frowned on the idea of women being involved in any commercial venture, patriotism won out as fairs became more and more elaborate. Women created beautiful quilts - often of fine fabrics like silk. Album quilts and Flag quilts were popular styles. There is even mention of silk Log Cabin quilts. These fairs brought in a great deal of money to help buy needed supplies for the Union.

Southern women did what they could to help buy desperately needed gunboats. Excitement was high as communities competed to raise money for this urgent cause. Beautiful Gunboat Quilts were made. Some of these displayed elaborate medallion style floral arrangements cut from printed fabric. The motifs were cut out and appliquéd to solid fabric. This method is called "broderie perse" and requires very fine sewing skills. Through fairs, raffles and donations, southern women raised enough money to pay for three of these ironclad gunboats.

During the spring of 1862, the enthusiasm for this confederate project waned when naval defeats made it likely that seaports would fall to the enemy. It was decided that the funds should go for medical supplies for soldiers instead. The war would continue for three desolating years with southern women's energy going primarily to help their soldiers.

Unfortunately, the war that was supposed to "only spill a thimble-full of blood" drug out over four devastating years. It soon became obvious that there was a desperate need for clothing and blankets for Union soldiers.

Northern women were accustomed to gathering together and sewing for a cause. Church and abolitionist groups simply changed their focus to helping soldiers. An organization called the Sanitary Commission was established to do what was possible to prevent the death of soldiers from disease and injury. As the urgent need for soldiers' bedding became apparent, the Sanitary Commission added the collection and distribution of donated quilts and comforters to their activities.

The military requested that quilts be made about seven feet by four feet, the convenient size for a military cot and bedding pack. Many quilts were made from available fabrics and sometimes quilts were made by cutting up two existing bed quilts and sewing them into three cot quilts. Eventually money had to be raised to buy the fabric to make soldiers' bedding as existing materials were used up. By the end of the war, it is estimated that over 250,000 quilts and comforters had been made for Union soldiers.

Southern women were somewhat hindered in producing bedding for soldiers because they did not have a tradition of sewing for causes and the wealthier women were used to having slaves do the everyday sewing. Nevertheless, many of these women learned to sew and pitched in to help their soldiers. Once prewar textiles were used up, fabric became scarce. The South could not get goods in through their ports and had no real manufacturing base of their own. Calico was said to cost as much as \$25 a yard toward the end of the war – the equivalent of \$415 today. Eventually women had to make homespun fabric, a much slower process. Old mattresses were torn apart for fiber to spin. Even carpets were cut up and made into blankets for soldiers.

Just a very few of the quilts made for soldiers have survived and can be seen at the Smithsonian. As you can imagine these quilts got a great deal of wear and probably did not seem worth saving after the war. Many completely wore out. If you add to that the fact that many soldiers were buried in their quilts you can understand why these quilts are extremely rare today.

# MARCH BLOCK OF THE MONTH - FOUR PATCH DIAMONDS



Your block should be 12.5" UNFINISHED.

Finished Size (once sewn into the quilt) is 12".

For each block, you will need:

<u>Fabric/Color</u>	<u>Cut Size</u>	<u>Quantity</u>
Green, brown, or blue (corner squares)	3.5″ x 3.5″	4
Green, brown, or blue (center square)	6.5″ x 6.5″	1
Green, brown, or blue (diamond)	7.75" x 7.75"	1
Cream or very light Beige (use solid or small print)	4.25" x 4.25"	4

\*Use at least 2 different green/brown/blues, but make sure they contrast well against the cream. You can use solids or prints, or go wild with stripes, plaids, or outdoor themed. The 5 corner & center squares can all be the same, or 5 different fabrics for a scrappier look. For the diamond, use a fabric that stands out well against the center square.

#### SEW ALL SEAMS AT 1/4"

#### Make 4-at-a-time Flying Geese

#### <u>Step 1:</u>

Sew

Draw a line corner to corner on the back of all 4 of the Cream 4.25" squares.

#### Step 2:

Lay the 7.75" square (for the diamond) right side up. Place 2 of the Cream 4.25" squares on opposite corners, right sides together. The squares will overlap slightly in the middle. Make sure the drawn line is straight across the 2 squares as though it was drawn on the diagonal of the larger square. Sew 1/4'' on both sides of the drawn line.

#### Step 3a:

Cut on the drawn line.

#### Step 3b:

Fold back the Cream triangles and press flat on both units. Press towards the light fabric.

#### Step 4:


Place 1 of the Cream 4.25" squares on the corner of the large 'Diamond' triangle, right sides together. The squares will overlap slightly in the middle. Make sure the drawn line extends from the lower left corner to between the other Cream triangles. Sew 1/4" on both sides of the drawn line. Repeat with the other unit.

#### Step 5a:

Cut on the drawn line on both units.

#### Step 5b:

Fold back the Cream triangle and press flat on all 4 units. Press towards the light fabric.








#### <u>Step 6:</u>

Trim the flying geese to  $3.5'' \times 6.5''$ . You don't need a special ruler to trim your geese. Place your finished goose with the point down. Then, set the top-right edge of your ruler on the right diagonal line and slide it along the diagonal line until the  $6 \ 1/2''$  vertical line on your ruler touches the left diagonal line. The  $3 \ 1/4''$  vertical line on your ruler should intersect the goose point at the bottom. There needs to be at least 1/4'' of fabric below the goose point for seam allowance, so that you don't cut off your point when you sew the blocks together. Once your ruler is aligned, trim the right and top edges.



Next, flip the goose over so that the goose point is at the top. Place the ruler on the goose aligning the 6 1/2" vertical line on the ruler on the left edge of your goose, and the 3 1/2" horizontal line on the ruler on the bottom edge of your goose. Once your ruler is aligned, trim the right and top edges.



Repeat with the remaining 3 geese.


#### Assemble the Block

#### <u>Step 7:</u>

Sew the patches together as shown. The points of the flying geese need to point <u>away</u> from the center square in order to form the diamond. The completed block should be 12.5" square.



When the blocks are sewn together, an alternating dark/light diamond pattern forms with a 4-patch in the middle of the light diamonds. Here's a mockup to give you an idea of how it comes together.



Thank you for helping! These blocks will be used to make bed (60" x 80") or lap (40" x 48") quilts for CAL Vets.

# 2021 OPPORTUNITY QUILT: "STARRY SEAS" - 88" X 88"




