Parks, schools, churches, wedding venues were explored and rentals started at about \$3,000 up to \$17,000 for the Piru Mansion for the weekend. (We had to dream a bit!) Much more discussion needed as to if, when, and who is willing to take on the Chairmanship of the event. But the point was to see where it could happen. Thank you, Darlene, Laura, and Joann for doing the research.

The financial committee gave their findings and bottom line, the activities that we are currently spearheading are bringing in the money we are spending for essentials and programs. Always a good thing! We did decide that we would not sell Opportunity Quilt tickets at the Long Beach Quilt Show next year, but instead visit other guilds in the area for that purpose. The side benefit of that is that we could hear other speakers, learn how other guilds works, and meet other officers/quilters. Be thinking of what guilds you would like to visit and volunteer to sell raffle tickets. Stay tuned for more options.



COMMUNITY SERVICE - SCRAPS, SCRAPS, SCRAPS

What do I do with them? I have made a crumb quilt -- (Don't like them). I have made several designs of scrap quilts, but my stash of scraps continues to grow. Those are also not my favorite as they do not feed my creative juices. I have heard some throw away their scraps, but I have a hard time doing that and feel it is wasteful.

So, I have a solution. Dog beds. Some shelters are very grateful for them. It is very simple to make a quick pillow type block leaving a 6" opening on one end and keep adding scraps until it is full. Size of the pillow can be anywhere from 18" x 18" to 30" x 30" of heavy dense fabric and needs to only contain fabric and thread.

As an alternative, save the scraps in a large bag and bring them to me. Or, I can get you a "pillow" to put your scraps in. Then, when the pillow is full, bring it to me.

I still keep large scraps but this makes me feel better about letting go of smaller scraps or bits and pieces. It is surprising how quickly the pile adds up.

I would love to hear from others if you have other suggestions of what you do with those little bits and pieces.


2023 OPPORTUNITY QUILT

BLOCK OF THE MONTH





Here is a perfect block to practice your 1/4" seams. Being off by "just a little bit" when multiplied over several seams can add up quickly.


You will be strip piecing contrasting strips together and then cutting them into two blocks. Your block should be 10 ½" square UNFINISHED. Finished Size (once sewn into the quilt) is 10".

For 2 blocks, you will need:


Fabric/Color

Two contrasting fabrics. One strip of each:

- Strip of 2" x 22"
- Strip of 1 34" x 22"
- Strip of 1 ½" x 22"
- Strip of 1 1/4" x 22"
- Strip of 1" x 22"
- Using one of each strip width from two contrasting fabrics, lay out your strips as shown, going from wide to narrow with one fabric, then fabric 2 interspersed from narrow to wide. Take a close look to make sure they are in correct position.
- 2. Sew together in pairs, pressing seams open. (May press all one direction.
- Sew the pairs together, pressing seams open. (May press all one direction.) Take a close look that design looks correct. It is very easy to get this wrong.
- 4. Measure the width of your strata. It should measure 10½". If not, please take a closer look at your seams to find where you can make adjustments.
- 5. When you get your pieced strips to measure 10 ½", cut your strata into two blocks of 10 ½". (I like to lay pieced strips on a cutting mat, lining up on a horizontal line and having the left side going to the



edge of the mat. Then I use my rotary cutter to cut vertically on the "o" and then the "10 ½"). Then continue without moving and cut at the 21".)
