

#### Precious Metal Content For Coin Collectors.

Numismatists, both dealers and hobbyists like us, always have an eye on precious metal prices and how they affect the value of our collections. For this discussion let's focus just on silver and gold. How do we determine how much silver or gold is contained in our US or foreign coins and once we know that, what are they worth?

First we need to be familiar with the terms used to describe metal content. United States silver coins generally are minted with "coin silver" which is a 90% silver with a 10% copper alloy for dimes, quarters, halves and dollars through 1964.

One dollar of face value of US silver minor coin contains .715 Troy ounce (31.1 grams) of pure silver - (ASW actual silver weight) and .77344 Troy ounce ASW for silver dollars. These numbers are important to remember for determination of approximate value. You have probably heard the term "melt value" when discussing what silver coins are going for, such as "18X, 20X or 22 times (face value)".

A simple example: If you have \$1.00 FACE VALUE of US silver coin, it contains .715 TROY ounces of silver (periodic table symbol: Ag). If silver is currently quoted at \$32.50 per Troy ounce, the melt value of your coins is  $32.50 \times .715 = $23.238$ .

Pretty good for one dollar of pocket change! This could also be referred to as "silver is at 23 times". That does NOT however define what you might buy or sell it for. That is determined by market factors such as supply and demand and dealer pricing.

Currently with silver at \$32.50, common US silver coins are trading at 20 to 22 times. That price reflects a "discount to melt". At times of high demand, silver coins can trade at a "premium to melt", higher than their metal value.

Let's move on to world coins. This is where things get tricky. Most countries have minted coins containing silver for hundreds of years. However, the silver alloy used and the size/weight of the coins vary widely. Here's an example: I have a 1968 Mexico Olympics 25 Peso coin. (Coin weight is 22.5 grams) This coin is: .720 Ag (72% silver) and .5209 oz ASW.(actual silver weight). What the heck does that mean? It means that the coin is minted from a 72% silver alloy. Applying that percentage to the weight of the coin yields .5209 ounces of silver . With silver currently trading at \$32.50 the melt value of this coin is \$16.93. (.72 x 22.5 grams / 31.1 grams / Troy ounce = .5209 ASW x \$32.50 / Troy ounce = \$16.93) Another example, a 1954 Switzerland 5 Franc coin. This coin is: .835 Ag, .4027 ASW. Melt value is currently \$13.09. Switzerland did not join the EURO currency like most of Europe, so the Swiss Franc is still a valid world currency. With the Swiss Franc worth a little over a dollar, this coin is worth about \$5 face value, but because it is 83.5% silver its value is higher. Of course to determine the weight and silver content of your foreign coins you need to do some research. This is not hard if you have a good source such as The Standard Catalog of World Coins. That is a tremendous reference for coins going back hundreds of years. Another place to check is the website: https://www.coinflation.com/

Remember that melt value does not always define the market value of coins, but these calculations are a good starting point. Actual market values can be lower or nicely higher if demand is strong or they have numismatic factors. I would be glad to assist any OCCC members or visitors in determining the silver or gold value of their coins. This is fun. We can continue this essay to discuss gold coins and bullion coins if I get feedback.
