You need **6 Repeats** of fabric (*most quilt shops can help you with fabric repeat*). A good average repeat is around 23 inches. A 12-inch or 13-inch repeat will work; however, this works best when you cut small triangles and will only make a tiny quilt.

You can also use 6 or 7 panels. Six for hexagons and a seventh if you want one in the middle.

(Be carfull not to get a panel with a lot of plain background. Large amounts of plain background will result in a lot of plain hexagons.

A great helper for fabric choice is using the **Design Helper**. This not an App. Search **Design Helper One Block Wonder** in a search engine like Google. Lay out the fabric you are auditioning, take a photo, upload in the Design Helper where it states, "choose local image". Once loaded scroll under photo and change hexagon size to 3.75" and click "make hexes". Scroll down. This will give you an idea of how your hexagons will look.



FABRIC FORMULA

Repeat (inches) x 6 divided by 36 (yard). Example: $23'' \times 6 = 138$ $38 \div 36 = 3.8$ yard

Always round up. Minimum needed would be 4 yards. I usually get 4-1/2 yards and use the extra in a border. (I usually end up with a large lap quilt) I can't provide an exact size. Quilt can be enlarged by adding borders or other elements in the quilt design. (Such as cubes. Not included in this class.)

PREPARE FABRIC FOR CLASS

Cut fabric into six sections of your repeat (the 23 inches) by the WOF (*Width of Fabric*). Save the extra for your border. These sections do not need to be cut perfectly, they will be straightened and trimmed after pressing and pinning together.

Press each section. Use a lot of starch of your choice. (*I use Faultless Premium, gold can*). Soak the fabric and press stiff. Try not to stretch the fabric when you press. I always heavily starch and press. This is not required; however, the triangles have bias edges, and starching makes them much easier to work with and to match up all those points.

BASIC SEWING SUPPLIES

- Machine, pins (I use a lot of pins), thread, iron (I just use a small one for class), ironing pad, extension cords if needed for the classroom, etc.
- Rotary Cutter with new blade. You will be cutting through 6 layers of fabric!
- 60-degree blunt tip triangle ruler (I recommend the Tiny Creative Grids Diamond Ruler)
- Any **60-degree ruler** will work, the Tiny CG ruler cuts up to a 4.5" triangle and is easy to handle. I will be bringing several different 60-degree rulers that can also be shared in class. Blunt tip 60-degree ruler recommended. If you use a point tip ruler, make sure you put the tip 1/4" above your fabric!
- A large cutting mat (I have extras and will bring them, so you don't have to buy one). We can set these up in stations on tables.
- A 24" ruler. (I will bring one and I'm sure we can hare in the class should someone forget or not have one.)
- 2" plastic coated paper clips (some people use thin, inexpensive paper plates, I prefer the paper clips.

Minutes

LPQG | 09 JUNE 2025

Vicki Wooddell, President, called the meeting to order at 9:32 am and extended a warm welcome. The opening prayer was given by Kathy Winter.

Vicki presented the minutes of May 12, 2025 as published in the Newsletter and called for corrections. Hearing none, a motion was made by Donna Garland, seconded by Lyla Wenneker and the minutes were approved.

Vicki presented the Financial Report for April 2025 as sent via Newsletter and called for corrections. With none noted Lyla Wenneker moved; Jackie Burke seconded, and the Financial Report was approved.

Committee & Chairman Reports

Treasurer – Sharon Wright clarified that some errors were found in April's report and she gave the following information:

2nd Vice President/Membership Chairman -

Cheryl Cox reported 37 members and 6 guests in attendance. Our guests were Alphie Wright, Jerry Wooddell, Tamara Philips, Frances Caramella, Cassie Hopson, Karen Overton, and our guest speaker from F.A.I.T.H, Pat Smith. All guests were allowed to choose a fat quarter. There was a total of 481 volunteer hours and fifteen members attended a Bee. Door prize winners were Kim Myers, Patty Lawson, Sue Glick, and Jackie Burck.

Exchange Table — Mary Parrish was not present today but members were encouraged to take a look.

Block of the Month – Marci Dickens confirmed 19 members participated; 12 blocks were turned- in, and there are 7 IOU's. Kathy Winter won the drawing. Marci shared the Quilter's Soup Recipe directions for a table runner project for the July and August meetings. The pattern will be of your choice. Printed directions for this fun project are at her table.

2025 Row-by-Row - Debbie Cox advised that 40 members have signed-up and 20 members brought their work to show. Three members found the hidden needle in the Newsletter: 1) Sylvia Sills; 2) Madi McMurray, and 3) Destiny Pennington and they selected a fat quarter.

Community Service/Education - Norma Christensen, Sharon Jeans and Bonnie Magid

Norma reported that three nursing homes each recently received 53 of our items. They were ecstatic! Each one received 25 all-purpose bags for wheel chairs, 15 clothing protectors for residents when painting or eating, 5 pillow cases which are used for bingo, and 8 quilts or blankets. The CS/E Committee is so very grateful for the support given to these endeavors. There were 192 items turnedin today. Norma did a drawing for \$50 for those who've supported Community Service and Marci Dickens won!

1st Vice President/Programs - Bonnie Walker introduced speaker Pat Smith with F.A.I.T.H. Pat gave thanks for the monetary gifts and the many food items donated today and explained that F.A.I.T.H. stands for *Families and Individuals Thanking Heroes*. Last year, recipients received two Christmas stockings and Pat shared about these gifts provided. Shipping cost per package is \$23.80/

box and there were 125 mailed last month. Pat shared of their work and the love that goes into it! LPQG family and friends in the military can be added to the monthly mailings if you so desire. The following are items that could be donated:

Wet-wipes, snacks, gum, mints, peanut butter crackers, hotel toiletries, ibuprofen, toothpaste, tooth brushes, dental floss, Vit-C drops, and drink mixes. Prepacked ketchup packages from What-A-Burger were also suggested. Toys are squeeze balls; wooden puzzles; dominoes; rubrics cubes, spiral notebooks, envelopes, pens, color pencils, and markers. Female boxes are sent every other month and Tampax is used in case they're wounded. QTips are welcome and are used to clean guns.

A donation from LPQG was presented to Pat Smith for F.A.I.T.H. by Bonnie.

A 20-minute break was taken at 10:19 for Guild members to purchase fabrics from Pearly June Viets, a local quilter who passed-away. Vicki shared information about Pearly June and advised that the proceeds will help to purchase her headstone. The Guild will receive 10% of these funds as per its guidelines.

F.A.I.T.H. – Lisa Jefferies had no report.

Fat Quarter of the Month – Sarah Bourne is out today due to tooth issues. Hold on to your fat quarters until next month.

Hospitality – Karen Lee gave thanks to everyone who contributed this morning.

Historian/Publication - Kay Hardy had no report.

Librarian – Sheila Robertson & Karen Lantron reported there are new magazines.

50/50, Birthdays, Visitors – Kathy Weeks is out today.

Bee Committee Reports

<u>Thursday Bee</u>: No longer does birthdays. Meets 9:30 – 2:30 at Escapees

<u>Quilts for Kids</u> meets on 2nd and 4th Tuesdays at The Red Barn/LaLa's Quilt Shoppe They have contributed over 2,900 quilts in 10 years!

<u>Sew & So</u> – Marci Dickens advised they meet the 4th Tuesday of the month at her home. Bring whatever you want to work on. Can provide a longarm if you're wanting to use it.

Donation Quilt & 2025 Tickets – Madi McMurry welcomed the Conroe Golden Needle Quilt Guild and encouraged members to visit her table.

Madi made contact with the Houston International Quilt Show and inquired about displaying and raffling our quilt. This could be done on Thursday, Friday, or Saturday; however, our bus trip is on Friday. Our Guild must provide 24 volunteer hours (12 at 2 hours each) for the booth; and 24 volunteer hours (12 at 2 hours each) to work the floor of the show. The quilt must be delivered in a pillow case and Madi will find out when the quilt should arrive. We have nine volunteers total so far. Madi will do a write-up and schedule for the Newsletter. Destiny Pennington volunteered for the first or last shifts as she's driving in. So far, this quilt has brought in \$2,200.

Donation Quilt Schedule – Madi McMurry advised the quilt will be in Nacogdoches tonight from 6 – 8pm. Marci Dickens volunteered to go with her. On Wednesday, Norma Christensen and Sharon Jeans take it to Willis for the Conroe Golden Needle Guild meeting. It's scheduled on Thursday night from 6 – 9pm for Bryan with the Brazos Bluebonnet Guild and Destiny Pennington and Jackie Burke volunteered to take it. On August 15 we need volunteers for the Waller County Piecemakers Guild in Hempstead.

Donation Quilt 2026 – Sarah Hiatt confirmed our quilt just went in for quilting.

Newsletter – Debbie Cox is taking ads for the Newsletter. Remember that submissions are due by Friday.

Sunshine & Shadows – Sarah Bourne is out ill. It was noted that Barbara Persinger had a knee replacement on May 12.

Stash Builder – Gail Kestler pulled the following names: Sharon Jeans, Sylvia Sills, and Kay Hardy.

Hometown Christmas – Kathie Hilton confirmed this event will be in December and we'll have a lot to be shown and a boutique.

Webmaster – Debbie Cox had no report.

Old Business

Vicki Wooddell reported the following:

The **bus trip** for the Houston Int'l. Quilt Show is October 10 and the cost is \$50 per person. Final payment due Sept 1. Donna Garland is taking these reservations and payments. So far there are 13 registered.

Treasurer Audit – Donna Garland confirmed the audit is finished and will be filed. Please contact Sharon Wright if you want to review it. Donna advised everything is in good order for the prior and current year.

Vicki discussed best practices for Committee Chairs which includes buying what's needed and requesting reimbursement. Keeping track of your expenses and donations during the fiscal year will make it easier to prepare future budgets.

The final numbers on the Quilt Show were reported by Donna Garland as follows:

Revenue \$11,413.83 Expenses \$7,015.04 Net Income \$4,398.79

Vicki reported that our September Meeting will be at Camp Cho-Yeh and will include time for the September Challenge and fellowship, too. Fabric for the Challenge is at LaLa's. After the meeting we can stay until 4pm and sew and socialize. The camp facilities were visited and there is sufficient room and lighting, though you may want to bring your own Ott light. Electricity is a potential concern if we have 50 machines, so please consider bringing handwork. There is not a refrigerator or cooking facilities, and we suggest bringing your own lunch and something to share. We will have a hospitality station. Vicki will get the name of the facility we will be in.

June Birthdays – Gail Kestler did the drawing and Patty Lawson and Madi McMurray won.

Programs - Bonnie Walker advised the following: June 30th (5th Monday) we will make small Quilts of Valor for Camp Hope from scraps. They need to be less than 60" x 80". Norma added that we do 36" x 45" for nursing homes.

<u>July</u> - Lisa Jefferies will hold a two-day workshop on a Four-Patch One Block Wonder July 14 & 15. Lisa has samples and a class supply list and you can sign-up with her. Bringing long extension cords and large mats for cutting the strips will be helpful.

<u>August</u> – LaDonyce Hamilton of LaLa's will have the program. She has many new fabrics and there's a lot that's 40% off. Christmas and Halloween fabrics are arriving now.



- 4 Bring back your totally finished project to the August 11th guild meeting where you will be giving it back to the original cook!



A Simple Guide To Squaring Up A Quilt November 11, 2020 by Miriam Ronne

Have you ever wondered how to square a quilt? Squaring up a quilt is such an essential step in quilt making.

It can make the difference between your quilt being a wonky creation to a truly square, beautiful masterpiece.

I know some of you are wondering, "Do you square up a quilt before adding borders?" or "Do you wait until right before you add your binding to square up your quilt?"

My answer is yes — to both questions! I try to square up my blocks, rows, quilt top and finished quilt sandwich after each step to ensure my quilts are as square as possible.

This post will walk you through step-by-step my method for squaring up a quilted quilt sandwich.

What Is Squaring Up a Quilt?

So what exactly does it mean to "square up a quilt?" It means all your corners are cut square at a 90° angle, and all your edges are cut straight.

This will make attaching your binding much easier, and when your quilt is laid out on a bed or folded neatly, it will look professionally made.

When I am piecing my blocks together, once a block is complete, I like to go ahead and "square it up" or make sure it is a perfect square to keep things uniform.

Keeping your blocks square will also help your overall quilt top be neat and straight throughout the entire quilt-making process.

Here are a few tips when you create your quilt top to help keep your quilt square:

- Iron each block before you cut into it to make it square. Make sure all your seams lay flat, and you have ironed out any creases.
- Measure twice, cut once. We all know this one, but it's good to remind yourself before each project.
- You can always cut more off, so take it slow and be sure your ruler doesn't slip.
- If at any point you cut too much, don't stress over it. Quiltmaking is an artform so treat it as such. Perfection is different for everyone.

Supplies You Will Need for Squaring Up Your Quilt

- Quilt Sandwich (completely guilted)
- Rotary Cutter
- Cutting Mat
- Square Ruler (for your corners)
- Long Ruler (or something you can use as a straight edge)
- Water Soluble Marker (optional, for marking your lines before you cut)

Let's Talk Batting!

Is there a right side and a wrong side?? And, what type batting should I use?

This is what I found. There are lots of opinions on the do's and don'ts in quilting. These are just a few things I found in a search for using different types of batting and whether there is a right or wrong side. I found that it all depends on who you ask! Here are just a few answers to this question. Also, check with what the manufacturer recommends.

FROM APQS:

"The "right side" vs. the "wrong side"

Batting that has been needle punched during its formation has a right side. Look at the batting and search for small pin holes or dimples in the batting. Needle-punching methods drive small needles from one side of the batting to the other as they compress the fibers together. These small holes will reveal the right side of the batting. You want your machine's needle to penetrate the batting in the same direction as the needle-punching machine.

The wrong side of the batting will have more slubs, which are tiny balls of batting. The wrong side looks much like a sweater that has been worn one too many seasons. If you have this side inadvertently facing up when you layer your quilt, your needle can catch one of these dense little balls of batting and try to force it back through the batting and out the back of the quilt, resulting in bearding."

Scrim binder is a thin sheet of polypropylene — very much like a dryer sheet — that is needle punched onto one or more sides of batting as it is processed. Not all scrim binders used today are alike. Pellon® batting uses only a very lightweight scrim. This adds strength and durability that is sought by machine workers yet allows softness and ease of stitch that everyone appreciates. Our scrim does not create heavy, dense and stiff results. When quilting your project, there is no right or wrong side of the batting to have face up during stitching."




