### **First Reading**

Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10

All the people of Israel gathered together into the square before the Water Gate. They told the scribe Ezra to bring the book of the law of Moses, which the LORD had given to Israel. Accordingly, the priest Ezra brought the law before the assembly, both men and women and all who could hear with understanding. This was on the first day of the seventh month. He read from it facing the square before the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of the men and the women and those who could understand; and the ears of all the people were attentive to the book of the law. And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people, for he was standing above all the people; and when he opened it, all the people stood up. Then Ezra blessed the LORD, the great God, and all the people answered, "Amen, Amen," lifting up their hands. Then they bowed their heads and worshiped the LORD with their faces to the ground. So they read from the book, from the law of God, with interpretation. They gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading.

And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, "This day is holy to the LORD your God; do not mourn or weep." For all the people wept when they heard the words of the law. Then he said to them, "Go your way, eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions of them to those for whom nothing is prepared, for this day is holy to our LORD; and do not be grieved, for the joy of the LORD is your strength."

#### **Second Reading**

1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

Just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body--Jews or Greeks, slaves or free--and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in

the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it.

Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But strive for the greater gifts.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."



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


#### Presider



### **Vestry Nominations**

#### **Deborah DeManno**

Nominee for Warden, (term until January 2024)

My connection with St. Lawrence Church began in 2009 when I attended the noon service on Ash Wednesday because it was convenient to my office in Lake Forest. Soon I attended the weekday morning service when my schedule permitted. While I continued to belong to an Episcopal church near my home in Evanston, I felt drawn to St. Lawrence for the welcoming community and focus on inclusive and accessible worship. I don't recall when I became a "full time" member of St. Lawrence Church - and maybe that is the point of this community; a seeker can feel at home here from their first visit. My support of the mission and ministries includes facilitating the Conversations that Matter Sunday forum (2016-2020), guiding Living Compass Circles as a trained community Wellness Advocate, being a mentor to a recent confirmand, reading the Prayers of the People/Intercessions, offering a few homilies during online worship in 2020, and serving on the Rector Search Committee (RSC).

My experience on the RSC was a powerful one, shaped by the stories we heard from the St. Lawrence community. It is because of my RSC experience that I accepted the invitation to stand as Warden. During the search, each rector candidate each asked us what was next for St. Lawrence? Our reply was that we really did not have an answer - because our community had not yet had a chance to dream of our future. We had been focused on the financial challenges of the building. Then we faced the pandemic and shutdown with an extended period without a full-time priest. Now, with our new Rector, we enter the period when we need to envision what kind of future we want to create together. It's not going to be easy, nor will the path always be clear - walking along a growing edge is like that. But our demonstrated resilience and how we live out our faith and stories can embolden us to take on this next challenge.

Speaking of stories, here is the rest of mine:

I was raised Roman Catholic in a northwest side working-class neighborhood of Detroit, where one's identity was anchored in the parish church your family attended. A key part of my formation was my twelve years of parochial school education with the Dominican Sisters. In high school I fell in love with biology and decided to be a scientist. I earned two degrees in Biological Sciences: a B.S. at Michigan Technological University and a Ph.D. from the University of Notre Dame. A postdoctoral position at Northwestern Med School brought me to Chicagoland.

Like many others, in my twenties I drifted away from church. My time at Notre Dame brought me back to the sacredness of community worship in groups small and large. But after I left campus and started working in Chicago, I had a harder time reconciling the exclusion of women and LGBTQ peo-

ple from the full life of the Catholic church. For a few years I was not part of any faith community. The sudden death of my mother when I was 33 started me on a period of searching, which led me to the Episcopal Church where I was received in 1991. At St. Luke's in Evanston, I was elected to two Vestry terms. I also served as the head of the Altar Guild and chaired the Worship Commission.

Professionally, I worked as a research scientist for 30 years, in both medical schools and in pharmaceutical industry R&D. My areas of research ranged from Reproductive and Women's Health to Metabolic Diseases (diabetes and obesity). After early retirement in 2017, I planned to spend my time traveling and enjoying my passion of photography. The Holy Spirit had other plans. Late in 2020 I completed a two-year training program to be a Spiritual Director/Guide. It might seem to be a big leap, but I see common threads connecting my roles of scientist and spiritual director. Both involve searching, careful observation, paying attention, and deep listening - whether it's understanding data or holding space for another's sacred story. I am humbled for the opportunity to bring my experiences to participate in the leadership of St. Lawrence Church.

**Jenny Speers** 

Nominee for Vestry (term until January 2025)

My daughter Natalie and I have been members of St. Lawrence for over 15 years since we moved to Vernon Hills shortly after I adopted Natalie from Russia. I am a lifelong Episcopalian, growing up attending Grace Episcopal Church in Sandusky, Ohio, where my family has belonged since the early 1900s. I also attended various Episcopal churches as I moved from Columbus to Cleveland to Cincinnati after college, and then to Chicago.

I earned a BA in Mathematics and Economics from Miami University in Ohio, and an MA in Economics from Ohio State University.
