I am just back from a couple of weeks in the UK and not much has changed in my bonsai garden in the time. It is just that time of the year.

I love seeing the trees in the UK at different times of the year and this time it was on the cusp of summer, although in the midlands that means temperatures up to a dizzying 18 if you are lucky, a bit like our coldest winter day. But the trees seem to have their own calendar, despite the temperature and are a picture of vigorous growth with masses of foliage. I went to a classic English event, a Tractorfest, in the grounds of an old property. These old places are the best place to go to see old trees! Being in the hands of the same family for hundreds of years means the trees are of very advanced age too. I have attached a couple here for inspiration. One is an Oak, not sure of the other relatively young one. At first glance they are not much like our native trees but that might be more about the leaves. They need more over there to catch enough light! There is still plenty about their shape to contemplate and apply to the shaping of our bonsai.

### Insight of a Bonsai beginner

They say that the last thing you learn and the hardest to master is watering, I am not sure I believe that! At this point in my bonsai journey I am thinking the art of wiring is possibly more difficult to master. Several of my trees will testify that my lack of understanding showing wiring scars and wounds making the tree unsightly and sometimes unusable not to mention the broken branches. This has come about as I have struck and grown a lot of cuttings and with them growing quickly and then needing to start the first movement early. I have found they require attention and early intervention for the wiring to be removed in the growing season at least every 14-20 days to be sure the wire is not biting into the bark. It's great if you can remember which one you did and when, but for me so I could remember I started to apply paint to pot name tags but found the cheap one I was using broke easily as they appeared not to be UV stabilized. I have found several different coloured name tags at an orchard show that I now use with success to manage the removal of my wiring.

Now I need to remember what colour identifies what wiring needs to be removed. Who reminds the reminder?

As I have wrote before I have been told each tree needs to tell a story so the photo of the tree on the right was taken as I walked in the Border Ranges National Park from a vine. Looks like the wire worn on some of my trees?? May be my story

### Flowers of the bonsaí patch

With our bonsai mainly being a leafy display most of the year, I started to think about how you could get several different trees to flower rotating over the four sessions.

Does the fruit of the fig substitute as a flower???

Or does the changing of the seasonal leaves??

Why not tell me what flower in your patch would qualify as a seasonal plant?

One of my flowering plums has now lost all its leaves as the season changes with several flowers starting to bud. A hover fly showed up as I was taking this image below. The hover fly and bees vote are for the flowers and not the colourful seasonal leaves.

Craig Jurd presented a demonstration to club members in April 2021 on forest plantings.


The plant saplings used in the forest are Clerodendrum and Lilly Pilly taken from cuttings from Karen's own trees.

The Melaleuca were from a batch that Nick had bought from a nursery and were a more advanced stock than the other two planting species. After the meeting in 2021 three members were invited to take home and maintain and care for the forest plantings. These were then brought back to the club for the May 2022 meeting to be reviewed and trimmed. This discussion session of trimming was led by Karen. Although more work is required on these trees it was decided to undertake more drastic action to the foliage when the weather warmed up.

Looking forward to the return of these forest plantings in Spring and watching the development over the coming years.

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Native Showcase factsheet

#### Melaleuca linarifolia

#### **Snow in Summer**

M. linariifolia is endemic to Eastern Australia. It is commonly known as snow-in-summer, narrow-leaved paperbark, flax-leaved paperbark. It is a hardy plant, flowering prolifically in late spring or summer, making it a popular garden shrub or small tree in temperate places. It will grow into a small tree to a height of 6–10 m with distinctive and attractive white or creamy white, papery bark and a dense canopy. Commonly sold as 'Snow in Summer' because of its profuse flowering it is commonly used as a street tree here and overseas. The 'Claret Tops' variety is more commonly used for bonsai, but the straight species has different characteristics making it a highly desirable bonsai species.
