## What's in your soil part 2

Following last month's excellent article from Tony on soils we are now presenting Part 2.

#### **KANUMA**

Even though it is different with it's pale yellow colour Kanuma is also a volcanic soil. It is mined near the city of Kanuma , 100km away from Toyoko. It is dried to 300 degrees after being mined. It has a pH of 5.5 which is more acidic than Akadama. Because of it's pH it is suited for plants that love acidic soil such as Azaela's and Camelias. Kanuma can promote fibrous roots and encourage oxygen in the soil. It's lightweight nature ensures it is free draining which can prevent root rot.

#### **COIR**

This is sourced from coconut husks and is a natural fibre. It is easily rehydrated and can hold approx. 8 times it's own weight in water. It aerates the soil which promotes root health and has a neutral pH. It has the advantage of being a sustainable product and is lightweight. Another advantage is that it does not shrink before rehydration, and it can contain up to 22% air.





# ORCHIATA PRECISION PINE BARK 3 – 6 mm

This product is also sustainable and sourced from radiata pine bark in New Zealand. It is a renewable product grown in plantations and is suitable for many different uses. The pH is balanced and it's air filled porosity is approx 50 %, as is it's water holding capacity. Because it is aged it does not suffer from nitrogen drawdown. Helps with aeration and is used in a mix to help with water retention.



#### **SAKADAMA**

This product is a kiln fired clay that is fired at 600 °C in a rotary kiln which creates a hard, wear resistant particle which retains the natural attapulgite clays absorbent properties. Sakadama is typically mixed with Pumice, Perlite, pine bark etc. to create an ideal growing mix for each Bonsai's specific climate. Sakadama promotes root growth and branch development. This is accomplished by the product being low density, improving drainage and increasing nutrient and moisture retention.

### **IN SUMMARY**

You can use these components in many different combinations. The club mix I retail contains equal parts scoria, zeolite and pine bark. Keiths mix which is similar to the mix Boon uses is Akadama, pumice and scoria. Pine bark can be added to this mix to retain more moisture. I have also been experimenting with a mix using coir and sakadama, which has mostly the same properties as Akadama. You must also use caution when changing your mix, especially when using a free draining or inorganic mix. NEVER put your best tree into a new mix until you try it in your micro climate and watering regime. Just because it works really well for Joe in Blogsville doesn't mean it suits you in your area. Another important aspect is particle size. The premixes I retail are put through a sieve and all particles are 3-6mm. This is very important – if you use the fine components they can settle to the bottom and stop the water draining. I grow on lots of species in or over a tray of water, and a free draining mostly inorganic mix presents no problem being wet all the time.

There is no right or wrong mix, just what works for you. Don't be afraid to experiment and see if there is something that can improve your trees.

## A Bonsaí Journey

I need to issue a warning ahead of reading the following it can be taken as "R" rated if talked about in mixed company or with family members.

I often look to varying my tree growing interests through air-laying, cutting and growing trees form seeds. Seeds give me the most pleasure seeing them break through the soil surface and I believe that trees grown from seeds deliver with more vigour early in it's development.

I removed several seeds from a small "Fukin Tea" that has been sitting not doing much in it's pot (please be careful of the annunciation). Putting six seeds into a small punnet within the first week they started to push through the soil and they have never stopped growing strongly.

I have now collected some fruit from Ligustrum Australianum (Australian Privet) where I will be washing the seeds and hope to germinate some new plants. The other Australian native that I have collected seeds from are Dansea Elliptica and hope to successfully germinate these as well.






- including water consumption, winter heating, collecting native or invasive species.












