In My Garden - June 2023

The cool weather has certainly arrived and with it a time when there is nothing really to be gained by anything more than the lightest touch on our trees. Best to allow them to marshal their resources for the spring.

And so, while there is not much to do right now with our collections there is always something happening of bonsai interest. Bimer are putting on an event in from July 14 to 16 which is all about the use of native species in bonsai. They are running it in collaboration with the Botanic Gardens at Mt Coot-tha and have engaged Marcella Fereira and Hugh Grant as demonstrators/tutors.

In the bonsai game, getting some exposure to a variety of ideas, approaches and aesthetics is very helpful to help refine our own choices and preferences as well as techniques. The event offers workshops and demonstrations, some paid and some not. Bookings are essential for the paid workshops.

An exhibition will also be mounted of only native trees and Bimer are looking for bonsai from all clubs in SEQ. Insight of a Bonsai beginner

In the last couple of newsletters in this column I have discussed growing trees from cuttings and seeds. I thought I would now discuss and hopefully encourage you to take on a quicker method in the form of air layering to cut down the time and to give you an instant tree to grow and develop.

When I first started growing plants and cuttings to start a bonsai what I then thought was the correct way which was sourced from multimedia was to grow the tree to have a large trunk. What I ended up with was several small trees in pots 5 foot high, but I did achieve thicker trunks but not in a form good enough to turn into a bonsai not in the short term anyway.

Having grown the material to work with and seeing a demonstration at the club some time ago I decided to give it a go. I started with air layering a Benjamina Fig as I thought it would be the easiest to start and using the three top branches of the tree I ended up with three trees what I hope will turn into bonsai.

Now all three have a good root structure where I can start to wire and cut back to initiate the shaping process. Also, a number of attempts failed where the callus tissue grew back over the Cambium layer, this happened on what I believed would have been the easiest tree, i.e. Chinese Elms and Natal Figs. I can only think they were in such a growth mode they rejoined the layers, later I had success when re-attempted.

I have achieved great success with Melalaleuca linarifolia where they looked have the fastest to obtain root growth of all the trees I have tried.

Although I started to air layer as a bonsai learning lesson and to understand the idiosyncrasies of trees I know have the understanding to be able undertake the process to a treasured tree and have the knowledge and tools to undertake a successful procedure.

Has anyone else tried air layering and on what trees and what are your learning outcomes?

Native Showcase factsheet

Banksia spinulosa

Hairpin Banksia

Banksia spinulosa, the hairpin banksia, is a species of woody shrub, native to eastern Australia. Widely distributed, it is found as an understorey plant in open dry forest or heathland from Victoria to northern Queensland. It generally grows as a small shrub to 2 metres in height, though can be a straggly tree to 6 metres. It has long narrow leaves with flowers which can vary considerably in colour from black, purple, red, orange or yellow. The hairpin banksia's floral display and fine foliage have made it a popular garden plant with many horticultural selections available. With the recent trend towards smaller gardens, compact dwarf forms of Banksia spinulosa have become popular; the first available, Banksia 'Birthday Candles', has achieved a great deal of commercial success and wide recognition, and has been followed by several others. There are more than 75 species of banksia across Australia and can be found in many habitats. They are often used in bonsai cultivation. Banksia are one genus of a small number of native trees which are intolerant of one of the primary ingredients of garden fertilizer, phosphate.
