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In My Garden

Coming out of winter

It's mid-July and feeling like winter with another cold blast on its way. Let's not forget that the first week of August is usually our coldest. Deciduous trees can be root pruned now but it still probably is a little early for the evergreens.

Speaking of the deciduous trees, it is a great time before they start shooting to treat any surface conditions they might have, like lichen or algae. Some might still be in leaf while others relatively bare. My three Celtis always are in various states of leaf this time of year, from green to yellow to gone. So any time in the next couple of weeks the old leaves can all be stripped to give easy access for treatment. Lime sulphur is the go to seasonal tonic. Zinc sulphate is best for lichen. For trident maples which may suffer fungal leaf curl then the copper fungicide is an important pre-emergent treatment. Mancozeb can also do that job but make sure you use a wetting agent to get it into the smallest spaces around the buds.

For those of us with developing pre-bonsai that we plan to give a hard seasonal starting prune there are a couple of decisions to ponder. Last year was a delayed spring, the cold weather went on much longer than expected.

Hard pruned trees took much longer to re-shoot, and some didn't. While they are in that danger zone with pruned roots and branches for a prolonged period they are at risk of water logging. So starting early is not risk free and there is little to be gained by doing so. Another alternative widely practiced is to separate the root pruning from the branch pruning by waiting for new growth to be evident; prune to be followed a few weeks later with the branch pruning.

Another strategy is to leave a larger gap by root pruning in mid-autumn and branch prune in mid-spring. And yet another is to space out the root pruning throughout the growing season. Each to his own and all these ideas are practised successfully. While we prepare to emerge from winter there is no rush, the growing season is long.

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Insight of a Bonsai Beginner

In the last article I mentioned that I have been travelling for some 8 weeks leaving the care of my Bonsai and plants to a family member. The last time I went on holiday my son lost 20% of his inheritance with the failure of his plant husbandry skills. I am now pleased to advise that he has been able to claw back 10% of these losses this time. Each time I leave my trees to their own devices or a family member I learn more about how to manage my auto watering system and family member (Maybe).

The small losses I had this time were due to the placement of smaller pots in between my larger trees believing the auto watering system would keep them moist and that if they weren't the manual watering by the family member would capture them. It was probably not seeing the trees from the forest syndrome. Some of my trees and last summer's cuttings I was able to strike, I allowed to sit in trays of water. This method seems to have been successful on this occasion as I was worried about the cooler weather and plants sitting with wet feet. All in all, it was a great holiday and I feel secure with a few more watering techniques and improvements to the watering system I will be able to confidently travel again.



In discussion with Steve on a *Dansiea Elliptica* where the leaves are showing yellowing, he advised that the use of an Iron Chelate may fix the problem. But with the strong wind we have been experiencing this week the problem identified itself when the pot was blown over. This clearly showed the roots were not penetrating the bottom media but were growing feeder roots in the top of the pot. This is obviously due to it sitting in water and not allowing the roots full use of the pot. This is one of the problems identified due to using an auto watering system when away. As *Dansiea Elliptica* occurs in lowland dry rainforests, so understanding this I will make adjustments to how I manage this problem and other plant watering when I am away for long periods.

The 10th Symposium on Australian Plants as Bonsai

Treacy Centre, Parkville. August 31 – September 1, 2024.

The Victorian Native Bonsai Club will, for the third time, host the Australian Native Plants as Bonsai Symposium. The Symposium will be held at the Treacy Centre in Parkville, close to the Melbourne CBD. It is intended to continue the strong work of previous Symposiums, inspiring Bonsai enthusiasts to work with, and encourage people to grow Australian native plants as Bonsai. Together with the Symposium, The Victorian Native Bonsai Club will present an exhibition of Australian Native plants as Bonsai.

The Symposium will include:

- Eucalypt Presentation and Discussion on species currently being grown, and the possibilities that exist among little used Eucalypt species.
- Experiences with rarely used species and discussion on styling Australian Plants as Bonsai
- A demonstration using Yamadori material
- Workshops (own native stock)
- Critique of selected Exhibition trees
- Native forest planting
- An invitation to a Yamadori dig on the Monday after the weekend Symposium at a property in Bend of Islands near Kangaroo Ground.

The presenters on the weekend are Marcela Ferreira, Stephen Cullum, Kevin Ritchie, Craig May, and Quentin Valentine.

There is a \$170 registration fee for the weekend, or \$85 for single day registrants. Registrants will have unlimited access to the Exhibition and Sales Area over the weekend.

- Sunday Workshops are priced at - Participants \$60 each, and Observers \$20. Own tree, tools and wire required. (*Numbers will be limited to 12 participants working with 3 tutors. 4 Participants per workshop*).
- Workshop Tutors are Marcela Ferreira, Stephen Cullum and Quentin Valentine. Choose your preferred tutor, do not be disappointed and book early.
