In My Garden - October 2023

I don't know if anyone else is suffering this problem at the moment, but it seems I have furry night visitors with a taste for my bonsai. When you root prune a developing tree and bare prune the branches the wait for a return to life can be worrying, but then to have the eventual new shoots eaten is very disheartening.

It's been a typical dry start to summer but it's really dry and has been for quite a while and there certainly isn't the usual profusion of growth and flowering of plants in the garden or bushland beyond. Our friendly magpies follow us around in the hope of a handout as the usual spring flush of bugs and lawn grubs is not there for them to feed on.

So, the little furry critters are hungry too. First a nibble and then a bite. I'm pretty sure they are rats not possums having been through this cycle previously. Wherever there are people there are rats, unfortunately. More-so I think if the same people keep chickens! So, I've been putting out lots of bait, (in containers accessible only through small spaces) on the ground rather than attract them onto my benches but it's pretty surprising how much of this stuff they've eaten in the last week. And they keep coming back.

As a deterrent I've even bought a 10 pack of flowering marigolds and put them around my benches along with some potted garlic chives. These are apparently smells that deter possums and perhaps rats too. Since then, no more nibbles and all the action is on the ground. I've even bought some Possum Off but with all the watering reapplication is a problem and so I'm not sure if it is even effective.

It was suggested to me that you can buy solar/battery blinking fairy lights that keep critters away. Has anyone found these useful or any other cunning scheme to beat the beasts??





Insight of a Bonsai beginner

As the weather is now warming up, I thought an excellent subject to discuss would be the art of watering. Sometimes our bonsai become too wet or to dry or newly potted or the pot is just root bound and repels the water.

But what I would like to discuss is the watering system you can use while on holiday. (Early my first way was to use the strategy of "HOPE" this was a failure) I have over the last number of years inducted family members into the watering regime with the discussion around their inherence if the job is not undertaken with enthusiasm. Although this has been somewhat successful with only one of my family member's losing 20% of their inheritance.

As the family method is not sustainable, I decided to build an automatic watering system. The first timer was a low-cost mechanical dial timer that was given to me, but this failed in the first ten days. I then invested in a single output Orbit digital battery timer which I found to be easily programmed and then upgraded to a four-station external solenoid output model which has served me well to date.

With the expansion of my collection of bonsai and with some of the trees needing different watering patterns (Linarifolia just cannot get enough water on warm days) I have now upgraded to a Holiman eight station unit which runs on 240 Volts and can be controlled through the internet from anywhere you have phone data access. I have integrated this with the Orbit battery system so both are activated a little after each other to ensure if one fails the other will continue to water the plants. It may be a little over kill but when you invest five + years into growing and developing a tree better safe than sorry.

This is only where the story begins because the type off sprays you can use only adds to the intrigue. I started with misting sprays but after discussion with an experienced club member who uses side sprays as the canopy forms a drip line and water misses the pot, I have now trialled a side stray method myself to ensure all plants have adequate moisture. It is an ongoing journey and experiment to develop a perfect reliable watering system.

As this is a key subject for everyone it would be great to share your experience and trials on how you manage your watering or what watering system have you installed and that works for you. What type of controller and spray do you use??? Would you like "Watering" included as topic in one of our meetings?

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
