Hugh has practiced bonsai for over 20 years and has interned under Ryan Neil at Bonsai Mirai (USA) where he was exposed to American native material in both classic and locally derived interpretations. This study of bonsai in a Western context, allowed for a layered learning experience that he applies to Australian native species to create local aesthetics.

### In My Garden with Steve C Oct 2024

Many people will know that I have been a bit of a native species hunter for some time. Well that's when you identify a species you'd like to try and then set about to acquire one. The hunt might involve searching stock lists of tube stock nurseries within the range of the target, and perhaps taking the opportunity to visit them as well.

Native Plants Australia have branches in many places, with seed collectors, seed banks and occasionally nurseries. They also often have annual plant sales where uncommon species are offered for sale. The hunt could also involve roaming up and down country roads looking for examples of the target species to acquire seeds or cuttings. Working the network of native bonsai enthusiasts near the target range can also occasionally bear fruit.

The quandongs (Elaeocarpus) in Australia are a genus of rainforest trees which bear a purple seed fruit. The blueberry ash is one that is the most well-known. I have this one as well as two other species and find them to be excellent bonsai subjects. With that sort of experience, the obvious question is 'are there any other with the requisite qualifications, principally smaller rather than larger leaves?' As it happens there is one called Elaeocarpus holopetalus. It can be found in subtropical to temperate rainforest from the Queensland border to east Gippsland in Victoria. No one is growing it and no one is selling it, anywhere. Just makes me want to try harder.

Thankfully Atlas of living Australia identified a location in New England. A quick trip over the long weekend yielded the attached photo of the target. Now all I have to do is work out when they flower, how long it takes for the fruit to ripen and the rules about collecting a few seeds! I hope you've enjoyed this small window into my native world and perhaps have been encouraged to go hunting yourself.











### Jade as Bonsaí October 2024
