

















### William T. Bruce, Jr.



William (Bill) Thomas Bruce, Jr., of Dallas, Texas, passed away peacefully of natural causes on April 15, 2023, surrounded by three generations of his family. He was born on January 5, 1939, in the family home on Dallas Street in Port Neches, Texas, to William Thomas Bruce, Sr., and Frances Willard Ritchie. Bill spent his formative years in Port Neches where he enjoyed playing baseball and building things with his brother and cousins, who seemed to live on every nearby street! He also ran track for Port Neches-Groves Junior High and High School and reportedly still holds a PNG polevaulting record. Bill graduated 3rd in his class as High Boy in 1957 from the first combined PNG Class.

Bill attended The University of Texas at Austin, graduating in January 1962 with a Bachelor of Science in

Mechanical Engineering (BSME). While at UT, Bill worked as head waiter at Helen M. Kirby Hall dormitory, where he met Dorothy Jean Odom, a resident there; they married in July 1960. He and Dorothy began married life in Austin, before moving to Dallas, then to California, and eventually returning to Texas, making Dallas their lifelong home. They also enjoyed their lake house in Palestine, Texas, with family and friends.

After a brief stint at Proctor and Gamble managing production of Ivory soap, he joined Rocketdyne as a propulsion test engineer for the F-1 engines used on the Saturn V rocket as part of NASA's Apollo program. Bill was the lead engineer on one of the F-1 engine test stands located on the side of a mountain at Edwards Air Force Base in California; noteworthy is that he conducted more than 100 F-1 engine test firings without a failure. There he also began his parental volunteer duties, such as building and spray painting glow-in-the-dark decorations in his garage for his daughter's first ice-skating recital. Returning to Texas, Bill worked as a systems engineer with Collins Radio Company on airborne navigation and communication systems for the U.S. Navy's TACAMO and the U.S. Air Force's Nightwatch aircraft. While at Collins, Bill was the program manager on the 4th-generation airborne trailing wire antenna system; this system is still operational today and enables vital communications with the U.S. nuclear submarine fleet. He spent his later years at Rockwell International and E-Systems as a project engineer and manager working on low-observable (stealth) technologies such as those used on the F-117 fighter jet. Bill's work spanned both commercial and military aviation, ranging from small planes and helicopters to Air Force One and Strategic Air Command aircraft.

Bill was passionate about his family, coaching and refereeing soccer, and all things related to Texas Longhorn football and the Longhorn Band. He held Longhorn football season tickets and enjoyed them even more while watching both his children and grandchildren march in the Longhorn Band and Alumni Band.

Bill and Dorothy enjoyed Square Dancing as well as meeting up with all sorts of family all over the U.S. for genealogy and fellowship during their more than 30 years of membership in the National Odom Assembly.

One of his favorite things was being surrounded by his family. Dorothy, Cathy, Tom, Bob, Sara Beth, and John truly appreciate the love and care shown to Bill during his final week as Max, Judie, Karen, David, Linda, and Andy helped us see to his every need and made him laugh and smile with stories and tales of our lives together. So many other family and friends were there in spirit or by phone call including Bill and Sue Hines, his favorite Australian Royal Flying doctors. We are grateful for visitors from his Sunday School class and for friends who brought us meals. We deeply appreciate his caregivers at Baylor Scott & White Medical Center in Plano who provided us what we needed. They also let all of us be with Bill around the clock while we said goodbye.

In lieu of flowers, anyone who would like to honor Bill's memory and wishes to make a donation should consider The Alzheimer's Foundation, The Alzheimer's Association, the University of Texas Cockrell School of Engineering, or the Longhorn Alumni Band Scholarship Fund.

Bill was preceded in death by his parents, and his sister, Frances Willard Buffer (Jim) of Sacramento. Bill is survived by his wife of 62 years Dorothy Odom Bruce, brother Maxallen Lee Bruce (Judie) of Houston, daughter Catherine Bruce Purdy (Bob) of Austin, son Thomas Howard Bruce of Plano, grandchildren Sara Beth Purdy and John Thomas Purdy of Austin, and his many beloved cousins, nieces, and nephews stretching from Texas to California.

Family and friends held a Celebration of Bill's (and his wife Dorothy) meeting and early married life in Austin, Texas starting at Kirby Hall followed by a tour of all their favorite UT spots and first homes on June 10.

A Graveside Service will be held at 11 am on July 15<sup>th</sup>, in his hometown of Port Neches, Texas, at Port Neches Oak Bluff Memorial Park Cemetery with an additional Family Memorial Celebration in Rusk, Texas at 11 am on Dec 9 at Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Isaac Charles Parker, also known as "Hanging Judge" Parker held court in Ft. Smith Arkansas. In 21 years on the federal bench, Judge Parker tried 13,490 cases. In more that 8,500 of these cases, the defendant either pleaded guilty or was convicted at trial. Parker

sentenced 150 people to death; 79 were executed, 81 either died while incarcerated, were pardoned or had their sentenced commuted.

**Jimmy Ray Odom**, a beloved husband, father, grandfather, and friend, passed away on June 5, 2023, at the age of 87 in Palestine, Texas. He was born on February 7, 1936, in Frankston, Texas, to William Seale Odom and Bertha Pauline Dickey. His late siblings include Sara, Birdie, Betty, Wallace, and Joe. His surviving brother, Jerry Odom, remains to cherish his memory.

At Palestine High School, Jimmy crossed paths with the love of his life, Kathy Odom. They formed an unbreakable bond and embarked on a journey filled with love, laughter, and mutual support. Together, they raised two sons, Jimmy Earl, residing in Aurora, Colorado, and Jerry "Randy" Odom, residing in Lake Charles, Louisiana. Jimmy took great pride in his family, and his grandson, Jake Odom, and wife Jessica, who live in Palestine, were especially dear to his heart. He always ensured that Jake had everything

he needed to thrive, embodying the role of an extraordinary grandfather.

Throughout his life, Jimmy was dedicated to preserving history, particularly in Anderson County. He invested countless hours in researching and contributing to historical markers, leaving a lasting impact on the community. Jimmy's passion for history extended to his personal pursuits as well, as he tirelessly researched his own family tree. In 1980, he played a pivotal role in founding the National Odom Assemble, an organization that continues to hold annual meetings to this day.

Jimmy was a man of diverse interests and hobbies. He was an avid fisherman, a gold glove boxer (a fact he proudly shared with others), and a staunch advocate for causes he believed in. As a yellow dog democrat, a NRA member, and a man with strong opinions, Jimmy never hesitated to express his thoughts, leaving a lasting impression on those who knew him. His slow driving speed was the stuff of legends, and he would often humorously conclude conversations with his trademark line, "Glad you got to see me." He loved classic country music and could talk for hours about Hank Williams or Lefty Frizzell.

Jimmy's indomitable spirit and unique personality made him an unforgettable presence in the lives of many. While some loved him wholeheartedly, others may have held differing opinions, but no one could deny his impact. His journey from humble beginnings, living in a logging tent with a sawdust floor, to building a magnificent lake house on Circle R, exemplified his perseverance and determination. Jimmy Ray is survived by sons Jimmy Earl and Randy Odom, grandsons, Jake, Malachi and Austin and grandaughter Lindsey, daughter in law Robin, granddaughter-in-law, Jessica, and his nieces and nephews, Jennifer, Susan, and Jeffrey. 












# Asheville, North Carolina

Laurel, Lynn and I are so excited to be the hosts for the gathering in 2024. Be saving your pennies for the crown of the event, the Biltmore Estate.

George Vanderbilt, grandson of famed shipping entrepreneur and industrialist Cornelius "the Commodore" Vanderbilt, first visited Asheville, North Carolina, in 1888. Captivated by the area's natural beauty, he slowly began purchasing land, ending up with 125,000 acres for what would become his country estate. Determined to make this a self-sustaining home, George enlisted architect Richard Morris Hunt to design and build the 250-room château. Landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted was also hired to create formal gardens and transform the former farmland into a beautiful pastoral landscape.

Biltmore House officially opened to family and friends on Christmas Eve, 1895. George Vanderbilt had a beautiful new family home, but as America's most eligible bachelor of his time, no one to share it with.



That all changed on April 28, 1898, when he proposed to E d i t h Stuyvesant Dresser. A family friend, Edith was 10

years younger

than George and admired for her beauty and



personality. She was hailed as cosmopolitan and cultured, yet humble and down to earth. The couple shared a passion for learning and travel that they enjoyed throughout their marriage.

On June 1, 1898, George and Edith were joined as husband and wife in a private 15-minute civil ceremony in a town hall in Paris, France. The next day, they followed French tradition with a religious ceremony at the American Church of the Holy Trinity in Paris. Close friends and family were invited to this ceremony, which was surprisingly simple and modest considering the media fanfare that

surrounded the event.

quiet Italian honeymoon followed, and then George brought his bride to Biltmore Estate. Estate employees welcomed Edith to her new home by lining uр



along the Approach Road. A giant horseshoe made out of goldenrod flowers with the phrase "Welcome Home" greeted the couple as they arrived at Biltmore House.

The happy couple added to their family on August 22, 1900, with the birth of their daughter Cornelia. It was a joyous occasion celebrated among the family and recorded by local newspapers. The *Spartanburg Journal* wrote, "A new star has appeared at famous Biltmore, and the charming mistress of this most gorgeous home is smiling upon her first born, a tiny girl called Cornelia Stuyvesant Vanderbilt, and the world shares in her new found happiness."

Cornelia spent her childhood at Biltmore, and often played with the local children whose families lived and worked on the estate. When Cornelia was 13, tragedy struck when her father George unexpectedly died following an emergency appendectomy in Washington, D.C. in March 1914. Mrs. Vanderbilt returned to the estate after her husband's death, but eventually consolidated the family businesses and properties.

A decade later, wedding bells rang as Cornelia married the Honorable John Francis Amherst Cecil at All Souls Church in Biltmore Village on April 29, 1924. It was a wonderful celebration as guests from around the world descended upon the quiet little town of Asheville. John Cecil was a British diplomat and a descendant of Lord Burghley, who was High Treasurer to Queen Elizabeth I. A second generation arrived at Biltmore House a year later. George Henry Vanderbilt Cecil was born in Biltmore House in 1925. Three years later, William Amherst Vanderbilt Cecil was born in Biltmore House. George and abroad in Switzerland and England, but

always returned home to Biltmore for holidays and summer vacations.

The brothers were instrumental in caring for the estate as adults. William especially was involved in overseeing the care of Biltmore House, the estate, and The Biltmore Company. Today, Biltmore remains a family business, with the fourth and fifth generations of George Vanderbilt's descendants involved in day-to-day operations. Along with more than 2,000 employees, they continue Biltmore's mission to preserve this national treasure.

What began as my great-grandfather's estate continues to thrive as a timeless experience for today's guests. Biltmore is still family-owned, and we are still passionate about our mission of preservation through self-sufficiency—a philosophy embraced before the first stone was ever placed. BILL CECIL
