NEWS from the LAKE:

- On Saturday August 12, word has it that over 70 pirates landed in Deering Lake! Like a roving group of loons, this pack of marauders stayed just long enough to have fun in the sun and eat lots of hotdogs before moving on to their next port-of-call. Shiver me timbers... will they return next year...?!
- Thanks to Jen Batistello who found the benthic cyanobacteria in Campbell Cove, and her very prompt
 reporting to the DLIA community. Her report to NH DES lead to Deering Lake being listed for several
 weeks as a "Cyanobacteria Alert". Unfortunately, this weekly report did not explain the difference
 between benthic and planktonic cyanobacteria, which was alarming to many Deering residents who
 were not aware of the difference. Thankfully, a member of the Deering community (not on the lake)
 contacted DES to point out that their report was misleading, and the state has since removed Deering
 from their alert report, and is also reconsidering how best to report the different sorts of cyanobacteria
 outbreaks in the future. The one bit of good news to come out of this: local folks think the crowds at
 the town beach may have been a smaller due to the misleadingly scary reports. Lemonade, anyone?
- Our one surviving loon chick is thriving; it is difficult to tell it from the mature loons. The parents have been giving it flying lessons you may have noticed them chasing it around the lake to get it to lift off. You may see it on fly-bys- you will usually see more loons flying around this time of year.
- The last water test was performed this week with a state biologist on board, who commented that of all the lakes he's tested this summer, ours is one of the best for water clarity. Thanks to Glenn Clark and Henry Bozek for all the work they have put into this.

NEWS from and for LAKE FOLKS:

Deering Natural Resources Inventory:

At our May meeting Gary Samuels gave us an overview of the work being done by the Deering Conservation Commission. Since that time, a website to <u>Deering's Natural Resources Inventory</u> has been made available.

The Conservation Commission worked with the Central New Hampshire Planning Commission and Deering residents to develop a series of maps that show where important natural resources are found in our town: water sources; rich wildlife habitat areas; hiking trails; the biggest trees. See where Deering most fertile farm and forest soils are found, important for local food production and sequestration and storage of carbon. The study highlights those parts of town that are likely to be more resistant to the changing climate. You can see where your piece of Deering fits in the natural background of town.

(Also- Gary will be speaking about local fungi at the Schoolhouse/Library this Saturday, Aug 26 at 11).

MEET YOUR NEIGHBORS: Baldwin family history on Deering Reservoir

My grandmother, Birgit Baldwin, purchased our land in 1946 from Rev. William Abernethy, while she and her children were boarding at the Ellsworth farm because my grandfather, Henry Baldwin, was serving in the military in Europe. A camp was built that summer for sleeping and when my grandfather returned a boathouse was built on the site of our new camp. That boathouse had been expanded to include a small kitchen and a deck for dining and eventually a living room with an upstairs bedroom.

"Camp", as it was called by my father and my aunts and uncle, was the center of their summer activity. Camp was left to my aunt Harriet Bryan when my grandparents died. My wife and I purchased it from Harriet in 2016 since she was looking for someone else in the family to take it over. By the time we purchased the property the original camp had deteriorated to the point where it was beyond repair. My siblings and I spent a lot of time during our summers visiting camp and the whole family had developed a love for being here, spending most of our time in various boats or just swimming off the old dock which still exists, with a raft anchored a short swim away.

But it was clear that the old camp had reached the end of its useful life and, and as an architect I started dreaming of ideas for a new structure to replace it. Its location facing the broadest part of the lake to the South with both sunrise and sunset visible from the dock is unique on the lake. I designed the new camp in 2019, to use the same footprint as the old camp and commissioned Dave King to build it in 2020. We're thrilled with Dave's great craftsmanship and are hoping that the new camp will be enjoyed by our family for many decades to come.

We continue to spend a lot of time there each summer and are now actually able to spend time in the spring and fall as well, since the new camp is built to be a year-round home. Our family and relatives stay at camp when we are not there, so the property continues to be well used and we are carrying on with my aunt's policy of letting our family stay there when they please. We feel very fortunate to be able to enjoy this beautiful lake!
