

NEWS FROM DEERING LAKE | June 2023

NEWS from the LAKE:

- It looks like the loons in the Campbell Cove area aren't going to have a successful nest this year, but the North Cove pair had two chicks by Sunday, June 11. By Thursday it was clear there were problems: one chick was pecking and harassing its sibling, which resulted on Friday in the parents leaving the one behind. An odyssey for the abandoned chick ensued it traveled by itself across the entire lake, with various folks watching it as it traveled south, finally being spotted by the sand bar. Glenn Clark had been in contact with the Loon Preservation Committee which recommended it be captured and brought to Wings of Dawn, a non-profit wildlife rehabilitation center and bird sanctuary in Henniker. Glenn and Henry Bozek netted the chick and transported it in a bucket of water—a dinner of shiners was ready for it upon arrival. Sadly, it was severely undernourished and did not survive. Note: the rehabbing of loon chicks has had limited success, but this one would have no chance of surviving on the lake alone. (Donations to Winds of Dawn always appreciated). Sibling rivalry in Common Loon chicks has not been well studied- here's a short older article, fyi.
- Over 40% of *adult* loon mortality is still due to the ingestion of lead fishing tackle. If you have any lead tackle or sinkers, please bring them to the next DLIA meeting on July 8. We will transfer it to the Loon Preservation Committee for proper disposal.
- As mentioned at our May meeting, we have concerns regarding an invasive plant and fish in our area. <u>Purple Loosestrife</u> grows in the border areas of shorelines and was growing in Deering Lake last year. If you see this, please contact <u>Jen Battisello</u> or your local weed watcher. <u>Green Sunfish</u> are aquarium fish that people have been dumping in local waters; they have been found in the Piscataquog River (Deering Lake is its headwater). The link advises actions to be taken; DO NOT THROW BACK! Notify DES and Jen Battisello if you locate this species.
- An early water test (VLAP) was performed due to concerns with run off associated with the logging. Results are pending. Next test is in July.

NEWS from and for LAKE FOLKS:

Bob Compton and Bob Carter (Deering resident, not on the lake) led a panel discussing the establishment of the Deering Watershed Protection Overlay at the 2023 Lakes Congress. It is remarkable how many lakes in NH do not have Watershed Protection Zones, and many that do only include shorefront properties. Deering residents should be proud to recognize that the plan that was put in play by Compton, Kaplan, Carter and others has been used as a model for other towns (including Sunapee). <u>Slides to many of the presentations</u> are available; of special recommendation are <u>Introduction to Aquatic Plant Identification</u> and <u>Demystifying Shoreland Permitting</u>

Many thanks to Henry Bozek and Pam Trombino for hosting our Spring Fling DLIA Kickoff event. There were close to 40 folks who enjoyed a (rare) sunny day with delicious brunch offerings. Live music was provided by Ray Sousa of Chipmunk Lane, and Tom Walters of White Gate produced some drone footage that we'll try to get on the DLIA website. Next event is the Deering Diners' Club with Ben and Angie Barkhouse on July 15.

Independence Day Fireworks: There does not seem to be consensus about when local fireworks will be displayed this year – the problem with the Tuesday holiday. Please be thoughtful of animals, veterans and others with PTSD, and noise ordinances (10pm) – and *stay safe everyone!*

Several lake folks have mentioned concerns <u>regarding excessive lighting at night</u>. While the overall impact of light pollution on New Hampshire wildlife is quite small in comparison to other threats, **artificial lighting disturbs flight, navigation, vision, migration, mating, and feeding in some insects, birds and other wildlife.** It is recommended that we turn off lights that are not needed, or direct lights downward/provide shields whenever possible when illumination is needed. Every little bit helps – thank you!

The next ROADSIDE CLEANUP will be held on Saturday, July 22, leaving at 9am from the town hall. Plan to arrive early to get a vest and to be assigned a team. We (the DLIA) do about 2 miles along Deering Center Road; it usually takes about an hour. Thanks to Glenn and Carole Clark for running this 3 times every year.
