“Lord, help me to live more like a tree.” That was my prayer during my silent retreat. It may seem like a peculiar kind of prayer, but it will make more sense. The revelation I received while sitting inside a deer stand brought me insight into how God would like us to live our lives. Here is my story.

It was a Thursday evening. The weather was near perfect. I left the shack I was staying in and made my way to a deer stand that sat on the edge of a clearing in the woods. As I sat in the deer stand, the fields in front of me became alive with God’s living creatures. Watching them, God spoke to me through each one and taught me something about life. The first thing I noticed was a fresh hatch of bugs. The only thing separating me from them was a piece of plexiglass used as a window. I watched these bugs fly aimlessly in the air. Although they stayed together as a community, there was no direction. There was no purpose. They would bump into each other trying to keep close to the bugs around them. There was no leader to guide them, but those around them. This community of bugs reminded me of the unbelievers of the world. They gather in groups, whether that be sporting events, education, or even atheist churches, they are “flying around” in this life with no direction or purpose. Would I want to live a life like that?

Then my attention was pulled to a sand crane swooping down right in front of me. It landed maybe ten yards away and began to search for food. This process consisted of the crane grabbing a clump of dirt from the ground and sifting through it for possible grub. Sometimes it would find something tasty, other times it was just dirt. This bird did not know where its meal would come from, or even if it would get a meal. There are people who live their lives like this, wondering where their next meal will come from or even if they will be fed. Would I want to live a life like that?

At the same time this crane was looking for food, a white-tailed deer came wandering in looking for food as well. She would bend down, take a few bites of the grass growing, then quickly look up. Any sound or smell would send this deer into high alert. This process would continue for several minutes. A couple bites of grass followed by a quick scan of her surroundings. This deer lived in constant fear. People live just like the deer. They are afraid of a virus, they are afraid of the government, or afraid of other people. They are constantly looking over their shoulder. Would I want to live a life like that?

Then the Holy Spirit directed my focus on a line of trees growing on the edge of the field. These trees contain the same life inside of them as the bugs, crane, and deer. They depend on sunlight, water, nutrients from the soil, and carbon dioxide to survive. The only things the tree has to be afraid of is their Creator and His image bearers, but they live where they are planted. They rely solely on God for their meals, not wondering where the next one is coming from. Not only that but their roots dig down deep in the ground and actually intertwine with other tree roots. This makes them stronger and able to withstand the nasty elements of a storm. Above the ground their branches grow up and reach towards the sun.

“Lord, help me to live more like a tree.” Make my roots dig deep in Your Word. Let them intertwine with the roots of others in Your church, making us stronger together and able to withstand the storms of life. Help me not be consumed by the worries of this life and be completely dependent on You, trusting that every meal will be provided and that I will grow where You have planted me. God, give me branches that bear much fruit. And just like the tree, may my arms always be reaching up towards the Son. Psalm chapter one says the person who delights in the Law of the Lord, who meditates on it day and night is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season, and whose leaf does not wither—whatever they do prospers. Lord, help me to live like a tree. Amen.

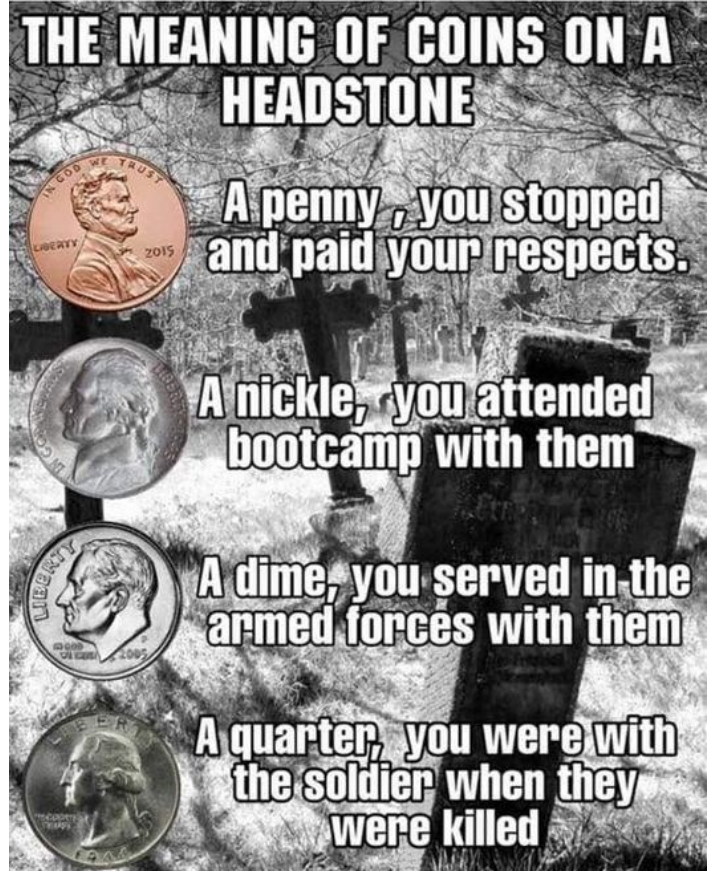


HOW TO TELL IF YOU'RE FROM MINNESOTA

Memorial Day is coming so if you visit a cemetery don't remove the coins as they have meaning.



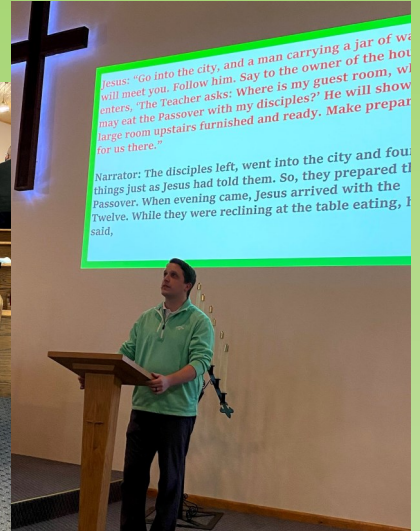
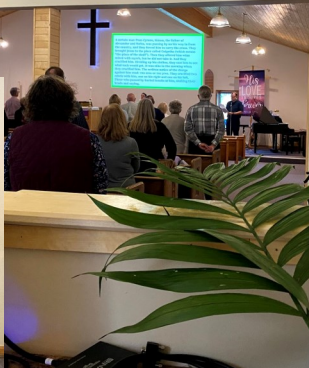

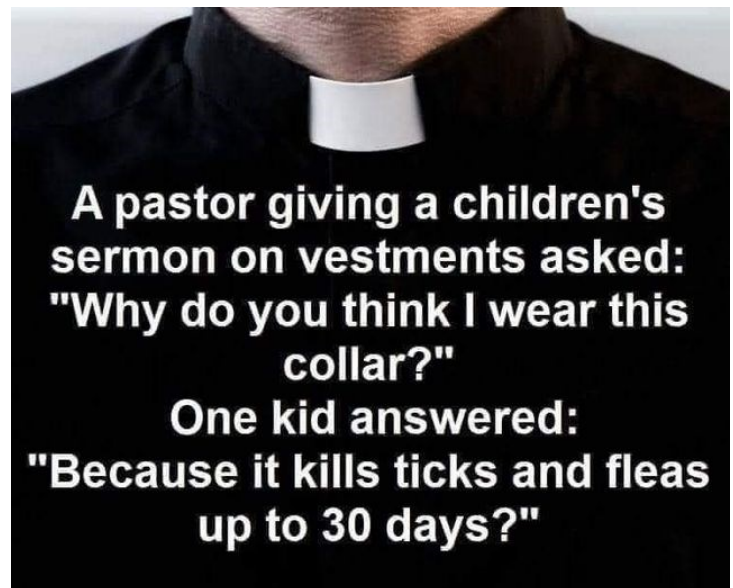
Congratulations Tom and Pillager High School Culinary Team!!!! We are proud of you!

The Meaning of the Flag-Draped Coffin.

What a wonderful lesson this was for me. I do not recall ever being taught this in school. "The Meaning of the Flag-Draped Coffin"

All Americans should be given this lesson. Those who think that America is an arrogant nation should really reconsider that thought. Our founding fathers used GOD's word and teachings to establish our Great Nation and I think it's high time Americans get re-educated about this Nation's history.

Please pass it along and be proud of the country we live in, and even more proud of those who serve to protect our 'GOD-GIVEN' rights and freedoms. I hope you take the time to read this ... To understand what the flag draped coffin really means ...

Here is how to understand the flag that laid upon it and is surrendered to so many widows and widowers: Do you know that at military funerals, the 21-gun salute stands for the sum of the numbers in the year 1776?

Have you ever noticed that the honor guard pays meticulous attention to correctly folding the United States of America Flag 13 times? You probably thought it was to symbolize the original 13 colonies, but we learn something new every day! The 1st fold of the flag is a symbol of life. The 2nd fold is a symbol of the belief in eternal life.

The 3rd fold is made in honor and remembrance of the veterans departing the ranks who gave a portion of their lives for the defense of the country to attain peace throughout the world. The 5th fold is a tribute to the country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, 'Our Country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right; but it is still our country, right or wrong.'
The 6th fold is for where people's hearts lie. It is with their heart that they pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all.

The 7th fold is a tribute to its Armed Forces, for it is through the Armed Forces that they protect their country and their flag against all her enemies, whether they be found within or without the boundaries of their republic..

The 8th fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day.

The 9th fold is a tribute to womanhood, and Mothers. For it has been through their faith, their love, loyalty and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great has been molded.

The 10th fold is a tribute to the father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of their country since they were first born.

The 11th fold represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies in the Hebrews eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

The 12th fold represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in the Christians eyes, God the Father, the Son and Holy Spirit.

The 13th fold, or when the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost reminding them of their Nations motto, 'In God We Trust.'

After the flag is completely folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a cocked hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served under General George Washington, and the Sailors and Marines who served under Captain John Paul Jones, who were followed by their comrades and shipmates in the Armed Forces of the United States, preserving for them the rights, privileges and freedoms they enjoy today.

There are some traditions and ways of doing things that have deep meaning. In the future, you'll see flags folded and now you will know why.
