#### First Lutheran Church Pillager Minutes August 12, 2025

Call to Order: 6:30 p.m. by President Bob Harmsen

**Present:**, Lynn Bushinger, Griff Eisel, Bob Harmsen, Don Oslowski, Matthew Sundquist, Diane Wright, Shirley Smith, Chris Warren Absent: Dan Jacobson

I. Opening Prayer: Pastor Matt

- II. Treasurer's Report: Lynn reported that July represents 58% of the total year and that spending YTD is 58% of the overall budget. Individual budgets within the statement of activities report show 4 expense categories which have or are trending to exceeded budget. Those categories are for copier expense (under review), insurance (reflects premium increases), office supplies (affected by laptop and QuickBooks purchases), and missions/charitable giving (fellowship giving is expensed from this category but is not accounted for in its \$1,500 budget). Noted shortfalls in giving to the General Fund have been offset by targeted increases to the Parsonage Fund for HVAC replacement. Rebalancing of accounts once the siding project and installation of a new HVAC system in the parsonage is complete (with approval of donors) was suggested by Bob. Lynn advises that anti-virus protection for the laptop is needed. Motion to accept the Treasurer's Report made by Chris and seconded by Shirley. Motion passed.
- **III. Pastor's Report:** Pastor advised that Julie Warren and Cindy Walgren will attend the LCMC meeting with him. Our church grew by 7 new members in July. Pastor asked whether the village or the church was responsible for maintaining the alleyway in front of the parsonage, it is in need of repairs. Matthew said he would make an inquiry with the township. Matthew reported that he and Kirstie had been working with Connie on using different office apps since the current software will no longer support our needs. No final decisions have been made.
- **IV. Secretary's Report:** Motion to wave the reading of the minutes made by Diane and seconded by Don. Chris stated that the minutes regarding the quote from Gary's painting should be corrected from \$28,3000 to \$28,300. Motion made to approve the modified minutes by Shirley and seconded by Diane. Motion passed.

#### V. Committee Updates:

Worship/Music: None.

- 1. Congregation and Community Outreach: (Marliss) Family Fun Night on 8/20, 5:00-8:00, Food from 5:00-6:00. Rosie and Marliss are handing out flyers to generate awareness to The Learning Ladder Daycare and the Pillager Early Childhood Learning Center as well as local homes in the area. September activities include: 9/20 the Pillager Street Fest (Quilting Ladies have a booth). 9/21 Adult/Teen Challenge, Service and meal. 9/29 Mission meeting and Christmas shoebox assembly at 6:00.
- 2. Hospitality: None
- 3. Sanctuary: None
- **4. Facilities / Building:** Bob reported that the water beading to remove paint from the siding should, weather permitting, begin on August 18 followed by a coat of primer and two additional coats of paint. Bob asked for funding to remove the flood light on the church's north wall with cost not to exceed \$250. Griff made said motion, seconded by Shirley. Motion passed. Bob stated that the entry door on the building's East side would also be prepped and painted as part of the project. Bob requested a motion to research the installation of a cross on the outside north wall of the church. Griff made said motion, seconded by Chris. Motion passed. Griff suggested that a service be hired to apply bug spray to the outside of the church on a scheduled basis to reduce cobwebs. Don volunteered to get some bids for comparison. Bob said he would confirm with Gary's Painting that the insecticide would not affect the newly painted surfaces.

Staffing: None.

**Old Business:** Griff submitted the bid from Horizon Heating and Service Inc. for replacement of the parsonage's furnace and air-conditioning units for \$7,200 plus electrical wiring. After discussion, motion was made by Diane to accept Horizon's bid, seconded by Chris. Motion passed.

**New Business:** Council discussed and agreed to allow the Pillager school district to use the FLC as a shelter for their emergency access protocol, including distribution of up to 4 keys.

**Adjourn & Closing:** Diane made a motion to adjourn, which was second by Shirley and approved by acclamation.

#### First Lutheran Church Pillager Minutes September 9, 2025

I. Opening Prayer: Pastor Matt

- **II. Treasurer's Report:** Lynn reported that at the end of August, the total cash position of the church was \$98,435 and envelope offerings were \$82,214. Year-over-year giving is down by \$5,500. Our charitable giving from funds received during fellowship and pancake breakfast are at \$1,250 through August. The beneficiaries for these funds are Brainerd Women's Shelter, Teen Challenge and Eagles Healing Nest. Lynn mentioned again she needs to get antivirus software installed on the church laptop. Council recommended she go to Best Buy and use the Geek Squad membership to get software installed. Griff mentioned we will be getting a \$350 refund from our copy machine contract because of an overcharge on the service agreement. Chris moved to approve the Treasurer's Report and Griff seconded. Approved by acclamation.
- **III. Pastor's Report:** A key lock box was installed at the back of the church, and a set of keys given to the school for their emergency shelter plan. Pastor mentioned we may need to rethink marketing of Family Fun Night to get more attendance. Pastor also was looking into maintenance responsibilities for the alleyway on the southside of the church. Bob and Matthew will be visiting the city administrator to see what options are available. Bob also thanked pastor for the personal notes sent to members of the congregation.
- **IV. Secretary's Report:** Chris made a motion to wave the reading of the minutes, which was seconded by Griff. Dan moved to approve the minutes, and Chris seconded. Approved by acclamation.

Griff made a motion, seconded by Dan that we buy two new lights at a max budget of \$300.
- 6. Staffing: None.


**Old Business:** Bob mentioned that we need to respond to a survey from the insurance company about the building's electrical systems.



#### **HOW MANY KNEW THIS!**

On Jeopardy the other night, the final question was: "How many steps does the guard take during his walk across the Tomb of the Unknown?"

All three missed it.

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

1. How many steps does the guard take during his

walk across the Tomb of the Unknown and why?

21 steps. It alludes to the twenty-one gun salute, which is the highest honor given any military or foreign dignitary.

- 2. How long does he wait after his about face to begin his return walk and why?
- 21 seconds for the same reason as above.
- 3. Why are his gloves wet?

His gloves are moistened to prevent his losing his grip on the rifle.

4. Does he carry his rifle on the same shoulder all the time and if not, why not?

He carries the rifle on the shoulder away from the tomb. After his march across the path, he executes an about face and moves the rifle to the outside shoulder.

5. How often are the guards changed?

Guards are changed every thirty minutes, twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year.

6. What are the physical traits of the guard limited to?

For a person to apply for guard duty at the tomb, he must be between 5' 10' and 6' 2' tall and his waist size cannot exceed 30.' Other requirements of the Guard:

They must commit 2 years of life to guard the tomb, live in a barracks under the tomb, and cannot drink any alcohol on or off duty for the rest of their lives.

They cannot swear in public for the rest of their lives and cannot disgrace the uniform {fighting} or the tomb in any way. After two years, the guard is given a wreath pin that is worn on their lapel signifying they served as guard of the tomb. There are only 400 presently worn.

The guard must obey these rules for the rest of their lives or give up the wreath pin.

The shoes are specially made with very thick soles to keep the heat and cold from their feet. There are metal heel plates that extend to the top of the shoe in order to make the loud click as they come to a halt.

There are no wrinkles, folds or lint on the uniform.

Guards dress for duty in front of a full-length mirror.

The first six months of duty a guard cannot talk to anyone, nor watch TV.

All off duty time is spent studying the 175 notable people laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery. A guard must memorize who they are and where they are interred.

Among the notables are: President Taft, Joe E. Lewis {the boxer} and Medal of Honor recipient Audie Murphy, {the most decorated soldier of WWII} of Hollywood fame.

Every guard spends five hours a day getting his uniforms ready for guard duty.

In 2003 as Hurricane Isabelle was approaching Washington , DC , our US Senate/House took 2 days off with anticipation of the storm. On the ABC evening news, it was reported that because of the dangers from the hurricane, the military members assigned the duty of guarding the

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier were given permission to suspend the assignment.

They respectfully declined the offer, 'No way, Sir!' Soaked to the skin, marching in the pelting rain of a tropical storm, they said that guarding the Tomb was not just an assignment, it was the highest honor that can

be afforded to a serviceperson.

The tomb has been patrolled continuously, 24/7, since 1930.


God Bless and Keep Them
