The Parker Foundation looks forward to kicking off 10 years of service to Brevard County families in 2025! To start in January, they will be assisting Special Olympics Brevard with Tennis which will be held at Kiwi Racquet and Fitness Club in Indian Harbor Beach on Saturdays. Coaches include Katie and Ruben Vanoppen; Katie has coached Special Olympics Tennis for 3 seasons prior to this year, and Ruben is a Tennis Pro at Kiwi and heavily involved in the Junior program. Melissa Parker and Parker Foundation Buddy Ambassador Sharanya Natarajan, 11th grade tennis player at Edgewood Jr./Sr. High School will be assisting in addition to volunteers from Amego, Inc. in Melbourne. Coaches and volunteers were recently trained and certified through Love Serving Autism, a non-profit out of South Florida that empowers individuals with autism and other developmental disabilities through racquet sports. The season will run from January to May with opportunities for athletes over age 9 to compete on their own level at local, regional and state tournaments.

The Parker Foundation will continue to have shorter, small group adaptive tennis clinics through their Speak Through Sports program year-round. It also looks forward to assisting athletes through Special Olympics to expand their potential and elevate their tennis experience.

At the time of this letter's publication, we will have had three issues, and it is my hope that will continue all through the next year as well.

The beginning of 2025 is going to usher in many new and exciting changes. We will begin classes about advocacy, and engage efforts with our community to speak at events like the upcoming Brevard County Delegation Meeting, Legislative Days in Tallahassee, as well as various county meetings. Our coalition is committed to continuing this effort by working more closely together than ever before. Angels Bridging Gaps

Angels Bridging Gaps is an Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) & Other Disabilities caregiver support organization founded in Palm Bay, FL in 2008. On April 6th, 2021, we officially launched our adults with disabilities day program called "ABGworks Inc." for the underserved population of young adults with disabilities age 18 and up.

2024 was a true test of will and dedication. Late in 2023, the church we had been using since 2008 had a change in the pulpit. We lost our space, which we had been using to give away clothing for free to those in need. This also coincided with the church doing away with the free food pantry.

2025 will be a fresh start for ABG & ABGworks as we join the "One Voice Coalition". This will enable us and our fellow disability organizations to collaborate as one, ensuring that everyone succeeds. We are looking for a new facility to call home and to open a "Disability Resource Center", where parents and caregivers can visit or call for information and guidance for that special person in their life. We anticipate staffing the facility a minimum of 5 days a week. Our goal is to be open by February of 2025. Eventually, we would hope to add additional "Disability Resource Centers" in Melbourne and West Melbourne.

2024 Year In Review, Brevard Autism Coalition

As 2024 comes to a close, the Brevard Autism Coalition (BAC) extends heartfelt gratitude to the Brevard community for its unwavering support throughout the year. Together, we have achieved incredible milestones, strengthening our shared mission to support individuals with autism and their families.

Autism Coalition

The year began with the 16th Annual Brevard Autism Coalition 5K Run/Walk for Autism Awareness and the sixth Run for the Kids Race Challenge. These events united our community in the spirit of fitness and fun, creating memories while advancing our cause. Shortly after, we hosted a free seminar at the Space Coast Health Foundation titled "Empowering Relationships: Communication, Sexuality, and Behavior," aimed at empowering young adults and their families with vital knowledge and tools. In the spring, our Adventure Coffee Prevocational Camp provided 12 young adults with the opportunity to develop work skills by running the Adventure Coffee Café at Child and Family Consultants. Building on this momentum, BAC partnered with the Cocoa Village Playhouse in May for another successful Sensory Sensitive Play. This beloved event has grown so much that two performances are planned for 2025, scheduled for late May and early June.

Thanks to generous funding, donations, and community grants, the Camp-2-Can Summer Program flourished under the leadership of Camp Director Heather Morway and an exceptional team of

counselors. Over six weeks, 80 participants (24 participants per week) with autism and related conditions experienced a safe, social, and fun-filled camp environment. Additionally, BAC maintained its year-round initiatives, including social skills groups for adolescents and young adults and a monthly golf program led by Coach Mike at the US1 Golf Center in Rockledge. In September, BAC furthered its commitment to advocacy and collaboration by hosting a Candidates Forum at the Space Coast Health Foundation. This forum brought together local and state office candidates to engage with the disability community, sparking vital conversations about support and resources for individuals and families with disabilities in Brevard County. We were also proud to support the launch of One Voice Brevard, which aims to unite various disability nonprofit organizations in Brevard County, working together to educate, empower, and advocate for the voices of individuals with disabilities at both the county and state levels. One Voice Brevard started publishing a monthly newsletter—edited by Nicole Grabner and Brenda Leon—to educate and engage the community on important issues. November marked the return of the 11th Annual Brevard Uncorked Gala at the Hotel Melby in Downtown Melbourne. It was a memorable evening of entertainment, auctions, games, and fine dining, all in support of BAC's mission.

We now have the official registration link for the Brevard County Delegation Meeting happening on 29 January at 5:30 PM at the Cocoa City Hall.

From Representative Sirois' office:

"The first segment will begin at 3:30 p.m. with remarks from registered speakers representing local governments, boards, and special districts. The second segment will begin at 5:30 p.m. and include local bill proposals and remarks by registered speakers who appear as members of the public or represent civic organizations.

Those interested in speaking to the delegation must complete and submit an Appearance Request Form. <u>All completed Appearance Request Forms are due no later than 5 p.m. on Wednesday, January 22, 2025</u>. ISSUE: HOUSING

With over 1,000 people moving to Florida a day, and rising costs of living, Brevard County struggles to keep up affordable and accessible housing options. We need more accessible and supported living options, including group homes

- Create more accessible housing options
- Bring more group home options to Brevard County
- Allow tax exemption status to caregivers of disabled citizens

ISSUE: HEALTHCARE

An estimated 1.4 million people in the state of Florida lost vital healthcare coverage during the Medicaid Unwinding this past year. Healthcare access in Brevard County is a struggle for many citizens, but especially for those who require specialized care. In addition, many citizens are on the waitlist for crucial home and community-based care. Having home-based care allows our most vulnerable population the option of avoiding institutions.

- Fully fund the APD (Agency for Persons With Disabilities)
 Wait List
- Bring more specialized doctors to Brevard County
- Support efforts to broaden medical coverage for our already overburdened disabled population

ISSUE: EDUCATION

Brevard County has over 18,500 students enrolled in the ESE program. With the rising amount of children diagnosed with intellectual and developmental disabilities, we need better support and specialized educators to work with our children to ensure they are prepared to live their fullest life upon graduation. Each year, these students leave the school system with no real outside support for secondary education or employment.

- Create more adult programs to support our disabled students
- Ensure IEP and 504 supports are being met with each student
- Ensure special education teachers receive adequate training to work with I/DD students
