Successfully Traveling with A Disability

As we begin the summer months, many families will be considering where they want to travel. Traveling as a family with disabilities requires thoughtful preparation, and can sometimes seem daunting.

Start your planning by selecting destinations known for their accessibility, such as national parks with ADA-compliant trails and accommodations. For instance, parks like Yellowstone and Everglades offer wheelchair-accessible paths and interpretive programs.

When booking accommodations, ensure that they meet specific needs—whether it's roll-in showers, wider doorways, or proximity to medical facilities. Websites like AccessibleGO and Booking.com allow you to filter for accessible lodging options, but it's also advisable to contact hotels directly to confirm their facilities. One such site called "Autism on the Seas" specializes in providing information for families with autistic members including information about sensory-friendly cruises and accommodations.

Additionally, consider modes of transportation that offer flexibility and comfort, such as accessible rental vans or cruises with specialized services for travelers with disabilities.

Preparation is key to a smooth journey. Create a comprehensive itinerary that includes contact information for medical facilities, a list of necessary medications, and any special equipment needed. For

children with sensory sensitivities or developmental disabilities, pack comfort items like noise-canceling headphones, favorite toys, and snacks.

Establishing a routine during travel can provide a sense of security. Before departure, practice the travel experience, including airport procedures or hotel stays, to familiarize your child with the process. You can use examples such as stories to help provide familiarity and comfort. Many airports offer programs like TSA Cares or the Hidden Sunflower Program to assist travelers with disabilities through security.

Camp 2 Can: A Summer of Empowerment, Fun, and Friendship for Youth with Disabilities

This summer, Camp 2 Can is once again opening its doors to children, teens, and young adults with autism and related disabilities, providing a safe, structured, and joy-filled space for them to grow, learn, and thrive. Operated under the umbrella of the Brevard Autism Coalition, Camp 2 Can stands as a shining example of what inclusive programming can achieve when built with heart, purpose, and expertise.

Camp Director, Heather Morway, Autism Certified through IBCCES (International Board of Credentialing and Continuing Education Standards), leads the camp with a passion for empowering every child to reach their full potential. Under her guidance, the camp is staffed by a dedicated team of professionals—many of whom work year-round in ESE (Exceptional Student Education) classrooms—and are fully trained to support the unique needs of neurodiverse campers.

At Camp 2 Can, the belief is simple: every child can, allowing opportunities or success. They can make new friends, can experience new adventures, and can thrive in a setting designed to meet them exactly where they are. The camp offers an enriching summer experience for children who often face barriers to participation elsewhere. Each week is packed with structured activities including arts and crafts, games, social skills activities, sensory-friendly projects, and more. Campers also get to enjoy exciting weekly outings such as bowling at Shore Lanes, movie days at Premiere Oaks 10 Theatres, on-site water day fun, and relaxing nature play at Gleason Park. These carefully curated adventures not only promote engagement and community interaction, but also help build confidence, routine, and essential life skills.

Parents consistently praise the impact Camp 2 Can has on their children. One parent shared, “It’s the first time we’ve seen our child excited to go somewhere every day. Camp 2 Can helped him grow socially and emotionally in ways we didn’t think were possible.”

Alzheimer's and Dementia Awareness

Alzheimer's and dementia awareness is crucial in fostering understanding, compassion, and support for the millions of individuals and families affected by these conditions. Alzheimer's disease, the most common form of dementia, gradually impairs memory, thinking, and behavior, eventually interfering with daily tasks and independence. Raising awareness helps reduce stigma, promotes early detection, and encourages people to seek diagnosis and support.

As of 2025, the CDC estimated that 7.2 million Americans aged 65 and older are living with Alzheimer's disease, which rose from 6.9 million in 2024. The majority of these individuals—approximately 74%—are aged 75 or older. Alzheimer's disease remains the sixth leading cause of death in the United States and the fifth leading cause among adults aged 65 and older. The prevalence is notably higher among women, who account for nearly two-thirds of those affected.

Individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD), particularly those without Down syndrome, are at a heightened risk of developing dementia compared to the general population. Approximately 30% of people with Down syndrome in their 50s have Alzheimer's dementia, and this figure increases to about 50% in their 60s. These statistics underscore the importance of early detection and tailored care strategies to support individuals with IDD and dementia. As the global population ages, the prevalence of dementia is expected to rise, making it more vital than ever to advocate for increased research funding, better care systems, and inclusive communities where those living with cognitive decline are treated with dignity and respect.

This event is FREE and is Florida's largest cross-disability conference, offering a wealth of resources, training, and networking opportunities for individuals with disabilities and their families. Attendees can explore a comprehensive Exhibit Hall featuring dozens of vendors, participate in breakout sessions tailored to various needs, and engage with policymakers during special events, such as the Governor's Summit on Disabilities.

In addition to the main conference, two pre-conference events are scheduled for June 12. The 2025 Women's Summit will provide a supportive space for women caregivers to reconnect and empower themselves, while the 2025 FROM Pre-Con will offer training for family-run organizations to enhance their impact. Both pre-cons require a \$25 registration fee and are designed to complement the main conference experience. In Spring 2025 we explored and launched different job training & enrichment opportunities for our ABGworks participants & caregivers. This included Sales/Entrepreneurship -at the ABGworks Thrift & Consignment Boutique on Wheels (BOWZ) Popup Days. Also, we launched an internship program with the One Voice Brevard Newsletter (Mrs Nicole

Internship/On the Job Training Opportunity (OJT). We are very proud of our two Spring 2025 Interns: Ken Friedel and Dalton Higbee. Their dedication and commitment to supporting their team and producing professional level work was outstanding. It just proves what our adults with disabilities are capable of when given the right environment of support and freedom of creative expression. Also, this Spring we decided to bring some extra fun to our ABGworks Senior Friends at Trinity Towers South by including them in our ABGworks Music Jam Session with Mr Rob from the Florida Music Therapy Program.

We also launched our Gardening Skills Program with the support of the UF Extension, Roots to Work Program, for adults with disabilities. We partnered with a variety of community organizations like Promise in Brevard who allows us to use their spaces to host our monthly meetings -- special thanks to Mrs Cindi (Activities Director). We are looking forward to a Fall Semester of Discovery as we visit different gardening spaces and contemplate our future community garden.

We currently work with the Sheriff & Police trainers by taking a group of our ABGworks caregivers and participants to engage in

their annual law enforcement training program at Eastern Florida State College to provide an opportunity to teach them about us and offer ways for us to work together for the best possible outcomes. As an addition to this program we recently launched another collaboration with the UF Extension Center called Health & Safety Rocks. It's purpose is to create a monthly collaborative community initiative to help keep our kids safe both at home and out in the community, along with helping them understand society's rules as adults and making good decisions.

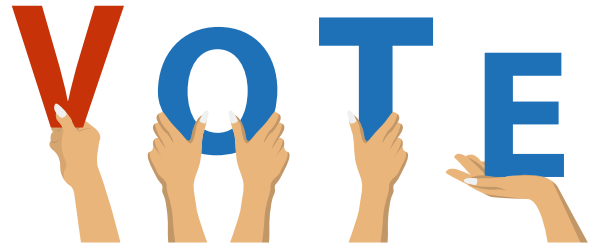

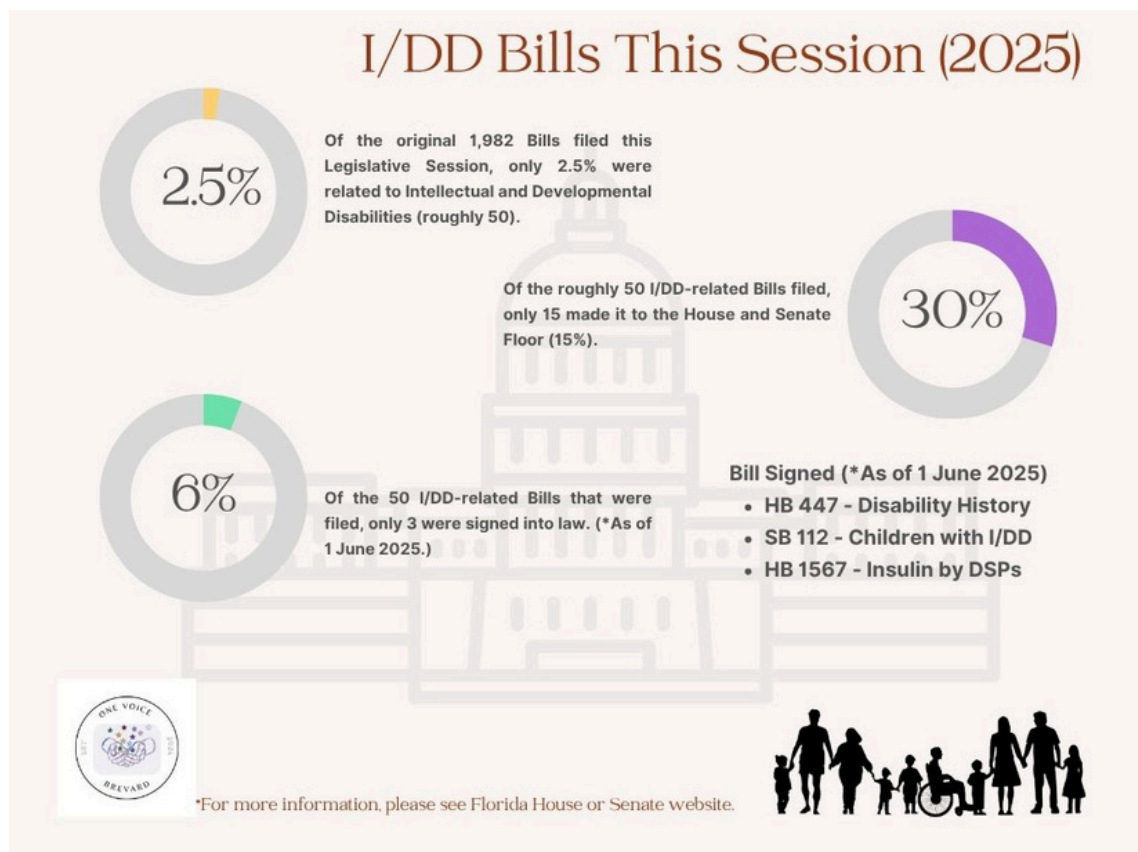
Of the 1,982 Bills originally filed at the beginning of the 2025 Legislative Session, roughly 50 of those were Intellectually and Developmentally Disabled (I/DD) related. As of publication today, only three of those bills have been signed into law.

The past few months we have seen a lot of advocacy alerts ranging from discussions of Medicaid cuts at the Federal level to judicial cases against the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. And what we have seen so far in our advocacy of these issues is that every voice counts! Please consider joining our next Advocacy call on 9 June at 6:00 PM on Zoom where we partner with Florida Voices for Health to discuss in more detail disability-focused advocacy efforts. Also, important for citizens of Brevard County, is the General Election for Florida Senate District 19 and State Representative District 32 seats on 10 June. In today's climate of rapid change and deep division, voting is one of the most powerful tools we have to protect our rights, shape our communities, and hold leaders accountable.

ONE VOICE BREVARD 2025 LEGISLATIVE PLATFORM



ISSUE: HOUSING

With over 1,000 people moving to Florida a day, and rising costs of living, Brevard County struggles to keep up affordable and accessible housing options. We need more accessible and supported living options, including group homes.

- Create more accessible housing options
- Bring more group home options to Brevard County
- Allow tax exemption status to caregivers of disabled citizens

ISSUE: HEALTHCARE

An estimated 1.4 million people in the state of Florida lost vital healthcare coverage during the Medicaid Unwinding this past year. Healthcare access in Brevard County is a struggle for many citizens, but especially for those who require specialized care. In addition, many citizens are on the waitlist for crucial home and community-based care. Having home-based care allows our most vulnerable population the option of avoiding institutions.

- Fully fund the APD (Agency for Persons With Disabilities) Wait List
- Bring more specialized doctors to Brevard County
- Support efforts to broaden medical coverage for our already overburdened disabled population

ISSUE: EDUCATION

Brevard County has over 18,500 students enrolled in the ESE program. With the rising amount of children diagnosed with intellectual and developmental disabilities, we need better support and specialized educators to work with our children to ensure they are prepared to live their fullest life upon graduation. Each year, these students leave the school system with no real outside support for secondary education or employment.

- Create more adult programs to support our disabled students
- Ensure IEP and 504 supports are being met with each student
- Ensure special education teachers receive adequate training to work with I/DD students

Disability Advocacy in Brevard County

One Voice Brevard is the Coalition of Advocacy efforts for our disabled population in Brevard County. Our goal is to bring every advocacy group together to speak with one legislative voice.





Medicaid is a joint federal and state program that provides health insurance and access to long-term care to more than 3,901,821 Floridians, including:

Around **29% of Floridians with disabilities** under the age of 65

Around **40% of Floridian children**

More than **238,000 adults** receiving long-term supports and services

What Medicaid Means for Floridians

- **Dignity and Community:** Medicaid home and community-based services (HCBS) enable 177,207 disabled Floridians to live, work, and participate in their communities.
- **Federal Investment:** The federal government spent \$22.3 billion on Medicaid in Florida in 2023—providing around 65% of the total cost of the program in the state.
- **Jobs:** Medicaid creates thousands of valuable local jobs in the health care sector and increases employment for people with disabilities.
- **Stronger Rural Hospitals:** Medicaid funding enables rural hospitals and other critical health care infrastructure to stay open and provide care to rural residents.
- 51.9% of children in small town and rural areas are covered by Medicaid.
- 14.5% of non-elderly adults living in small towns and rural areas are covered by Medicaid.

Impact to Florida's State Economy

- Cuts to federal Medicaid funding would shift costs onto Floridians, squeezing already-tight state, local, and family budgets.
- The state would be forced to make up for the loss in federal funds.
- Without adequate funding for HCBS, thousands of Floridians with disabilities would lose their independence and be forced into nursing homes or state-run institutions to survive.


