Dear Friends and Supporters,

I'm excited to share how your help has made a difference in the lives of people we serve and their families. This report showcases a myriad ways we live our mission each day – providing meaningful vocational training, supported employment, paid jobs and productive service projects that provide opportunities to engage with nonprofits and businesses in our local communities.

The Autistic adults whom we serve learn hard and soft skills needed to gain and retain jobs, including our Supported Employment Program, matching jobs to individuals with at-work support. Opportunities for self-expression include a Media Lab – podcast, newsletter and weekly news program aired on YouTube – all designed and produced by our participants. Port Provides, Powered by The Nicholas Center allows for our participants to gather, pack and distribute personal care and cleaning items to 1,400 in-need neighbors. We serve as agents of change by advocating at local, state and federal levels – speaking on behalf of Autistic adults and the professional staff who support them.

The staggering statistics remain:

1 in 54 children diagnosed with Autism

60% are non-verbal or have limited functional speech or social skills

30% (or less) will attend college and fewer will secure jobs

We believe young adults with Autism deserve opportunities for continued learning and growth, even after the school bus stops coming.

We remain true to our promise to respond to the demands for appropriate services for Autistic young adults and to put your generous dollars to work to achieve these goals.


As Co-Founder and Executive Director, I graciously invite you to give generously to The Nicholas Center. Our program requires \$400,000 in private funding each year after State applied funds.



Revenue & Expenses | 2021/22




FY 2021 Revenue


FY 2022 Revenue

Vocational | Skills & Training

Helping participants gain and maintain skills needed to lead meaningful lives through gainful employment.

The Nicholas Center's vocational supports and inclusive partnerships and initiatives have had an impact on the lives of hundreds of Autistic adults who face 85% unemployment and under engagement when school services end at age 21. Our professional and credentialed staff support our participants in reaching individual goals in both gaining and maintaining competitive employment.

- Work Readiness and Soft-Skills Training Hands-on and staff supported experiences and vocational training opportunities foster new skills, build confidence and promote independence through verbal and digital cues.
- ▶ SEMP Supported Employment Program offers job seekers and those gainfully employed, individualized attention and employment support at workplaces in our local communities. Placements include: a screen print shop, a bake shop, music store, business office, market, thrift store and a library.
- Micro-Businesses Putting job skills into practice at Total Fulfillment, a packaging & fulfillment business, mobile snack business, Crusin' Cantina and Line of Site golf accessory.









Expanding | Reach

Connecting our participants with support staff and peers to foster new experiences, opportunities, knowledge and fun.

▶ TNC Media Lab — offers the opportunity to write, produce, record & anchor the news. NCN – Nicholas Center News (122 episodes!), Navigator Newsletter (12 per year) and Agents of Humanity podcast hosted by 4 individuals with Autism.

All media programs and newsletters are available to the public and distributed by our TNC team!

- Port Provides, Powered by The Nicholas Center Serving 1,400 in-need neighbors each week with personal care items and cleaning supplies.
- NICE Committee (Nicholas Center Improvement Committee) — offers participants the opportunity to let their voices be heard regarding ways to best support them and our mission. Suggestions from the group are shared with our Board of Directors.
