












Words Of Wisdom "You think you own whatever land you land on

Thanksgiving Past and Present

This thankful piece of history goes way back to November 1621, when the newly arrived Pilgrims and the Wampanoag Indians gathered at Plymouth or an autumn harvest celebration. On their first feast, the colonists were likely outnumbered more than two to one by their Native American guests. he first dish of the feast was Turkey. The wild ones (not domestic) were indeed plentiful in the region and a common food source for both English. ettlers and Native Americans. Although the fowling party returned with other birds we know the colonists regularly consumed, such as ducks, geese and swans. Instead of bread-based stuffing, herbs, onions or nuts might have been added to the birds for extra flavor.

Another fun thing about Thanksgiving is the parades. Parades have also become an exciting part of the holiday in cities and towns across the United states. Presented by Macy's depart<mark>ment</mark> sto<mark>re since</mark> 1924, New York City's Thanksgiving Day parade is the largest and most famous, attracting some 2 o 3 million spectators along its 2.5-mile route and drawing an enormous television audience.
