But this particular offense comes with a certain connotation, like when we think about especially here in the United States are probably all over the world. When we think about trafficking. What we are not thinking about is a good dude. We're just not thinking about oh, this is a good dude. We wouldn't do that. What we would think about is, this is a problem. This is a problem in He is put in this position. So let's empathize with him for a second. Let's say for a moment, regardless of what you believe, let's say he did not traffic, anybody. What's the stigma that's going to be on the rest of his life? As an innocent man, we're assuming for a second, he's an innocent man. That's a rather hefty stigma. It's, it's like a man or being accused of taking advantage of women. It's not the same as but it could be assimilated with rape. It could be anything that makes you go Caribbean. And that is the stigma that he would have for the rest of his life, even if it's determined that he's innocent. That's a big, hefty accusation. Why did I stop here? Because I wanted you to think about that. That's a problem. That's a really big problem. Now, if he's guilty, there's no problem with it. The problem only exists if he's innocent. Okay. Let's take a look at the the girls, the TIC tock girls. If, let's say there was this was all played out. And they were doing this because they wanted attention from Andrew Tate. Which is possible that they were they were willingly coerced, let's say. That's an interesting issue. Because, well, first of all, they got you know, they gotta prove the financial stuff and, and to be real, when somebody is potentially idolized in the media or in, you know, in different things, when when there's an idolizing process going on. Ooh, let's pause right there. All right, folks. The difference between rape and sex is consent. Except with people who can't consent. So I go back to this, and I empathize with them. And I say, Okay, if they're doing this stuff of their own free will, but they are not of the age to consent. Then my guess my question would be, where's the oversight? who's managing that is tick tock saying, Hey, you cannot participate on our platform unless you're of the age to consent? Well, are they not only saying that, but also managing it, making it a reality? Because if they're not, is Andrew Tate the problem? Or is Tiktok? The problem? It's an interesting question. If you can't see that, you might be part of the problem. Now, it is really fascinating that these these girls that he's talking about, would say, he didn't do anything. He's our friend. Maybe, maybe I do. Like, let's let's be real. If I'm if I'm being really authentic here. He's not an old man. But he's not a young young man. Not super young, I think, what is it in the 30s 3435? Something like that, I think. And he has influence. Why would he be giving very much of his time and energy to really young girls? It does beg the question. What are you doing, man? Now, if their family great if their friends Great? Meaning they're friends of people he knows are daughters of people, you know, okay, I get that that's gonna happen. And to be a nice quy, I try very hard to be a nice guy myself. And but I don't just go hang out with super young girls. So I don't know about that. There's something there's something there that probably needs a little bit of attention. But he's not wrong when he said consent matters. Because as a, as a clinical counselor, informed consent is like, day one stuff with every client. Because consent matters. Well, what if they're underage coming to see me? Because I do see, kids sometimes, I don't see kids too often, anymore. And most of the kids that I see are, you know, teenage and older, like I consider them kids 20s, early 20s. But they're young, young people. For me, they're young. And obviously, before they're 18 Consent is one of those interesting dilemmas, because parents have to sign them in, I got parents signatures. But the kids then can come on their own. And we're hanging out. We're like doing therapy stuff. They're talking to me about their life and the things going on in their world. It's informed consent. So consent is a big deal. If you haven't

seen the whole consent, you know, the consent T video, you should go watch it, because consent is a big deal, no matter the age. But what really is interesting here, from my vantage point, is how do you have informed consent on a platform like tick tock, when two people who are using the platform interact? That's theirs. That's really difficult, maybe near impossible, maybe impossible to manage for tic toc for Andrew Tate, for anybody else that's on the platform. And yet, who reads the expectations in the guidelines of the community? Usually they're read once somebody screws something up, and sometimes, not even then. So that's a tough one. And if you can't See the challenge in that? Let's be real, you might be part of the problem. We're going to skip ahead to a later scene. We oh my gosh, a time is just ticking away. For those of you who are following along, I am going to head up to the like eight minute mark, we are going to eat. I'm looking for 803 I believe 8030. It's going to be tough. All right. I do not like this 23 Second section. I don't like it. I don't like it at all from a therapeutic lens. Because yes, they're frustrated, I get the frustration. Okay, you know, let's empathize with their frustration. But

they're mocking nature of coercion, let's be real. When somebody comes along, and they had been coerced, and they feel allied to their perpetrator, it is not easy to pull them out of the depths of that ally. relationship, that, that loyalty that they feel like they have to that adult, especially when it's a kid to an adult. Unfortunately, I have encountered this in my practice, this idea that, you know, somebody was in a really bad situation, and they got really attached, even though the situation was heinous, terrible, awful, no good. And it takes a lot to bring them along their journey to their own realization of what really occurred. So to mark that, not a fan. Now, if he's innocent, I understand the frustration. That part I'm okay with like it from a therapeutic lens. When I empathize, I can empathize with that. But we have to be really, really careful about navigating into a space where we are now saying, if you were coerced, you cannot be encouraged to do your healing. Because it's a very fine line between that. And what they are talking about what they are talking about what they're they're working, I believe, from the presumption of innocence, in which case, it's an awful process. But we can't do that if there's an actual victim. If there's an actual victim, because empathize with the victim for a second. They're there, they're put through this, you know, this torture, but they don't realize it's torture. Maybe they're part of a community that that takes advantage of them. Maybe that's a physical abuse, sexual abuse, maybe and now they're not in it. And they're learning reality all over again. That kid is going to take time, gentle, growing over a period of time, to be able to acknowledge the reality of their situation. It's not something we would want to mock not Ever, not ever. And I can understand how it could happen on accident from irritation, frustration, stuff like that. But no, let's not do that. Let's not do that, please. And if you can't, by the way, see that you might be part of the problem. You're assuming innocence. Not assuming that maybe there is a victim. Now if you know Andrew Tate personally then great, like, you know, he's innocent. Okay. I have seen those other situations, though. Not pretty, not pretty at all. And not a real, super classy way of handling that in my opinion. All right, let's go back to the video. Like I'm gonna get through all right, maybe one or two more. Look who you when when somebody is abandoned by their tribe, it does create a, what the heck do I do moment. It does create that. And that is a problem. That's a challenge that he had to endure. If you can't empathize with that. Just imagine for a moment you as an American citizen, let's say I'm most of my audience is here in the US. As an American citizen, you are travelling abroad. And something happens, and the embassy finds out that you are being held. Because they thought you were trying to, I don't know, steal something or, you know, whatever, they fill in the blank anything. And so they detain you, and the embassy shows up, or maybe worse, doesn't show up. But you know, they know. Because Sandra Tate, how did they not know of course, they knew they watched it all happen on a screen. So that kind of abandonment. If you were there. Oh my gosh. I should have been given that money to my church, not to my government, or the private sector that manages the government contract. Because all of those have to be approved through the state. See, we could get really, really scrupulous when it comes to morality. So if you're going to claim morality, and this is something that I would straight up, say to Andrew Tate, if I had an interaction with Be careful, man, be careful because everything in your life will be picked apart.
