
# How Does Your Horse Move,

#### Foundation

Dressage can be a great foundation for trail work. The reason dressage was invented was to keep horses fit in a small space yet ready to be ridden in war, out in the country. This is because nobility had to keep the horses in the castles, where they were safe, but also be prepared for long days out on the trails at any moment.

For our education of riders, we have a strong focus on a good seat and learning aids that are in harmony with the horses' movement. This sets our horses up for success as long-term, happy, healthy riding partners.



# Horse Loading

## OOPS -- Not The Usual Horse Loading A Special Event Instead

Another training session for evacuation team members has typically been **Horse Loading**. However, this year we have invited Code 3 Associates of Longmont to present a different event to replace Horse Loading. A few LCHA members attended a similar Code 3 Associates event last Autumn, and were *very* impressed with it.

This event will involve two sessions:

#### Session 1 -- Zoom

FRIDAY, APRIL 12 – 7 PM to 9 PM. A two-hour zoom presentation on awareness and safety.

Bonnie will send the Zoom invitation to all Evacuation Team members. She will also send a Zoom invitation to any non-evacuation team member who signs up in advance.

## Session 2 -- Hands On

SATURDAY, APRIL 13TH – 9 AM to 2 PM. Longhorn Outdoor Arena, The Ranch

The hands on portion of the class.

- Fundamentals of doing equine physical evaluations, in order to communicate with veterinarians
- Some basic haltering and restraint techniques for emergencies.
- Exercises moving horses through some obstacles as well as trailer loading. These exercises will be done without touching the horses using the horses' natural pressure point and natural behaviors.

There will also be some written materials handed out to the participants as reference materials.

It is very important for ALL our evacuation team members to attend both the Zoom class on April 12 and the Hands On exercises on April 13.


#### **Directions**

The best way to access the Longhorn Arena:

- Enter from the North at Andalusian Drive (traffic light at the intersection),
- Turn left on Show Ring Road
- Follow Show Ring Road to the end until it turns to a dirt road
- The arena will be on your left.
- Parking and trailer parking should be in the dry grass areas around the arena, **not** in the RV camping spots since we have a horse show happening that weekend.

## Major Construction Scheduled for Hall Ranch Trail Head:

March 11 – April 4: Full Main Trail head Closure The entire trail head will be closed for construction. Visitors can walk or bike through designated areas at the trail head. No parking will be available at the upper or lower parking areas.

March 11 – June 13: Equestrian Parking and Shelter Closed

There will be no horse trailer parking. The shelter will be closed.

April 4 – June 13: Upper Parking Area Closed The lower parking area will be open but the upper parking area will remain closed.

June 13 – July 18: Lower Parking Area Closed The upper parking area will be open but the lower parking area will be closed.

#### Sundance Waiver

If you would like to ride a Sundance Trail horse, the ranch has the following request:

Reasons To Sign Up

- Sundance Trail needs to know in advance how many horses to have available. They also need to know in advance how many lunches to fix, and if anyone has a dietary need; for example, gluten free.
- LCHA needs to know who plans to come so that, in case of dire circumstances that requires us to cancel the ride, we can inform all those who signed up before they drive to Sundance Trail.



# Directions to Sundance Trail Guest Ranch

- Take I-25 to Exit #269 (Route 14).
- Go west on Rt 14 into Ft. Collins until it feeds into Route 287 North.
- North on Route 287 about 20 miles to County Road 74E – Red Feather Lakes Road.
- Turn left at the Forks onto County Rd 74e Red Feather Lakes Road. (Landmarks are the Livermore Post Office and what used to be the Forks Restaurant)
- Drive 17.8 miles. Our sign and gate are on the left hand side.
- Our gate is kept closed for the horses. Come on in, and please close the gate behind you!

When you arrive, come through the red gate. (Please close the gate behind you.) Follow the sign pointing left to the lodge.



# Sign Up for Your Event

# Please! Please! Sign up for events in advance (especially events that involve riding):

- For any weekend ride, sign up by the end of Thursday before the ride.
- For any week day ride, sign up at least two days in advance.
- For some events, earlier sign-up may be required.

## Why?

If we need to cancel an event, your ride leader can get in touch with you to let you know before you drive to the location. You won't use gasoline or time waiting for an event that isn't going to happen. Also, your event leader needs to know if anyone is coming: If no one signs up, the leader may cancel or reschedule the event.

And, if you have any special concerns or circumstances (for example, it is your horse's first ride with a group), your leader can plan to deal with the situation in the best possible way.

## What's the Deal with "Limit"?

Wilderness areas, properties owned by the city of Fort Collins, and Red Mountain Open Space have a "12-heartbeat rule": a group cannot include more than 12 heartbeats when using trails in these areas.

When riding our horses, the rule limits our groups to 6 riders (plus 6 horses with hearts) to meet the 12-heartbeat rule. However, if we have significantly more than 6 riders who want to ride, we can split them into 2 or more groups, each group including 6 riders (1 ride leader plus 5 others).

Limit

The second group must leave the trail head 20 to 25 minutes after the first so that they do not merge with the first group.

When "Limit" is 4 horse trailers, it means that the parking space can hold only 4 horse trailers (tightly packed). However, we encourage "trailer pooling" if more than 4 people want to go on the ride. Actually, we encourage "trailer pooling" for any ride. The benefits are obvious.

For all rides except the Christmas Caroling on Horseback, bring your lunch (unless your ride leader tells you otherwise). You will have lunch somewhere on the trail.

## **LCHA Educational Programs**

LCHA offers a program meeting on the First Thursday of each month, except June, July, August, and December. Occasionally, program meetings occur on different days, at different times, and at different locations. All members are invited, and the public is invited, to any program meeting. We meet at the McKee 4H Building at The Ranch.

Programs involve in-person meetings. We also try to present the programs in Zoom, but cannot guarantee that viewers will see items shown by a presenters: we recommend attending these programs in person,

Program meetings typically run from 7:00 to 9:00 PM.

Before each educational meeting the LCHA newsletter, *LCHA Roundup*, will publish program details.
