Some of the trail is two-track, and some is single path

The trail crosses South Lone Pine Creek then meanders through meadows, sparse stands of lodgepole and ponderosa pine trees, and granite outcroppings. Often following old logging roads, it passes through an area known as Five Points, which is the intersection of five roads/trails. At least one trail

originates in Dowdy Lake Campground, and others are loops off the main trail.

The trail continues past Five Points for nearly 2 miles to the base of Mount Margaret overlooking a deep canyon, North Lone Pine Creek and the Prairie Divide Road.

Five designated campsites, each with a bench, enclosed fire pit and grill, have been established within the first 2.5 miles for use on a first-come, first-served basis. Several more designated, dispersed campsites can be found along the loops from the main trail.

Mount Margaret trail head accommodates approximately 23 vehicles. Obstacles: The trail includes one water crossing – South Lone Pine Creek – near the trail head. It also passes through some gates.

Directions to Mt Margaret Trail Head

- Travel 22 miles northwest of Fort Collins on U.S. Highway 287 to Livermore.
- Turn left on County Road 74E, Red Feather Lakes Road.
- Travel west for about 20 miles to trail head parking on the right.
- You will see the entrance to the trail head on the south (left) side of the road. [The Lady Moon parking lot and trail head are north of the Mt Margaret trail head across CR-74E.]

Trail Care -- July 30

Lion Gulch Trail

The trail is popular for hikers and equestrians. Here are a few facts about the gulch and its trail:

- 3 to 3.5 miles long, depending how far up Homestead Meadows you go
- 1374 feet in elevation gain
- Dogs allowed (off leash if under voice control)
- Named "for its healthy mountain lion population"

Directions to the Trail Head

Directions:

From Loveland, take US 34 west toward Estes Park. As you leave the Big Thompson canyon, turn left onto Mall Road (first left after you leave the canyon; a mini-golf place is on the left of US 34).

Mall Road

Follow Mall Rd. until it intersects with US 36. Turn left onto US 36 (away from Estes Park). Follow US 36 about 8 miles. The trail head is on the right side. If you get to Pinewood Springs, you went too far.

From Longmont, take CO 66 west until it joins with US 36. Go through Lyons on US 36, and follow US 36 toward Estes Park. Go through Pinewood Springs on US 36. The trail head is about 3 miles north-west of Pinewood Springs on US 36, on the left side of the road.

What a gorgeous place to ride. Located in Gilpin and Jefferson counties northwest of Golden, Golden Gate Canyon State Park, with 12,119 acres, has 35 miles of trails. Some of its trails are multi-use and some are for hikers only. The park includes 1 horse-friendly guest house.

There is NO cell phone or internet service in Golden Gate Canyon State Park. Pay phones are located at the Visitor Center and Campground office.

A Note from the Ride Leader

Take Hwy 93 from Golden to Golden Gate Canyon Rd (Hwy 70/46). Go West on Hwy 70 to the park. Once you are inside the entrance (\$9 fee), go right (North) on Ralston Creek Rd (Hwy 57) about 5 miles to the Nott Creek Trail Head. There should be a big red barn close by also.

We will be riding the Mountain Lion Trail Loop, accessing it from the Burro Loop Trail. We will be riding approximately 7 miles and it should take about 4 hours, not counting lunch. Please make sure to bring your lunch and adequate water. The trail is rated moderate, but I would still recommend front horseshoes or boots.

Please RSVP to me, so we can organize trailer pooling where possible.

The setting and scenery are spectacular. Ride in Golden Gate Canyon State park: You will love it.

This trail involves a short, gentle ride through open, dry ponderosa pine forest and a large, attractive meadow/prairie (Lady Moon Meadow). Numerous quaking aspen trees and several small granite outcrops appear along the trail, as well as many larger granite outcrops and promontories about 0.5 mile to the east and west of the trail. You may see numerous shrubs such as wax currant, shrubby cinquefoil, and Woods rose as well as many species of wildflowers along the trail, both in the open forest and in the meadow.

- From Ted's Place, follow US-287 north for 10.5 miles to "The Forks" at Livermore.
- Turn left onto the Red Feather Lakes Road (CR-74E).
- Travel west for about 20 20.8 miles.
- You will see the entrance to the trail head on the south (left) side of the road. [The Mt. Margaret parking lot and trail head is north of the Lady Moon Trail head across CR-74E.]

A long view from the mountain's side

Horsetooth Mountain Open Space is incredibly popular: a recent study revealed a total of 225,000 annual visits! Currently, a 10-foot-wide crusher fine gravel trail is the only trail from Soderberg Trail Head to the open space's trail system. The trail you help build will provide a second connection from this popular trail head while creating an easy, short loop for families and novice users. It will also help spread out visitors, reducing both user conflict and the impact on nature. This project is strongly supported by the community, stakeholders, and user groups (including equestrians) who were all consulted in the process of updating the management plan.

Fun Games

Quintain Of European origin, this was used for joust training. A wooden post, with a shield/target attached to a horizontal arm that rotates upon impact. The rider used a lance to strike the shield as they ride past, the more rotations the higher the score.

Rings This was used by Europeans, Turkish, and Arabic warriors. Rings of various sizes are suspended from the arm of a standard. The rider attempts to spear the rings with the tip of their lance.

Reed Chop This is a Turkish "Mamluk" warfare game. Reeds/sticks of varying heights are placed in 2 rows. The rider goes down the middle, and uses a sword to cut down each reed, alternating strikes to the left and right.

Note - we use wooden swords for training/safety.

In addition, we will also be doing spear throwing and tent-pegging.

Sign Up for Your Event

Please! Please! Please! Sign up for events in advance (especially events that involve riding):

- For any weekend ride, sign up by the end of Thursday before the ride.
- For any week day ride, sign up at least two days in advance.
- For some events, earlier sign-up may be required.



No matter how you do it, sign up.

Why?

If we need to cancel an event, your ride leader can get in touch with you to let you know before you drive to the location. You won't use gasoline or time waiting for an event that isn't going to happen. Also, your event leader needs to know if anyone is coming: If no one signs up, the leader may cancel or reschedule the event. And, if you have any special concerns or circumstances (for example, it is your horse's first ride with a group), your leader can plan to deal with the situation in the best possible way.

Limit

Wilderness areas, properties owned by the city of Fort Collins, and Red Mountain Open Space have a "12-heartbeat rule": a group cannot include more than 12 heartbeats when using trails in these areas. When riding our horses, the rule limits our groups to 6 riders (plus 6 horses with hearts) to meet the 12-heartbeat rule.

However, if we have significantly more than 6 riders who want to ride, we can split them into 2 or more groups, each group including 6 riders (1 ride leader plus 5 others). The second group must leave the trail head 20 to 25 minutes after the first so that they do not merge with the first group.

When "Limit" is 4 horse trailers, it means that the parking space can hold only 4 horse trailers (tightly packed). However, we encourage "trailer pooling" if more than 4 people want to go on the ride. Actually, we encourage "trailer pooling" for any ride. The benefits are obvious.

LCHA Educational Programs

LCHA offers a program meeting on the First Thursday of each month, except June, July, August, and December. All members are invited, and the public is invited, to any program meeting. Until the Covid pandemic has ended, we meet by Zoom, since we cannot maintain social distancing in meetings in person, and we cannot use our meeting location, namely the McKee 4H Building at The Ranch. Before each educational meeting the LCHA newsletter, *LCHA Roundup*, will publish program details


