Advocacy

We Keep Excellent Relationships with Land Owners

In years past, many equestrian organizations across the country have had adversarial relationships with land owners and other officials, resulting in protests and ill feelings. But LCHA decided to work WITH, NOT AGAINST, these agencies.

Over the years, LCHA has established an excellent relationship with landowners in the county: Larimer County, USDA Forest Service, City of Fort Collins, and Lory State Park.

An example of this is LCHA's support letters for Grants, and participation in the Technical Advisory Committee for Hermit Park speaking of horse trails and equestrian camping facilities. We also help build and maintain county trails each year. Result? Trails remain open, and we have the support of the county on trail policies.

We have also served as stockholders for revising the management plan for Horsetooth Mountain Open Space. Result? A new trail and several trail improvements are the result of our careful, thoughtful inputs to the plan.

We also work closely with the Larimer County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) in emergencies, assisting the evacuation of large animals as needed. We evacuated over 60 large animals during the Cameron Peak Fire.

Community and Education

We schedule a variety of activities, including valuable educational programs with inspirational speakers such as Temple Grandin and Elaine Nash. (Who is Elaine Nash? She runs an organization called, Fleet of Angels, and led the rescue of over 800 mustangs, finding forever homes for all of them.)

We have clinics and trail rides for all levels of equestrians. We include picnics and a Christmas party, plus Christmas Caroling on Horseback in Berthoud, a fantastic experience for the carolers and for the community.

Can we do more? Of course. We can always find new ways to have a vibrant, active membership that makes a difference in our lives and in our community.

This trail involves a short, gentle ride through open, dry ponderosa pine forest and a large, attractive meadow/ prairie (Lady Moon Meadow). Numerous quaking aspen trees and several small granite outcrops appear along the trail, as well as many larger granite outcrops and promontories about 0.5 mile to the east and west of the trail. You may see numerous shrubs such as wax currant, shrubby cinquefoil, and Woods rose as well as many species of wildflowers along the trail, both in the open forest and in the meadow.

The Moon Meadow

Early in the spring, or after a substantial rain, the small intermittent stream flowing through this meadow, and the lowest portion of the meadow itself, can be challenging to cross without getting both wet and muddy.

Directions to Lady Moon Trail Head

- From Ted's Place, follow US-287 north for 10.5 miles to "The Forks" at Livermore.
- Turn left onto the Red Feather Lakes Road (CR-74E).
- Travel west for about 20 20.8 miles.
- You will see the entrance to the trail head on the south (left) side of the road. [The Mt. Margaret parking lot and trail head is north of the Lady Moon Trail head across CR-74E.]

Mt Margaret

One-way Length: 3.8 miles
Beginning Elevation: 8,090 feet
Peak Elevation: 8,180 feet

The trail crosses South Lone Pine Creek then meanders through meadows, sparse stands of lodgepole and ponderosa pine trees, and granite outcroppings. Often following old logging roads, It passes through an area known as Five Points, which is the intersection of five roads/trails. At least one trail originates in Dowdy Lake Campground, and others are loops off the main trail.

The trail continues past Five Points for nearly 2 miles to the base of Mount Margaret overlooking a deep canyon, North Lone Pine Creek and the Prairie Divide Road.

Five designated campsites, each with a bench, enclosed fire pit and grill, have been established within the first 2.5 miles for use on a first-come, first-served basis. Several more designated, dispersed campsites can be found along the loops from the main trail.

Mount Margaret trail head accommodates approximately 23 vehicles. Obstacles: The trail includes one water crossing – South Lone Pine Creek – near the trail head. It also passes through some gates.

Directions to Mt Margaret Trail Head

- Travel 22 miles northwest of Fort Collins on U.S. Highway 287 to Livermore.
- Turn left on County Road 74E, Red Feather Lakes Road
- Travel west for about 20 miles to trail head parking on the right.
- You will see the entrance to the trail head on the south (left) side of the road. [The Lady Moon parking lot and trail head are north of the Mt Margaret trail head across CR-74E.]

Hermit Park

Hermit Park's Limber Pine trail winds its way about 7 miles around park periphery. It is a beautiful trail through meadows and forests, across flat areas and some hilly zones. Its rating is easy to moderate. On some areas, you may want your horse to have shoes or boots to cross rocks, but most of the trail is packed earth. A different trail leads from Hermit Park to Homestead Meadows, a USDA forest service area that is interesting to see. Some of the original homesteads are still there, and the riding is easy.

Features include cabins, RV and tent camping, group campground, reservable group pavilion, and trails for hiking, horseback riding, and mountain biking.

Directions

From I-25 and US Hwy 34 (passing through Loveland): Drive west on Highway 34 toward Estes Park. Turn left (south) onto Mall Road (CR63) for 6 miles. Turn left (east) onto U.S. Highway 36 for 2.1 miles. The entrance to Hermit Park will be on the right.

From I-25 and State Hwy 66 (passing through Longmont): Drive west on Highway 66 to Lyons, Colorado. Turn right onto US-36 W/5th Ave/W Main Street. Continue to follow US-36 W for ~16.5 miles. The entrance to Hermit Park will be on the left

Hermit Park Open Space requires a \$10 entrance permits, and is open March through mid December.

Trail Care -- July 30

Lion Gulch Trail

The trail is popular for hikers and equestrians. Here are a few facts about the gulch and its trail:

- 3 to 3.5 miles long, depending how far up Homestead Meadows you go
- 1374 feet in elevation gain
- Dogs allowed (off leash if under voice control)
- Named "for its healthy mountain lion population"
- Trail head on US 36 12.7 miles from Lyons, 8 miles from Estes Park.

So why are we talking about this trail? More than 25 years ago, LCHA adopted the Lion Gulch Trail, providing trail maintenance 3 times each year. We have given care and repair, both minor and major.

Then the Pandemic started. Guess what? in 2020, USDA Forest Service closed the trail to all users, including LCHA maintenance crews. No maintenance occurred on the trail.

In 2021, the trail opened again, but we still have not maintained it due to lingering concerns about Covid-19.

Now it is time to restart maintenance on Lion Gulch Trail. An LCHA trail maintenance crew will work on Lion Gulch Trail.

Directions:

From Loveland, take US 34 west toward Estes Park. As you leave the Big Thompson canyon, turn left onto Mall Road (first left after you leave the canyon; a mini-golf place is on the left of US 34).

Follow Mall Rd. until it intersects with US 36. Turn left onto US 36 (away from Estes Park). Follow US 36 about 8 miles. The trail head is on the right side. If you get to Pinewood Springs, you went too far.

From Longmont, take CO 66 west until it joins with US 36. Go through Lyons on US 36, and follow US 36 toward Estes Park. Go through Pinewood Springs on US 36. The trail head is about 3 miles north-west of Pinewood Springs on US 36, on the left side of the road.

Medieval Games Clinic – Melissa Midzor

Come learn the skills which knights and other mounted warriors practiced in the medieval period! These are based on historical games or training techniques, with minor adaptations for safety and ease of handling. Some examples include:

Quintain Of European origin, this was used for joust training. A wooden post, with a shield/target attached to a horizontal arm that rotates upon impact. The rider used a lance to strike the shield as they ride past, the more rotations the higher the score.

Rings This was used by Europeans, Turkish, and Arabic warriors. Rings of various sizes are suspended from the arm of a standard. The rider attempts to spear the rings with the tip of their lance.

Reed Chop

Reed Chop This is a Turkish "Mamluk" warfare game. Reeds/sticks of varying heights are placed in 2 rows. The rider goes down the middle, and uses a sword to cut down each reed, alternating strikes to the left and right.

Note - we use wooden swords for training/safety.

In addition, we will also be doing spear throwing and tent-pegging.

An Active Day for LCHA

IN the morning, LCHA members parked in an open space near the entrance to Sylvan Dale Guest Ranch. However, once they had tacked up and walked or ridden down the hill toward the Sylvan Dale barn, they discovered a large arena covered in a canopy of trees gave deep shade. Clinic

The arena was the site for a clinic: **Building on a Partnership Through Softness and Feel**. The instructor was Karen Burbank, who did a very good job of leading the 14 participants through ground work and some exercises.

If we need to cancel an event, your ride leader can get in touch with you to let you know before you drive to the location. You won't use gasoline or time waiting for an event that isn't going to happen. Also, your event leader needs to know if anyone is coming: If no one signs up, the leader may cancel or reschedule the event. And, if you have any special concerns or circumstances (for example, it is your horse's first ride with a group), your leader can plan to deal with the situation in the best possible way.

Limit

What's the Deal with "Limit"?

Wilderness areas, properties owned by the city of Fort Collins, and Red Mountain Open Space have a "12-heartbeat rule": a group cannot include more than 12 heartbeats when using trails in these areas. When riding our horses, the rule limits our groups to 6 riders (plus 6 horses with hearts) to meet the 12-heartbeat rule.

However, if we have significantly more than 6 riders who want to ride, we can split them into 2 or more groups, each group including 6 riders (1 ride leader plus 5 others). The second group must leave the trail head 20 to 25 minutes after the first so that they do not merge with the first group.

When "Limit" is 4 horse trailers, it means that the parking space can hold only 4 horse trailers (tightly packed). However, we encourage "trailer pooling" if more than 4 people want to go on the ride. Actually, we encourage "trailer pooling" for any ride. The benefits are obvious.

For all rides except the Christmas Caroling on Horseback, bring your lunch (unless your ride leader tells you otherwise). You will have lunch somewhere on the trail.

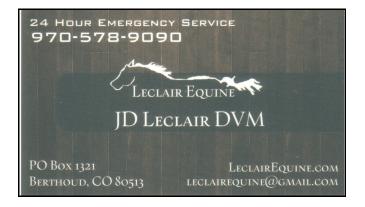
