# **Random thoughts and happenings**

"Trust your form, don't aim too long, and just shoot the shot." "Remember your basics: stance, grip, posture, bow arm, anchor point, release and follow-through."

These thoughts kept running through my brain as I walked up to the line at the largest competition I've ever participated in: *The Vegas Shoot*. With only two ends of three arrows to 'warm up', I was about to embark on a learning curve that I had never before imagined. Shooting three arrows in two minutes, indoors, at a spot no bigger than a dime,



from twenty yards away is hard enough, however, with over 3,000 other people shooting *plus* spectators, I was having trouble closing my mind to distractions.

Each group within the 'flight' consisted of four people. My group consisted of two younger archers, Jason and

Aspyn, probably in their mid 20s, a middle-aged lady, Michelle, and myself. After exchanging pleasantries, the middle-aged lady, Michelle, seemed nervous and quite chatty. So, we sat and talked while we awaited the command to move to the line to shoot. I asked her about the keychain she had attached to her quiver belt with all sorts of metals and charms, and she explained that they were from other shoots she had attended in the past. Little did I know, Michelle was so nervous that she would never stop chatting - not even when on the line and shooting. However, after a few arrows I was able to tune here out – more or less.

We finished our end, went up to the targets to score, went back behind the line, and waited for the next end to begin. All the while Michelle continued chatting. She never really said anything of importance, just chatted. When we went to the line, the signal to begin shooting was given. I came to full draw... something behind me was making a jingling noise. I let down and looked over my shoulder to see Michelle's bowstring all tangled up in her charms. "Help, I'm stuck!" she exclaimed. I almost stopped to help her, but I was there to do my best, no matter what. Any other time, I would have dropped what I was doing to come to the rescue. However, she was the one with the wad of charms hanging from her quiver. She was the one who got tangled

up, so it would be up to her to untangle herself. Besides the clock was already down to less than a minute and a half, and I hadn't even taken my first shot. I guess she finally got herself untangled and got off three quick shots. I barely had time to finish my third shot before the whistle blew. Coming to the realization that the situation wasn't going to improve, I forced myself to concentrate on tuning her out. (Note to self: find someone who cannot be quiet to come to my next practice session.) At least I only had to shoot next to her for the first two days.

The final day of shooting was really exciting. We were placed in flights with people of approximately the same skill level. The shoot went off without a hitch, even though I didn't shoot as well in the finals as I had the previous two rounds. I have to wonder: Did I shoot better the two previous days because I had to force myself to concentrate on tuning out my chatty friend?

I ended the weekend with a score that was better than I expected. I scored a 791 out of a possible 900, but just the experience and knowledge I gained from *The Vegas Shoot* made up for the score.

But just wait until next year!!

# From the Hunter's Kitchen North American Venison Goulash

Is it soup, stew, casserole, or just simple comfort food?
There is often confusion around goulash. European and North American are not even close to being the same dish. The European goulash includes stewing meat, onions, and lots of paprika



and is Hungary's national dish. The North American version, for most of us, is like the original Hamburger Helper.

North American goulash is easy to make, a fabulous way to use ground venison and is a quick fix for lunch, dinner, or hunting camp. The ingredients can be altered for preferences and palates around the table. I love adding diced jalapeno, and some like to include sugar to make the dish sweet.

Peas or corn can also be added, which increases the confusion of whether the dish is a soup, stew, or casserole. Hungarian goulash is typically considered a stew. However, the North American goulash is best described as a one-skillet dinner or casserole.

## **INGREDIENTS**

- 2 Tbsp olive Oil
- 2 lbs. ground venison
- 1 large yellow onion, diced
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 cup beef broth
- 1 14.5 oz. can diced tomatoes with juice
- 1 15 oz. can tomato sauce
- 10.5 oz. can Rotel
- 1 6 oz. can tomato paste
- 2 Tbsp soy sauce
- 1 Tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1 Tbsp seasoned salt (Bearded Butcher Original or Cajun work great)
- 1Tbsp paprika
- 2 tsp ground black pepper
- 1 tsp oregano
- 1 tsp thyme
- 1 tsp basil
- 1 tsp cumin
- 2 cups elbow macaroni (or your favorite pasta)
- 2 cups frozen peas or corn (optional)
- 2 cups cheddar cheese, grated

# **Directions**

- 1. Heat a Dutch oven or stockpot on med-high heat. Add the oil and the ground venison. Cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. As the meat starts to brown, add the diced onion, garlic, and bay leaves. Cook for 4 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- 2. Add the broth, diced tomatoes, tomato sauce, Rotel, tomato paste, soy sauce, Worcestershire sauce and spices. Stir well.

- 3. Reduce the heat to low, cover and simmer for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- 4. Stir in the macaroni noodles (uncooked), cover, cook for 20-25 minutes, or wait until the pasta is almost tender. Add the frozen vegetables and cook 5 minutes. Add the grated cheese and stir until melted.
- 5. Remove and discard bay leaves and serve hot.
