## **General Meeting Minutes** Date: April 7, 2024 Time: 9:00

#### *Type of Meeting:* General

*Call to order:* The meeting was called to order at 9:03 a.m.

- *I. Approval of minutes from last meeting:* Kelvin moved that the minutes from the March meeting be approved; Bryon seconded the motion. Motion Passed.
- *II. Treasurer's Report:* Main account has \$13,529.67; Youth account has \$471.98.

#### III. Open issues/Old Business:

a) High Noon on the Gila Bow Raffle: Scott asked the membership for volunteers for the shoot. We need people to help set the final courses on Wednesday and Thursday, folks to help during the shoot, and especially to help clean up everything on Sunday afternoon.

Debbie reminded that everyone who wants to shoot the competition courses must register online prior to Friday, April 12 at 6:00 pm. Those who register for the competitive will automatically get to shoot the fun courses. Those who want to shoot ONLY the two (2) fun courses are welcome to register on Friday from 1:00pm to 6pm, Saturday from 7:00am to 4:00pm, or Sunday from 7:00am to 10:00am.

c) **Restrooms:** Doors and locks have been replaced. Still waiting on plans to decide what materials need to be purchased. In the

meantime, we will have eight porta-potties and a hand washing station for the High Noon on the Gila shoot, in addition to the permanent restrooms.

#### IV: New Business:

- *a) Cotton Bags:* We need new bags to cover the cotton bales. Tim will look into getting some.
- *b) Target inventory for May meeting:* Butch reported that he will start the inventory as we collect the targets after the High Noon shoot.
- *c) Clean-up after the shoot:* Scott reiterated that we need volunteers to help pick up targets after the shoot, in addition to folks to help with general cleanup of the range after the participants have left.

#### V. Items from the floor:

- *kids' Outdoor Experience:* Bryon reported that the YVRGC held their annual Kids' Outdoor Experience at our range on March 23<sup>rd</sup>. Although there were only 18 kids that showed up, the kids and their parents had a great time. He also stated that he was really impressed with our club and the number of volunteers that showed up to help run the Experience.
- b) Banding for Target: Ed reminded the club that we need to band the bales for the targets. Scott stated that we have some banding supplies in the Conex boxes, but we don't have a banding tool. Scott will look into acquiring one.
- c) Laptop Computer: The club has an old, old Apple computer, and an old laptop that cannot function as needed. Debbie has been researching computers and prices, and has found a couple for under \$500 that will fill the bill. David moved that the club appropriate up to \$550 to purchase a new PC laptop computer; Austin seconded the motion. Motion passed.
- d) Women on the Wing/Yuma Desert Doves Pheasants Forever: Tanja reported that the Yuma Desert Doves is holding their 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Banquet on Saturday, June 1, 2024 at the Elks Lodge on W 32<sup>nd</sup> Street. Tickets are \$75 for a single ticket which includes dinner, 1yr membership in Quails Forever/Pheasants Forever, and 5 door prize tickets; \$115 for a couple which includes two dinners, 1yr membership in Quails Forever/Pheasants Forever, and 10 door prize tickets.

- e) Chronograph: Dustin reported that Garmin has a very accurate chronograph that is very small about the size of a GoPro and costs about \$600. Debbie asked if our old chronograph still works, and Kelvin said it just needs new batteries. Since we are so close to the High Noon shoot, this topic was tabled until the May meeting.
- *f*) *Award Tumblers:* The tumblers are done and waiting to be picked up.
- g) Kids' Outdoor Experience: Bryon reported on the YVRGC annual Kids' Outdoor Experience held at our range on March 23<sup>rd</sup>. Although only 18 kids and their parents attended this year, there were nothing but positive comments about the event. Bryon also commented on how impressed he was with the number of volunteers from our club who attended. There were actually more volunteers than participants, and he thanked everyone for their efforts.
- *VI. Adjournment:* Fritz asked if there were any more items from the floor. Jennifer W. moved that we adjourn the meeting; Jesus J. seconded the motion. Motion passed. The meeting was adjourned at 9:27am.

## From the Hunter's Kitchen:

#### **REVERSE SEARED ELK ROAST**

This method works with all large, red-meat roasts, so beef, deer, moose, caribou, etc. It is intended for hind-leg roasts you want to eat rare to medium.

COURSE: MAIN COURSE CUISINE: AMERICAN SERVINGS: 16 SERVINGS AUTHOR: <u>HANK SHAW</u> PREP TIME: 15MINUTES COOK TIME: 2 HOURS, 15 MINUTES TOTAL TIME: 2 HOURS, 30 MINUTES



#### **INGREDIENTS**

- □ 5 pounds elk roast (or other large roast)
- $\Box$  2 tablespoons olive oil
- □ Salt
- □ 2 tablespoons cracked black pepper
- $\Box$  2 tablespoons ground cumin
- □ 1 tablespoon ground coriander (optional)

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Coat the roast with the oil, then massage the salt and spices into it.
- 2. If you are using a smoker, get it ready. You want to smoke around 200°F and no hotter than 250°F. Wood choice is up to you. If you are using your oven, set it to 225°F.
- 3. Set the roast in the oven or smoker and insert a probe thermometer into its thickest part. With a roast around this size, you will be shooting for an internal temperature of about 110°F to 120°F. This could take as long as 3 hours to reach, but normally it takes a couple hours.
- 4. When you hit that temperature, remove the roast and set it on a cutting board. Remove the probe thermometer. Either increase the heat of your oven to at least 500°F and better

yet 550°F or get a grill or pizza oven roaring. 600°F is not too much heat.

- 5. Return the roast to the screaming hot oven or grill (cover the grill if that's what you are using), and roast for 10 to 15 minutes. If you've hit 600°F, you may only need about 6 minutes. You are looking for a pretty, browned crust.
- 6. Remove the roast once again and let it set on a cutting board. Re-insert the thermometer, ideally in the same hole. Let this sit until the internal temperature hits at least 127°F, and no hotter than 145°F. In terms of time, no less than 10 minutes and up to 30 minutes is fine. Slice and serve.


#### NOTES

The 5 pounds for the roast is just as an example. See the headnotes for guidance on timing.

#### **Keys to Success**

- Cooking large roasts is an art, not a science, because there are so many variables in terms of size, temperature, and time. If you don't have a probe thermometer, err on undercooking your roast. You can always cook it a bit more.
- If time is not an issue, you can drop the smoker temperature to 200°F or lower and get a really nice smoke on the roast before finishing. It's up to you.
- The spices I use are just what I like. Use what you want or skip everything but the salt. You need the salt.
- Leftovers make great sandwiches and are good in steak salads and chopped in tacos, burritos, or enchiladas.
