Physician's Corner



I had the privilege of being KT's family doctor from the time she was 40 to 58 years old. I became her doctor during my family medicine residency clinic in Kentucky, then she transferred her care to my private practice when I graduated 3 years later. Physically, she is disabled by a combination of chronic non-malignant pain syndrome that included reflex sympathetic dystrophy, fibromyalgia, & degenerative disc disease.

Her life was riddled with relational pain and disappointments. When she was 16 years old, she became pregnant. Her family and boyfriend supported her choice to abort her baby. After her relationship ended, she carried the guilt, shame, and regret of that choice for decades. After marrying a few years later, she had a son. She divorced after years of domestic violence which spiraled into depression and an anxiety disorder.

KT came to me seeking treatment for her pain and I prescribed standard medical treatment, then referred her for psychiatric and orthopedic management of her pain.

After 5 years of establishing trust, rapport, and prayer, she became aware of the spiritual pain the abortion inflicted on her conscience. The guilt, shame, and regret from the abortion could not be medically or psychologically "treated" without spiritual intervention from Jesus, the Great Physician. After 500 medical encounters in the span of 15 years, she allowed me the privilege of sharing the healing grace of Christ. She continues to live with chronic physical pain, but now clings to her freedom in Christ and eternal hope. "Father God, thank you for the gift of pain. Thank you that you did not spare your Son, but for the joy that was set before him Jesus lived, endured a painful death for KT and my sins, rose again, and is soon returning to show us the way to eternal life without death, sin, sorrow, tears, and pain. Thank you for giving us the Holy Spirit to change us to be more like Jesus and to shield us from the evil one. In Christ's name, Amen"
