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A QUIET PLACE WITH A BUG

Autumn, a time to take a breath? Not true this year, at least for me. From serious global issues such as the refugee crises to very personal crises in the lives of people I love, the river of time seems to be speeding along. What do I do? Two helpful images come to mind — a bug on a branch and a twenty-something Jew looking for a quiet place.

Let's start with the man. In bad times for Israel, Jesus of Nazareth had traveled from his hometown to give a message of hope and joy. Suddenly he was no longer in a peaceful carpentry shop in Nazareth but surrounded by a whirlwind of unaccustomed activity. So what did he do? (Mk 1: 35),



In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there.

That is good and practical advice. From time to time I give up trying to sort out my thoughts and anxieties. I just try to get outside of myself. Modifying a simple practice of the Vietnamese Zen master and political activist Thich Nhat Hanh (1928-), I just breathe in and try to calm myself (a sort of DIY Prozac substitute.) Then I slowly exhale and look around.

What I saw this morning was a new crop of little Fence Lizards beginning to explore the tiny patch of earth they will inhabit and looking for shelter from the occasional blasts of autumn wind. It occured to me that I was doing the same thing, indeed that is what all of us are doing in the small patches of the cosmos we inhabit

The cold blasts this autumn come from a lot of sources. The infantile political dramas both domestic and international. The suffering and dying of millions of men, women, and children attempting to escape from brutalizing situations. Destruction of our planet. Poverty. Shallowness. And, closer to home are those we love who are valiantly living with medical conditions which will eventually kill them. I think the important thing, just as with the little lizards at my feet, is that we must all keep on going. Which brings me to the bug on a branch.

Our friend Cliff Edwards is eloquent in his description of Issa's (1763-1828) stories of little creatures. "Their persistent will to live, to build their nests in the presence of danger, to sing their song, through every loss." This is how Cliff translated what I consider one of Issa's most poignant and helpful poems,

> A bug on a branch Swept away down the river Still singing his song.

That's the point, isn't it little lizards? Even though we are caught up in the strong current of circumstances, everything is as it should be if we just keep singing our song!

Olive harvest is fun for friends and very helpful to us. There are also regular work days planned for everything from baking pies to clearing forest trails, and helping with the food pantry.

A QUESTION FOR SISTER JULIE:

What is happening these days at Starcross, especially with the land?

ANSWER: I realize every day how blessed it is to live here. We are working on a conservation easement to perpetually protect Starcross as a sanctuary for people and nature.

People who come here always comment on the peacefulness. And it is an island of tranquillity and fertility amongst some nearby agribusiness vineyards. However, behind the scenes there is a lot of activity going on.

All summer long, friends, Farm Interns and volunteers from the WWOOF (WorldWide Opportunities on Organic Farms) program have been toiling away in the garden, orchards and kitchen. We've produced tons of wonderful food to feed ourselves and others at the Food Pantry.

Despite the wealth of Sonoma County, there is poverty in this underserved and remote area. Besides food, our biweekly Food Pantry also distributes clothing, garden plant starts and household items, appreciated by neighbors, some of whom have only seasonal work.

This year's garden was our best yet thanks to more use of organic compost and some excellent volunteers. We chipped brush into mulch and were able to water less, which really helped in this fourth year of drought.

The two olive groves, *Francis of Assisi* and *Teresa of Avila* are thriving. Years of organic fertilization and supplementing needed nutrients have resulted in vigorous trees which literally could produce olives for centuries.

A QUESTION FOR BROTHER TOBY:

For over 50 years Starcross has been a small autonomous group accomplishing a lot of things; BUT the reality of life is that all founders, even you, will eventually fade away. So how long will Starcross last?

ANSWER: Well it would probably be presumptuous to say "forever." Many years ago I asked the same question when I was working with First Peoples. Their answer was "As long as the mountain shall stand and the river will run." I think we at Starcross can promise that! We have been concerned about the future for many years. The land has to be protected. We are working with a group of people to ensure that it is perpetually preserved as a sanctuary for folks, creatures, trees, water and the like. Also, we know at some point there has to be a transition between the original monks who have been guiding things and a larger group. Our legal structure now provides for that. Already there are a lot of special friends who are helping to make decisions and/or bring plans to reality. We have a really big compassionate circle of involved people and a non-profit legal structure, that will make sure Starcross is around for a long as that mountain is standing and that river is running!
