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GENERAL RULES

These rules apply to the entire show

1. This Flower Show conforms to the standards established by National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC). The HANDBOOK FOR FLOWER SHOWS (HB), as updated with revisions posted on the NGC website, is the authority for all issues not covered by the schedule which is “the Law of the Show”. An updated copy of the Handbook for Flower Shows may be downloaded from the NGC website, www.gardenclubs.org.
2. Entries are open to all members of the Tulsa Garden Club, members of the affiliate clubs of the Tulsa Garden Center, or guest members of Oklahoma Garden Clubs, Inc. and the public, provided they are approved by the Class Chair.
3. Entry tags/cards are available from the Entries Chairs, see page 2. Entry cards are to be filled out in advance.
4. This Schedule (Schedule) and Exhibitor’s Sheets for Horticulture are available online at: www.tulsagardenclub.org and at each Tulsa Garden Club Meeting.
5. ONLINE REGISTRATION available on the Tulsa Garden Website at www.tulsagardenclub.org.
6. Each exhibitor must fill out an Exhibitor’s Sheet, available online at www.tulsagardenclub.org before specimens may be placed.
7. Complete procedure for making entries in the Divisions varies and can be found in the Division Rules for each Division.
8. All entries will be accepted beginning Friday, October 24, 2025, from 12 pm to 4 pm and Saturday, October 25, 2025, from 8am-10 am at the Tulsa Garden Center.
9. Entries are to be removed between 4 pm and 5 pm on Saturday, October 25, 2025. Judging will begin promptly at 10 am Saturday, October 25, 2025. Judging will be by the NGC Standard System of Awarding, as per the HB.
10. The Classification Chair for each Division checks exhibits for conformity to Schedule prior to judging. Final determination for conformance is the judges’ responsibility.
11. The General Chair and the Classification Chair for each Division are available during judging for possible

consultation. They, along with the Judges and Clerks, are the only personnel allowed on the floor during judging.

12. The decisions of the judges are final. Awards may be withheld if not merited.
13. There must be an emphasis on FRESH plant materials; **no** artificial plant material is permitted in any exhibit in any division.
14. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per class, EXCEPTION: Horticulture Division.
15. Table dimensions are expressed by depth by width by height.
16. All tables will be covered with black tablecloths and walls are white.
17. Tulsa Garden Club will strive to assure the safety of all items after arrival and placement but is not responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.
18. No plants on the state endangered species list or on the state noxious plant list will be allowed. Native wildflowers obtained legally may be entered. For information:

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AWARDS

**The NGC Standard System of Awarding (HB, Ch. 1, pg. 5) is used
in all Divisions**

Only one (1)

First Place per class or subclass Blue Ribbon = 90+ points

Second Place per class or subclass Red Ribbon = 85+ points

Third place per class or subclass Yellow Ribbon = 80+ points

One (1) or more Honorable Mention White Ribbons = 75+ points

All blue-ribbon exhibits and all non-blue ribbon exhibits scoring 90+ points must be signed and dated by an NGC Accredited Judge on the judging panel.

HORTICULTURE DIVISION TOP EXHIBITOR AWARDS

Division Award Award of Horticultural Excellence (HB, Ch. 5, p. 40) Each division must include at least two (2) or more sections, EXCEPTION: Educational Division. Only one (1) award will be offered to the highest scoring blue ribbon exhibit

scoring 95 or more and correctly named exhibit in the entire Horticulture Division. It is a rosette of green, orange and blue ribbons.

Section Awards Unlimited number can be offered scoring 95+ (only one award per section). Each section must consist of three (3) or more classes.

Arboreal Award For cut or container-grown trees and/or shrubs. It is a rosette of green ribbons.

Award of Merit For all cut non-woody specimens including vines. It is a rosette of orange ribbons.

Collector's Showcase Award For collections and displays. It is a rosette of brown and green ribbons.

Elfin Award For petite horticulture specimens in a non-Petite Standard Flower Show. It is a small rosette of chartreuse and purple ribbons.

Grower's Choice Award For all container-grown plants. It is a rosette of dark green ribbons.

EDUCATIONAL DIVISION TOP EXHIBITOR AWARD

Division Award Educational Top Exhibitor Award

(HB, Ch. 5, p. 43) A minimum of two (2) educational exhibits designated as eligible must be present. The exhibit may be the work of an individual or organization. Only one (1) award will be offered per show. It is a rosette of brown and white ribbons.

BOTANICAL ARTS DIVISION TOP EXHIBITOR AWARDS

Section Awards each section must consist of at least three (3) classes with at least twelve (12) exhibits required in all classes combined.

Botanical Arts Horticulture Award is a rosette of light brown ribbons.

YOUTH TOP EXHIBITOR AWARDS

One (1) award per each of the three (3) age groups. Three (3) awards may be offered for each division, one per age group. It is a rosette of red/white/blue ribbons.

RECOGNITION AWARDS

Sweepstakes Award one (1) in the Overall Flower Show. It is a rosette of green/white ribbons. Awarded to the one exhibitor scoring the most points for exhibiting in each of the following divisions: Horticulture Division, Education Division, Botanical Arts Division, and Overall, Flower Show.

SPECIAL TULSA GARDEN CLUB AWARDS

Helen Pearce Memorial Award Awarded for the highest scoring Foliage Container-Grown exhibit in the Horticulture Division. It is a rosette of two shades of pink ribbons.

Loyce Anderson Memorial Award Awarded for the highest scoring Cacti or Succulent exhibit in the Horticulture Division. It is a rosette of black and red ribbons.

Mary Byrd Memorial Award Awarded for the highest scoring Arboreal Exhibit by a novice*** exhibitor in the Horticulture Division. It is a rosette of green and gold ribbons.

Tulsa Garden Club Special Award Awarded for the highest scoring Combination Planting exhibit in the Horticulture Division. It is a rosette of yellow ribbons.

***Novice designer/exhibitor is a Tulsa Garden Club member who has not won a blue ribbon in the named division in a Tulsa Garden Club Flower Show.

DIVISION I HORTICULTURE

“CELEBRATE”

HORTICULTURE REQUIRED RULES apply to this division only

1. The NGC exhibit policies are printed in the HANDBOOK FOR FLOWER SHOWS, CHAPTER 6, PAGE 55, EXHIBITING IN THE HORTICULTURE DIVISION.
2. All exhibits must be FRESH. Dried and preserved specimens may be entered in the Botanical Arts-Horticulture Division.
3. All exhibits must have been grown by exhibitor.
4. Plant material must be in its natural state and may not be altered by application (treatment) of oil, commercial “shine” products, etc., that change the natural appearance. No wiring of specimens is permitted.
5. Only foliage and/or flowers naturally grown and still attached to the specimen are permitted in the Flower Show. Unattached foliage is never included with a cut bloom specimen.
6. All plant material must have been in the possession of exhibitor the appropriate number of days listed in chart on page 55 of the (HB). Annuals 90 days, EXCEPTION: no minimum for early maturing seeds and/or transplants; Bulbs 90 days, EXCEPTION: no minimum for forced bulbs/corms/tubers/rhizomes, such as: amaryllis, paper whites); Houseplants 90 days; Perennials 90 days = July 25 last day to purchase plants; Combination Plantings grown together for 6 weeks = September 13 last day to purchase plants; EXCEPTION: troughs 6 months; Arboreal 6 months = April 26 last day to purchase plants.
7. The rules for a single species, cut or container-grown specimens are listed in THE HANDBOOK FOR FLOWER SHOWS or its supplement, HORTICULTURE EXHIBITING AND JUDGING.
8. To receive an NGC Top Exhibitor Award, Exhibitor **must** identify his/her entry by its binomial or currently accepted scientific designation. (Consult the HANDBOOK FOR FLOWER SHOWS, EXHIBITING IN THE HORTICULTURE DIVISION, CHAPTER 6.

9. Entry cards/tags are available at any Tulsa Garden Club meeting and are to be filled out in advance if possible. Refer to the HANDBOOK FOR FLOWER SHOWS, CHAPTER 6, page 57, for a correctly filled out entry tag/card.
10. Exhibitor can have more than one entry per class, if each entry is a different species, variety, cultivar, type, or color.
11. Cut specimens should not have foliage below the water line, EXCEPTION: *Gladiolus*.
12. Only the Horticulture Classification Chair and/or General Show Chair have the authority to sub-divide classes by color, form size, cultivar, variety, or other distinguishing characteristics. (HB, Ch. 1, p. 3)
13. If a plant is considered a flowering plant, it should be exhibited as a flowering specimen. Foliage plants may flower but should be exhibited as foliage plants if they are grown for their leaves.
14. Specimens with a class designation in Schedule may not be entered in the "Any other named Worthy Specimen Class".
15. The Scales of Points for Horticulture are in Chapter 14 of the HANDBOOK FOR FLOWER SHOWS.
16. Exhibitor to provide clear, transparent, colorless containers of suitable size and stability for cut specimens. Some containers are available from Tulsa Garden Club.
17. Exhibitors are to furnish plastic wrap wedging for cut specimens. Wedging may be visible but should not distract from the cut specimen. Anchoring is allowed.
18. Double potting is allowed, but the inner pot must not be visible.

Section F Petite Horticulture Specimens

“PARTY WITH A PARASOL”

Eligible for Elfin Award

Exhibits are naturally small growth, or those designated as dwarf or miniature varieties or cultivars by nurseries and plant societies.

Class 18 Arboreal: one (1) branch, must include an apical tip, central leader and several nodes, not to exceed 18” in length. Must be grown by exhibitor for 6 months. All novices are eligible for the Mary Byrd Memorial Award.

Class 19 Container-grown Flowering specimen: in pot not to exceed 4 inches. Must have grown exhibit for 90 days.

Class 20 Cut Flowering specimen: three (3) stems in a container.

Class 21 Container-grown Foliage specimen: in pot not to exceed 4 inches. Must have grown exhibit for 90 days. Eligible for the Helen Pearce Memorial Award.

Section G Arboreal

“PARTY IN THE YARD”

Eligible for Arboreal

Exhibits are cut or container-grown trees and/or shrubs and must be grown by exhibitor for 6 months.

Class 22 Coniferous foliage branch from a shrub or tree: one (1) branch, must include an apical tip, central leader and several nodes, not to exceed 30” in length.

Class 23 Berried branch from a shrub or tree: one (1) branch, must include an apical tip, central leader and several nodes, not to exceed 30” in length.

Class 24 Non-conifer evergreen shrub or tree: one (1) branch, must include an apical tip, central leader and several nodes, not to exceed 30” in length.

Section H Collections

“PARTY UNDER THE GAZEBO” (same as Section G)

Eligible for Collector’s Showcase

Collections Rules

1. A minimum of five (5) different specimens (cut and/or container-grown) exhibited in individual containers, or the appearance of being individually exhibited.
2. Specimens such as evergreens and some epiphytes not requiring containers must appear as individual specimens. Some sort of individual container, plate, mat, etc., may be required by Schedule.
3. Specimens must be related, such as all one (1) plant family (*Rosaceae*, *Pinaceae*), one genus (*Hosta*), similar characteristics (bromeliads, ferns, orchids, shade foliage, flowering annuals, vegetables, petite), etc. Exhibitor must provide a card stating the plant relationships.
4. Advance registration may be required to ensure space is available.
5. The collection constitutes a single entry and only one entry card is used.
6. Placement of specimens within the exhibit is the responsibility of exhibitor.
7. Staging containers must be compatible and furnished by exhibitor. Staging accessories such as mats, risers, etc., are permitted but must not detract from the specimen; plant material must dominate.
8. Each specimen must be correctly and clearly labeled with the current scientific designation, and in a manner to easily identify the specimen’s location in the collection. This may be done with a single chart or individual placards.

9. Individual specimen scores in the Collection are NOT averaged; the lowest scoring specimen in the Collection will determine the highest ribbon possible for the exhibit.
10. Maximum space allocated for the collection is $\frac{1}{4}$ of an 8-foot table measuring 30" x 96" x 30".
11. The Scale of Points for collections is in Chapter 14 of the Handbook for Flower Shows, p. 129.

Section I Displays

"COLLECTING TREASURES AT THE PARTY"

Eligible for Collector's Showcase

Displays Rules

1. A minimum of five (5) different specimens (cut and/or container-grown) exhibited in individual containers, or the appearance of being individually exhibited.
2. Specimens such as evergreens and some epiphytes not requiring containers must appear as individual specimens.
3. The display is a single entry, and only one entry card is used.
4. Specimens should be related, such as all one plant family (*Rosaceae*, *Pinaceae*), one genus (*Hosta*, *Paeonia*), similar characteristics (bromeliads, ferns, orchids), etc.
5. Advance registration may be required to ensure space is available.
6. Cut specimen containers need not be clear nor identical.

7. While artistic effect is of equal importance to cultural perfection, featured plant specimens must dominate.
8. Placement of display is the responsibility of exhibitor.
9. Staging materials, including shelves, frames, blocks, background panel, man-made sculptures, underlays, other fresh and/or dried plant material, etc., are permitted but are used only to enhance plant materials.
10. Each specimen must be correctly and clearly identified with the current scientific designation, and in a manner to easily identify the specimen's location in the display.
11. Individual specimen scores in the display are NOT averaged; the lowest scoring specimen in the display will determine the highest ribbon possible for the exhibit.
12. Maximum space allocated for the display is $\frac{1}{4}$ of an 8- foot table measuring 30" x 96" x 30".
13. The Scale of Points for Displays is in Chapter 14 of the Handbook for Flower Shows, p. 130.

Exhibits are a grouping of three (3) or more botanically different plants with similar cultural requirements such as light, water and humidity. Natural accessories permitted in all combination plantings but must be in scale with plantings and container, and theme appropriate to the plants.

Class 33 Desertarium: a miniature landscape in a container with high transparent sides (no animals). The top may be closed or open.

EDUCATION RULES

1. The NGC Exhibit Policies are printed in the Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 8, Educational Division, page 85.
2. Education Exhibits may be the work of more than one individual or organization unless a Student Judge, or an Accredited Judge is seeking exhibiting credit for preparing an educational exhibit.
3. For Educational Top Exhibitor Award an exhibit must occupy a minimum of eighteen (18) square feet surface area.
4. Exhibits will be staged on a 30” x 96” x 30” table covered with a black tablecloth furnished by staging.
5. Some plant material is required.
6. Exhibits are competitive.
7. Advance registration with the Education Entries Chair is required by July 10, 2025.
8. The Scale of Points for Education Exhibits is in Chapter 14 in the Handbook for Flower Shows, p. 130.

BOTANICAL ARTS DIVISION RULES

Eligible for Botanical Arts Horticulture

1. The NGC rules for Botanical Arts Horticulture are printed in the Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 10, pages 91-96. Eligible for Botanical Arts Horticulture Award (HB, Ch. 5, pp. 44, 91).
2. All horticulture must have been grown by exhibitor.
3. All exhibits are dried and preserved specimens and must be correctly named by its binomial or currently accepted scientific designation.
4. Exhibits may have no additional embellishments (dyes, glitter, spray paint or manipulation such as cutting or twisting) permitted. Materials such as Petal-Proof®, Super Surface Sealer® or hairspray are permitted to prevent shattering of fragile flowers, seed heads, etc.
5. All specimens in an exhibit need to be the same species, variety, cultivar, type or color, EXCEPTION: Class 37).
6. Exhibitor may make more than one entry per class, if each exhibit is a different species, variety, cultivar, type or color.
7. Staging of plant material is at the discretion of exhibitor.
8. Judged by Horticulture Scales of Points located in the HB, Ch. 14 – pp. 129.

Class 34 Preserved flowers one flower or one stem containing one or more flowers displayed in an upright container furnished by exhibitor or on an underlay on the table.

Class 36 Dried seed heads one seed head or a stem containing one or more seed heads displayed in an upright container furnished by exhibitor or on an underlay on the table.

Class 37 A Garden in the Oriental Manner a miniature landscape. Must contain some plant material. Advance registration may be required to ensure space is available. Maximum space allocated for this class is ¼ of an 8-foot table measuring 30” x 96” x 30”. EXCEPTION: Division III Rule #5 does not apply.
