Doug Tallamy's Homegrown National Park is an awesome resource for planting native plants to support native wildlife and ecosystems. This summer, grab a bucket and say, "Shoo!" to mosquito larvae!

Since mosquitoes lay eggs in standing water a bucket gives them a place to do that, then stops them. A natural soil bacterium called Bti (found in mosquito dunks) kills the larvae before they grow up and bite.

This method, sometimes called a "bucket of doom" or "mosquito tea," creates an irresistible breeding site and then



shuts it down without harming pollinators, pets, or people.

- Safe for pollinators
- Safe for pets and children
- Targets mosquito breeding where it starts

Reviving a Legacy

THE FUTURE OF THE TULSA ROSE GARDEN

Member Heather Michaelson-Hale is Chief Horticulturist, Tulsa Parks, Culture & Recreation Department.

The Tulsa Rose Garden has long been a treasured part of Woodward Park and the cultural landscape of our city. Its graceful, terraced beds once featured hundreds of roses, admired by generations of visitors. But over the past decade, the garden has undergone dramatic changes, spurred by the devastating impact of *the Rose Rosette Virus* (RRV).

The Tulsa Parks, Culture, and Recreation Department is responsible for the care and renewal of this space. Though short staffed, our horticulture team has remained committed to restoring the garden thoughtfully, sustainably, and with deep respect for its history.

A Thoughtful Path Forward

Rather than replant the same rose-only design that left the garden vulnerable to disease, our team is building a more resilient, layered planting approach. We are integrating trial proven roses with a mix of ornamental grasses, flowering perennials, and pollinator friendly shrubs. These companion plants reduce disease pressure, improve soil health, and endure seasonal interest beyond the traditional rose bloom period.

To help educate the public, we hope to install new signage throughout the garden. These signs will explain the role of RRV, the risks of monocultures, and how diverse planting creates a more sustainable and healthier garden.

Planning the Next Chapter

Tulsa Parks is currently working with Andy Fusco, Acting Executive Director of Tulsa Garden Center, to develop a master plan for both the Tulsa Rose Garden and the greater Woodward Park landscape. This will help guide long-term improvements, maintenance strategies, and sustainable design practices to ensure the garden remains a vibrant destination for decades to come.

In addition, the Tulsa Rose Garden has been chosen as the site for an American Garden Rose Selections showcase garden on Tier 3. Developed in partnership with notable Rosarian Paul Zimmerman, this tier will feature the top performing roses from AGRS rose trials, selected specifically for success in our region. Those roses will be provided at no cost, and Paul Zimmerman has generously donated his design services for the project.

Community Partnerships in Bloom

Restoring and maintaining the Tulsa Rose Garden is a shared effort, and we are fortunate to have strong partnerships with local plant societies. The Tulsa Area Daylily Society and the Tulsa Perennial Club each maintain dedicated beds within the garden, providing support with planting, weeding, and seasonal care. Their work adds both beauty and diversity to the landscape.

The Tulsa Rose Society, a longtime advocate for the garden, is also stepping into a more active role. Members are contributing their expertise in rose care, assisting with public education, and supporting outreach efforts to help reconnect the community with the garden's evolving story.

A Vision Rooted in Resilience

The future of the Tulsa Rose Garden honors its past while embracing sustainable, adaptive horticulture. We envision a display garden that showcases beauty, biodiversity, and durability, where roses remain central, but are supported by a rich community of plants.

Plans are also underway to move Tulsa Parks' horticulture operations back to Woodward Park. This will allow staff to be more present on site, improving oversight and responsiveness to the garden's needs.

Through partnerships, strategic planning, and a shared love of plants, the Tulsa Rose Garden is poised for a new chapter, one rooted in resilience and full of promise. Special thanks to the Tulsa Garden Club for your ongoing support and stewardship, including the dedicated Rose Fund, which continues to make meaningful improvements in the garden possible.

Watch for the updated show schedule in July on issuu.com and TulsaGardenClub.org. Plan for "Hump Days" workshops: 9:30-11:30 am, Sep 10, Sep 24, Oct 1, Oct 15.

With October 25 in mind, note these requirements for plants to be in your possession:

- Six months—arboreal specimens must have been growing since April 25.
- 90 days—all other plants, except Combination plantings, must have been growing with you since July 25, at latest.
- Six weeks—Combination plantings must be grown together since September 13.


