
Amnesty International: Israel's Apartheid Against Palestinians - Cruel System of Domination and Crime Against Humanity

On the 1st February Amnesty International published a 280-page report indicting Israel in detail for the crime against humanity of apartheid. Framed by its analysis of the internationally-recognised legal definition of apartheid, Israel's Apartheid Against Palestinians - Cruel System of Domination and Crime Against Humanity is the third report of its kind in 12 months, following on from those by <u>B'Tselem</u> and Human Rights Watch.

While Palestinian organisations such as <u>Al-Haq</u> and <u>Addameer</u>, among others, have been employing the concept of apartheid for many years to analyse the oppression and dispossession of the Palestinian people, it is, nevertheless, significant that internationally-renowned human rights organisations like <u>Amnesty</u> are now, finally, recognising the systematic and deliberate nature of that oppression. According to <u>Haaretz</u>, there is a fear among Israeli officials that the United Nations may soon accept the narrative that Israel is an 'apartheid state'. The Israeli hasbara machine has been quick to respond and denounce <u>Amnesty</u>'s report as 'anti-semitic'. Meanwhile, <u>human rights organisations</u> in Israel have sprung to <u>Amnesty</u>'s defence.

Amnesty's report has naturally generated an extensive debate among Palestinian organisations and political analysts. Many have argued that this human rights / international law agenda complements but should not displace the analysis of Israel as an ongoing settler-colonial project with its roots in the late 19th century birth of political Zionism.
