QUICK TIPS!

(1) HOTLANTA IN MARCH

HOTlanta is actually MILDlanta in March. The temperatures are mild--in the 60s. But, it can be rainy, so pack that umbrella. In March the dogwoods bloom, so don't forget your allergy meds.

(2) GET TO THE WESTIN: GET TO KNOW MARTA

MARTA is Atlanta's mass transit system of buses and trains. It uses a BREEZE card: each MARTA trip costs \$2.50, and you load your card with as many trips as you'll need. You can get directions and schedules through the MARTA On the Go app.

Claudio Saunt is the Richard B. Russell Professor in American History and Co-Director of the Center for Virtual History at the University of Georgia. He is the author of four books, most recently, *Unworthy Republic* (2020), which was a finalist for the National Book Award. Dr. Saunt's current project, "The Land Beneath Our Feet," maps in depth and details the Cherokee families who lost their homes in the 1830s, creating a virtual representation of the Cherokee Nation just before the United States drove its 16,000 citizens off their farms and across the Mississippi River.

He took an interest in the elaborate, highly stylized writings on the New York City subway and began documenting, collecting, and archiving it. In 2015, he and four friends co-founded the Right Track Program, an educational organization that uses the traditional hip hop disciplines to inspire creativity for learners of all ages.







NATIONAL CENTER FOR HUMAN & CIVIL RIGHTS

(civilandhumanrights.org)

Through its exhibitions, the center traces the history of the Civil Rights Movement in the United States as well as stories from the struggle for human rights around the world today.



THE WREN'S NEST (www.wrensnest.org)

Once the home of controversial American writer, Joel Chandler Harris, Wren's Nest is Atlanta's oldest house museum. The mission of the museum is to preserve the heritage of African-American folklore. It offers docent-led tours that include Saturday storytelling by professional storytellers.



MLK NATIONAL HISTORIC PARK (nps.gov/malu/index.htm)

The Park includes Dr. King's birthplace, the Historic Ebenezer Baptist Church, and the graves of Dr. King and his wife, Coretta Scott King. The site also features the *International Civil Rights Walk* of Fame, honoring other Civil Rights activists and displaying their actual footsteps in granite and bronze.



CENTER FOR PUPPETRY ARTS (puppet.org)

The museum's Global Gallery offers an exploration of the history and traditions of puppetry from across the globe, revealing how puppetry has been used to communicate messages of reverence, humor, protest, and entertainment. The Jim Henson Gallery explores the influential legacy of the father of Sesame Street.

TRAP MUSIC MUSEUM (trapmusicmuseum.com)

If you want to understand the history of "Trap," the hiphop sub-genre that came out of Atlanta, you need to visit The Trap. The interactive museum's "Escape the Trap" experience examines how trap music documented the aftermath of the '80s crack epidemic in the South, and ended up shaping pop culture at large.



ZOO ATLANTA (zooatlanta.org)

Zoo Atlanta is the home to the last remaining pandas in the US. The four giant pandas are adult female Lun Lun and adult male Yang Yang (both born in in China) and their twin offspring, Ya Lun and Xi Lun (born September 3, 2016, at Zoo Atlanta). The four will leave Atlanta in 2024.

GET SOME AIR!

THE ATLANTA BOTANICAL GARDEN atlantaba.org/

Thirty acres of display gardens and woodlands featuring plant collections that include roses, herbs, conifers, and even carnivorous plants in the heart of the city. There's the Fuqua Conservatory, home to rare and endangered tropical and desert plants, and the Children's Garden. The Fuqua Orchid Center includes a High Elevation Orchid House and a Tropical Orchid House.

Atlanta's spectacular outdoor space comprises 22 miles of unused railroad tracks that circle the city's intown neighborhoods. The Northside Trail is convenient to Buckhead--you'll see why Atlanta is called "The City in a Forest," with old-growth trees mostly blocking out the surrounding Buckhead buildings and making the trail seem secluded.
