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> Second Sunday of Easter/ Divine Mercy Sunday April 24, 2022

From Fr. Rich

One of life's mysteries for me is why we are so good at trying to "keep" the 40 days of Lent but pay little attention to the 50 days of Easter, especially when Lent is meant to be a time to prepare ourselves for this celebration. Now

only on the eighth day of Easter, within a very few days we will have moved on until we come to church wondering why all those flowers are still up there, "Isn't Easter over?"

Today's feast of the Second Sunday of Easter continues the stories of the post-resurrection encounters the disciples and followers of Jesus had as they were trying to figure out where their lives would now take them since their Master and Teacher had been brutally killed.

Little by little, we can see in these stories the dawning realization that something extraordinary happened, something beyond the realm of human understanding. They could feel it in their bones and in their hearts and in their souls. He wasn't just their rabbi and teacher, there was something more there -- something they had never before experienced. And when the miraculous accounts began to be shared, it was as if the sun finally broke through the dark clouds of their depression and loss and they saw it for what it was -- Jesus was the Son of God, and He had, indeed, been raised from the dead. They could feel it down to their deepest core.

This Second Sunday of Easter picked up another "attached feast" during the pontificate of Pope John Paul II when he made this also Divine Mercy Sunday, honoring the devotion of St. Faustina from his native Poland. As he wrote in a prayer about her experiences with Jesus, "And you, Faustina, a gift of God to our time, a gift from the land of Poland to the whole Church, obtain for us an awareness of the depth of Divine Mercy; help us to have a living experience of it and to bear witness to it among our brothers and sisters."

And perhaps that is where my own question gets answered. It is easy to overlook the fifty days of Easter if we have not begun to grasp the depth of God's love for us poured out daily in the mercy we are shown and the mercy we are invited to share. Perhaps that is also why our current Holy Father, Pope Francis, gave the universal Church the gift of a Holy Year of Mercy a few years ago. Offering all of us a time to reflect upon this extraordinary gift from God.

This week, the second week of Easter, try to spend a few moments of self-reflection on how

God has been merciful with you. And let that reflection lead you to a more determined sharing of mercy with your family members, friends, co-workers, and people you encounter daily. When we all take on a greater awareness of and sharing of God's mercy, the fifty days of Easter will seem like nothing but a great treat!

See For Yourself

My appreciation for Thomas has grown through the years. Thomas, the outlier, the one who had to see for himself. I give him credit for not settling for a second-hand experience of the risen Christ. We could do worse than to follow the example of Doubting Thomas.

Most of us learned about Jesus and his Way from our childhood. We listened to the stories of faith at Mass Sunday after Sunday, and we received instruction in Church doctrine. Many Catholics, whether they regularly practice as adults or not, feel their religious training served them well and continues to inform their lives. All to the good. There is something lacking, though, if one's



religious faith does not evolve beyond "what I've been taught."

Like Thomas who was not content with just accepting what others told him, we need to delve deeper and discover the truth of the risen Christ and his teachings for ourselves. An unquestioned faith simply handed down to us will be inadequate to equip us for the spiritual journey to which we are called.

We shouldn't sell short the role of doubt in our faith lives. Doubt can be a great teacher if it moves us beyond a faith that is too small, too pat, too parochial, too timid, too prepackaged, and not forged in the crucible of life experience. A healthy inner Doubting Thomas can help refine and enrich our spiritual life into something true and galvanizing, something worth staking our lives on.

Evening of Prayer for the Canonization of Dorothy Day

On Saturday, April 30, St. Thomas of Canterbury parish will hold a Holy Hour for the Canonization of Dorothy Day in the church, located at 4827 N. Kenmore.

Dorothy Day was a 20th century Catholic convert and one of the founders of the Catholic Worker Movement and a Benedictine oblate. Day's radical vision of societal renewal - based on the Gospels and the Church's social doctrine - has influenced generations of Catholics, including those who started the soup kitchen at St. Thomas of Canterbury.

The Holy Hour begins at 5:30 pm, presided over by Bishop Mark Bartosic, with sung Vespers by the Canons of St. John Cantius. At 7:00 pm, there will be a discussion titled, "Dorothy Day: Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow".

Married Couples Needed to Work with Engaged Couples

As part of our marriage preparation program, St. Gertrude offers a parish-based PreCana classes, as well as the premarital inventory tool, FOCCUS. The FOCCUS tool measures the level of agreement between the engaged couple in about 11 different areas they will encounter in their married life.

Couples fill out this questionnaire through a link provided by a facilitator couple and each party answers a series of questions online. The two sets of responses are then matched and scored, then a

print-out of the level of agreement/disagreement between the bride and groom is shared. The facilitator couple, who has been trained in how to read the results, then meets with the engaged couple to discuss the results.

Right now, we have only one couple doing this important ministry, and we are hoping to get one or two more couples involved to share the load. As is true with PreCana, the facilitator couple should be married for at least a few years, with or without children. Experience as a married couple is a prerequisite, but couples of any age are welcome.
