From Fr. Rich

In today's epistle reading from the Letter to the Hebrews, the author is reflecting upon a topic many find uncomfortable: discipline.

One of the very first troubles we have is that we often mistake discipline as an attack upon our all-too-fragile egos. Our egos tell us we can do whatever we want, which might have worked for a while when we were children. But if we are ever going to grow into mature adults, it means we have learned how to delay our desire for we want right this second for a deeper desire to find satisfaction for a longer period of time.

As the reading states, "whom the Lord loves, he disciplines." Or put another way, the parent or responsible adult in a child's life must also be a disciplinarian, or they are only pretending to love. Love means we are willing to make the sacrifice of being temporarily on the child's bad list for their own good. If we cannot or will not love our children in that way, we become responsible for mis-forming them.

It seems to me another way of thinking about this is within the context of patience. In many ways, discipline and patience are twin siblings. We cannot have everything we want, and we cannot have it whenever we want it. Such a self-indulgent style of living is certainly going to end in disaster for all involved. If we could have everything we wanted whenever we wanted it, as children we would do some serious damage to ourselves physically, mentally, emotionally, and psychologically.

Being denied certain things for certain lengths of time can teach us so many important lessons. First, it is the way we realize we are not God or even gods! Second, we are part of a community -- perhaps it is initially limited to only family, but eventually it expands to include friends, neighbors, classmates, co-workers, and teammates and we have to get along with them, learn from them, and be enriched by our relationships. Third, it helps us come to realize that contrary to what my ego may be telling me, I really don't need whatever I want right now, or I think I will be devastated. But, in fact, I **can** survive that absence. And it may even be helpful to me!

What might I choose to learn this week that will require that I discipline myself? How might I practice patience in a more positive and creative way? Discipline and patience can be tremendous helpers in learning to be more inclusive, flexible, and open to other people and other experiences. Temporarily being deprived of what I want is not the end of my life! In fact, it may provide a whole new understanding of myself that I otherwise might never have encountered.

Pastor Column

God, Every now and again I come across someone's writing that clarifies for me in a succinct way some of my own thoughts. Recently I was reading an article on the 50th anniversary of Pax Christi.

First, the story: Recently at celebrations of Pax Christi USA's 50th anniversary, Bishop John Stowe, president of the organization, positioned peacemakers and justice advocates as lambs in the midst of the world's many wolves, including Catholic wolves.

Stowe preached, alluding to LGBTQ+ couples at one point: "As a Church it does not seem that we were sufficiently vigilant about those who were being excluded, about promoting the nonviolence of Christ, about challenging oppression wherever it was, about promoting equality and equal dignity among all our members. We seemed to be part of an institution living in fear, not heeding that most frequent admonition of Jesus, to be not afraid...

We don't have to wander very far to encounter the wolves: when Catholics are promoting the death penalty and awarded for doing so, are eager for vengeance and retaliation, when we are willing to bless armaments but not some couples, when the voices of women are not being heard in the fights about abortion, when the institution cannot bring itself to say 'Black lives matter,' and when the self-proclaimed uber-Catholics insist that they know more and better than the pope."

I don't know Bishop John Stowe, but I thought his insights were important. There is a strengthening division in our church and in our nation about how we ought to behave, believe, etc. It tends to be in the realm of the "it's my way or the highway." Suffice it to say, ultimatums are rarely beneficial to healthy relationships. And too much of our conversations about our behavior and our morality and our ethics has been falling into this category.

In the realm of the church, many people tend to fall either on the "I'm here to pray and talk to God. Don't bother me with all that social justice stuff." Or the other extreme, "I am only concerned with helping to remedy the injustices of my fellow human beings, don't give me all that "holy" talk." Whoever makes this kind of ultimatum has already invalidated what the Catholic Church teaches and believes. It isn't one or the other. It is about finding out how we can always be connecting both of those important dynamics. For whenever we let one fade to make the other prominent, we always end up compromising the message of Jesus Christ.

Like each of us, the Church also is not perfect. It is always on the same journey we are on. There is that wonderful old Latin expression which explains this, "Semper reformanda, numquam reformata." (Always reforming, never reformed.) This comes from the Reformed movement in Protestant denominations. But it is equally true for all Christians. We are always being called to doing better. But we must never give in to discouragement when we fail.

None of us needs to look far when seeing places our Church has failed to live out the gospel of Jesus Christ in any number of areas, even while still proclaiming that gospel. I think Bishop Stowe has well captured the underlying problem -- it is fear. Fear is what happens when someone says, "Did you ever think about doing this differently?" Today's topics that might be named in those speculations include the role of women in the church; the way we look at others who are not Christian or not Catholic; the "bargains" we make with the dark side because it keeps me comfortable where I am; and so on.


It is a good idea to periodically ask ourselves if we are limiting our visions and behaviors out of fear. And then ask God's help to move us beyond the fear.

Religious Ed Classes Begin September 18!

Registration is now open for our 2022-2023 Religious Education program! Classes will begin on Sunday, September 18, with in-person instruction held on Sunday mornings from 9:15-10:15 am at Northside Catholic Academy.

Parents of students making their First Communion/Reconciliation or their Confirmation this year should also fill out a sacramental



registration form. Confirmation candidates also require additional paperwork, which can be found at <u>https://bit.ly/ConfirmationForms</u>, along with the deadlines. Please note that students must receive two years of preparation in order to make these sacraments.

The fees for the 2022-2023 school year are \$210 for one child and an additional \$30 for each student from the same family. Tuition can be paid online at <u>https://bit.ly/RelEdTuition</u>.

An additional sacramental fee of \$65 is required for children making their First Communion and First Reconciliation, or their Confirmation. That fee can be paid at <u>https://bit.ly/SacramentalFee</u>.

Interested in Becoming Catholic?

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is a process by which adults learn more about the Catholic Church. This free

program begins in the fall and meets until Pentecost.

Many people who begin RCIA are non-Catholics seeking to become Catholic or at least to explore whether Catholicism might be a good home. Those who complete the process and decide to become Catholic are initiated into the Church at the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday. Others who take RCIA are already Catholic but want a deeper understanding of their faith foundation.

The RCIA process does not ask those who have been baptized in another faith to give up their denominational experiences. Rather, the RCIA process seeks to add new colors and designs to their existing faith life tapestry. In addition to attending Mass, the RCIA process includes weekly gatherings of breaking open the Word of God, sharing our stories, and learning about our faith traditions.



If you desire to be a Minister of Care bringing communion to the homebound, there is training available near the end of September. We are committed to making the Archdiocese of Chicago VIRTUS training an easy requirement to fulfill.

If these volunteer activities are not a fit, consider signing up for the Ministry of Prayer. Each month you will receive a flyer, with petitions to include in your daily prayer from wherever you may be on a given day.
