### **Fourth Sunday of Advent**

Today's gospel picks up the story of Mary, having been visited by the angel, now rushing to be with her relative, Elizabeth, who is also, miraculously, now expecting a baby. John the

Baptist is the penultimate prophet announcing the coming of the Messiah, and Mary is the final prophet making that same announcement not with words, but with her actual body, mind, and spirit.

Mary's "fiat" ("Let it be done to me according to your word.") immediately brings joyous repercussions to the world, revealing God's presence. When Mary arrived, the baby Elizabeth was carrying leapt for joy! That wonderful image and others like it point the way for all those willing to pay attention!

The activities of all who are lowly, poor, oppressed, outcast -- these very same people Pope Francis refers to as those "on the peripheries" -- are now telling a new story. God is active in the world, bringing a new reality to birth! The established order is being turned upside down.

In this final week before Christmas, how might we respond to the mighty and wonderful things God is doing for us? Is it possible to pull myself back from the frantic pace of shopping and decorating to find some calm, quiet time for visiting with those who are important in my life? Can I re-direct some of my energies to reach out to those who are hurting from the absence of life's necessities -- food, shelter, proper clothing, a brief conversation, a kind word? The challenge is to become the hope we are preparing for. How might I let Christ more fully into my life right now that I may in turn bring that light and that love and that hope to those in need -- in my home, in my community, in my world?

This Advent, St. Gertrude Parish's Giving Tree will once again support people in need in our community. Gift cards to Target, Jewel, and Aldi will be collected in support of Care For Real and the Refugee & Immigrant Ministry. The deadline has been extended until Sunday, December 19.



The gift cards may be brought to church or dropped off/mailed to the Rectory, 1420 W. Granville, Chicago, IL 60660. (Even if the Rectory office is closed, you can always put mail through the mail slot in the side (west) red door next to the Rectory side yard.)

Purchased cards can be placed in one of two boxes, one for Care for Real and the other for the Refugee Ministry, on the table in front of Blessed Mother's shrine in the front of church. When you have placed your gift in the box, please take one of the ornaments and place it on the Giving Tree in the back of church.

**Care for Real** is collecting \$20 gift cards to Target to give to their clients with children. Last year, they were able to give one gift card for every child so that parents/guardians could purchase a gift for the child.

## The Later Days of Advent - The 'O' Antiphons

Although it is a short liturgical season of only four weeks, Advent is divided into the early and the later days in which we prepare for the coming of the Lord. The "later" days began this week on December 17th when the Church uses a series of the prophetic titles




that will be realized in the birth of Jesus as a focus for prayer. We know these titles from our singing of "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel". Each of the seven verses of that Advent hymn contain one of the seven prophetic titles.

Part of the enjoyment of the arrangement of the O Antiphons is found in their original Latin spellings, in which the first letter of each of the titles, when strung together, spells out, "Ero Cras", which in English means, "I will be tomorrow." The final Antiphon is on December 23rd as the Eve was considered the beginning of the actual feast -- thus announcing the birth of the Messiah.

Each of the Antiphons is divided into three parts: 1) a particular title of Jesus proclaimed in the Hebrew scriptures (the Old Testament). 2) God's action in our lives, and 3) a prayer that we may respond to God's generosity. Perhaps you could use them in your own reflections in these final days before Christmas:

- **December 19**: O Flower of Jesse's Stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples: Kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid.
- **December 20:** O Key of David, O Royal Power of Israel, controlling at your will the gate of heaven: Come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death; and lead your captive people into freedom.
- December 21: O Radiant Dawn, Splendor of Israel, Sun of Justice: Come, shine on those



- December 22: O King of all the Nations, the only joy of every human heart; O Keystone of the mighty arch of man: Come and save the creature you fashioned from dust.
- December 23: O Emanuel, King and Lawgiver, Desire of the Nations, Savior of All People, Come and set us free, Lord our God!

Today's gospel moved me to suddenly remember an afternoon when I was a doctoral student and in the hallway near the open door of a young professor. His wife came down the hall with their five-year-old.

When the little boy saw his father, he was transformed with glee. His legs went jumping up and down in a kind of joyful dance while his flushed face was all joy and smiles and shining eyes.



This is the effect that the presence of Jesus is meant to have on us, and it is the effect on the baby John the Baptist, within his mother Elizabeth, in the presence of Christmas is meant to affect us that way, for us to feel as that little boy felt, all dancing in joy, at God's unshakeable and joyous love for us.

The Holy Spirit fills Elizabeth with the knowledge that this girl is carrying the hope of the world, and she is overcome with awe, while the baby in her womb, leaps for joy.

Our baptism opens us up to the Holy Spirit's wisdom and insight...suddenly we recognize Jesus, in our everyday lives...and we can feel that radiant joy of his presence that love for all of us, Christmas joy, all year long!
