Annual Catholic Appeal

This is the final weekend of the Annual Catholic Appeal (ACA). The brochure explaining the good work accomplished because of the ACA, the Pledge Cards and

Ash Wednesday

Wednesday, March 2 is Ash Wednesday and the beginning of the Lenten season. Ashes will be blessed and distributed at all the Masses on Ash Wednesday - at 7:30 am, 10:00 am (NCA school Mass), and 7:00 pm. Ashes will also be available in church between 5:00-6:00 pm. (Not a Mass.)

Stations of the Cross

Stations of the Cross are prayed every Friday during Lent, beginning this Friday, March 4. We will be praying the Stations at both 3:00 pm and 6:30 pm. The 3:00 pm Stations will be using the traditional text. The 6:30 pm Stations will be using a contemporary, social justice text. Leaders at the 3:00 pm Stations will be members of the pastoral staff. Leaders at the 6:30 pm Stations will be members of the Social Justice Committee or one of the members of the parish youth group. Please join us!

Lenten Regulations for Fast & Abstinence

Abstinence from meats is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent. Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

By the threefold discipline of fasting, almsgiving, and prayer, the Church keeps Lent from Ash Wednesday until the evening of Holy Thursday. All of the faithful and the catechumens should undertake the serious practice of these three traditions. Failure to observe penitential days totally or a substantial number of such days must be considered serious.

Our U.S. bishops issued in 1966 this statement on penitential observance: "On weekdays of Lent, we strongly recommend participation in daily Mass and self-imposed observances of fasting. In light of grave human needs which weigh on the Christian conscience in all seasons, we urge particularly during Lent, generosity to local, national, and world programs of sharing of all things needed to translate our duty to penance into a means of implementing the right of the poor to their part of our abundance."

Parish Pastoral Council

Our top priority is to encourage parishioners to consider becoming members of the PPC in the next few weeks, in time for our next scheduled meeting on Thursday, April 28 at 7:00 pm. 


Please consider joining us. There are many reasons to do so beyond my own.

Each pledge makes a difference! All parish communities participate in the campaign and the gifts of many enable our parishes, schools





Palms Up for Lent: Lenten Faith Activities Planned

As you may have seen or heard over the last few weeks, all are invited to participate in some Lenten devotions.

Almoners Program: These groups will meet on Mondays during Lent at 9:00 am and/or



at 6:30 pm in the church for a brief prayer. Participants will then go out to be more compassionate to the less fortunate by giving alms of \$10 McDonald cards. If you are not able to join us on Mondays, we will have McDonald's cards available in the back of church for you to take and distribute to the needy.

There will be a second collection to support the purchase of the McDonald's cards used by the Almoners program beginning February 26 and 27 and then each weekend during Lent.

Stations of the Cross: Beginning Friday, March 4 and then every Friday during Lent, we will take time from our busy schedules and reflect on the suffering journey of Christ and others in the world. On Friday afternoons at 3:00 pm, we will offer the traditional Way of the Cross and at 6:30 pm we will we also have Stations of the Cross-joining Jesus' journey, recognizing the present struggles and crosses that challenge our modern world.

Anti-Racism Discussion Groups: Small prayer and discussion groups will be meeting in the morning and evenings using the book The Spiritual Works of Racial Justice, by Patrick Saint-Jean, S.J. These groups will offer us the opportunity to see that by taking on an anti-racist position we become all that God calls us to be. Books are available for \$15 after Mass this weekend. Music During Lent

The season of Lent will shortly be upon us and with it will come several changes as we transition from Ordinary Time.

There have already been several articles in our bulletin to alert us that our theme this year is to focus on antiracism and racial justice. The music has been chosen with this focus in mind. The psalm that we will use



during the season of Lent is psalm 95: "If today you hear God's word, harden not your hearts." This implies some action on our parts; our prayer must include some listening time. If we are truly to change our views and thinking of other cultures and races, it must start first with a conversion in our hearts.

Our gospel acclamation is a new one this Lent. The lyrics are "Glory to you word of God, Lord Jesus Christ" composed by Sarah Hart. As is our custom for the past several years, we will have a moment of silence between the first reading and the psalm and between the second reading and the gospel acclamation. This is to give us more time to reflect on the scripture readings.

Our Mass parts this year will be the same as last year, the Deutsche Messe by Franz Schubert. Although the music is NOT in the Breaking Bread, the melody is strong and easy to sing.

Finally, our Communion meditation song every week during Lent will feature music by an African-American composer, beginning with the spiritual, *Precious, Lord, Take My Hand* by Thomas Dorsey.

We hope these changes will lead you to a meaningful and prayerful Lenten season.

NCA Mask Policy to Change on Monday, February 28

On Wednesday, February 23, NCA received news from the Archdiocese of Chicago <u>announcing their decision to make masks optional</u> in schools for students, teachers, and staff. This will go in effect on Monday, February 28.

At NCA we have been fortunate that our COVID cases have dropped dramatically, with no reported cases last week. Of course, that does not mean COVID is over, we will still need to follow the other guidelines that are in place.

As I speak with our teachers about going mask optional, one of the main concerns we will need to address is accepting the choices of students, teachers, and staff who choose to continue to wear a mask or to not wear a mask. We all must be accepting and respectful in our decisions, and our teachers will talk with the students about this.

I am proud of the accomplishments we have made as a community to keep our school open and providing in-person learning through this pandemic. I am confident we can continue keeping our buildings safe for everyone while also providing the instruction our students need and deserve.

New Family Sponsored/Help Requested


The Refugee Committee welcomed a new family at the beginning of this month, a family of five from Syria parents and three kids ages 14, 12, and 9. They are settling in and, thanks to your generosity, their apartment is set up and beginning to look like home! Also thanks to your generosity and our



recent fundraising, we are in good shape to welcome another family. This is especially important with the continued expected influx of families from Afghanistan.

This gets me to my first request - we've been in good shape to provide material support for these families, including rent, a Welcome Pack of household goods, or both. I'm asking if you can give the gift of accompaniment. This is where you visit the family at some regular interval, providing friendship and a familiar face. You don't have to have any "official" skills (Catholic Charities takes care of job training, health needs, etc.) but instead you might just visit, or show them how to use the library or the CTA, or anything else.

You will be required to complete Virtus training, so there is a bit of investment even before you are connected with the family. Please give this some thought, prayer, and discernment.

Growing in Faith

This Sunday's Gospel reading gets us ready for Lent with Jesus' relentless insistence on integrity and compassion. I can feel his pointed critique when he asks if the blind can lead the blind, or if my log-jammed eye can truly see the speck in my neighbor's.

Why is it that I'm so keenly aware of the slightest faults of others but blind to my own staggering imperfections? Jesus isn't out to shame us, but I can sense here his special exasperation at human hypocrisy, especially when it's exhibited by those in authority. Living in the Kingdom of God requires a constant and honest struggle to integrate what I truly believe with how I live.

I've come to discover that my lack of self awareness is at the root of my own hypocrisy. My biases and self centeredness leads me to view the imperfect world around



me as if I'm not a part of it, and I live in judgement and disdain rather than compassion.

Jesus' answer to our inconsistency and hypocrisy is the deep love of God--at least that seems to be his story. Just a couple weeks ago in the story of Jesus' own baptism, he comes to fully realize his truest identity as God's own beloved, and that sets the course for his Gospel mission. It's no less for us. If we want to bear good fruit we must truly know our real roots. We're fig trees, not thorn bushes, because we're so deeply loved and held precious by God.

December 2021 continued to be very active for both the Heart to Heart Seniors Outreach Ministry and its durable medical equipment Lending Closet.

Our dedicated and compassionate volunteers took many seniors to



and from physician appointments and procedures while offering their friendly support.

Staff members were actively engaged in planning educational events and workshops for 2022. Among them will be JourneyCare Hospice's staff presentation on Hospice & Palliative Care and Grief, which will be held on-campus in early June. (Information on other hospice organizations will also be included).

Also planned are free workshops held by the kind attorneys at The Center for Elder and Disability Law to create legal, notarized documents such as powers of attorney, living wills, and wills for parishioners who have made appointments with the Director of Heart to Heart, Jane Callahan-Moore. Please contact Jane at 773.973.5464 if you are interested in attending one of these workshops, so that she can gauge how many workshops should be scheduled for this summer and fall months.

"Thank you so much. You make me feel so important!" read a note from Linda, a senior who received a shower chair from our Lending Closet in December. What a privilege to affirm that everyone who calls us for assistance or to donate to the Lending Closet is indeed important!

During Advent, we fielded information, requests, and donation calls from 27 zip codes, many close at hand (Edgewater, Uptown, Rogers Park) and others a bit further (from Chatham on the South Side to Wood Dale near O'Hare). Some people who contact us have short-term post-surgery needs, while others are dealing with permanent mobility issues.

And, even as the busy holiday was in full swing, people found time to bring donations to us. We pray that for those coping with a first holiday season after the loss of a loved one, the act of passing along durable medical equipment to be used by others brings comfort.
