Farewell & Thank You to Fr. Mike Bradley

About 15 years ago, in a typical act of generosity on his part, Fr. Mike Bradley moved into St. Gertrude to help Fr. Dominic Grassi, who was having some serious health issues.

Such acts of kindness, which all of us who know Fr. Mike can testify to, are just part of his everyday language. Fr. Bradley is a man of great faith which is lived out every day of his life. Over the years, I have had the opportunity to live in the rectory with Fr. Mike and work with him, (first at St. Josaphat Parish and now here at St. Gertrude). I have many times commented to parishioners that we really don't know how fortunate we have been. Fr. Bradley is technically a "resident" priest living at the rectory. His full-time job has been at the Matrimonial Tribunal downtown at the Archdiocesan Pastoral Center. But he has done at least as much work as most Associate Pastors! It is a common occurrence that by the time I hear someone is in the hospital or ailing at home, Fr. Bradley has already been there to visit.

As most parishioners know, Fr. Mike has now completed over 50 marathons. And many of those have been fundraisers for one or more of the ministries at the parish. Here at St. Gertrude, his marathon participation has raised many thousands of dollars for NCA and then for our Heart to Heart Ministry. It strikes me that is a perfect description of Fr. Mike—he was never afraid to do the hard work, the training, and then the executing of a demanding enterprise. Besides doing all that hard work, he always was most concerned about how, through that work, he could best care for others -- especially those most in need.

In so many ways, Fr. Mike has been the heart and soul of the parish. He carries with him the many requests for prayers that he includes in his daily prayers. Those who are hurting in any way are always uppermost in his mind. His manner is always gentle, kind, and loving. But unless

anyone thinks he is an angel, he also has a wicked, impish wit which he unleashes, oftentimes unexpectedly! If you weren't paying enough attention, you might miss the humorous quip he just quietly slipped into a conversation.

He is the most self-effacing, truly humble people I have ever known. Both Fr. Mike Gabriel and I have been hounding Fr. Bradley for many months about this farewell, insisting he was greatly underestimating the affection with which so many people hold him, and the

need to give everyone more time to get used to the idea of him retiring and no longer being part of St. Gertrude. But he didn't want a fuss made! Finally, he agree to let the parish know a few weeks before his final weekend, and then being present at all the Masses to say farewell and be present for hospitality afterwards.

A wise man once said that to be a good priest, a man first had to be a good human being, then a good Christian, then a good priest. We see the living witness of that truth every day in Fr. Mike Bradley!

Like so many parishioners, I will miss him greatly. But I also want to wish him well and express deep gratitude for his life, his service, his lived faith, his humor. I know I have been greatly blessed to have had him as part of my life, and I know many of you feel the same way. So it is with such mixed emotions we say farewell to him this weekend and wish him well as he enters into retirement.

Thank you, Fr. Mike, for being such an important part of our lives! Thank you for your extraordinary generosity and expansive service. Thank you for living the Gospel and making Christ truly present among us. I hope you will always feel welcome here. St. Gertrude has not only been your home for 15 years, it will always be, and we hope you feel welcome to visit us – for a day, a month, or whenever you simply want to come back home! 


Catholic Schools Week - January 30 - February 5


Palms Up for Lent: Additional Lenten Opportunities

The world has gone through some tough times - an incredible amount of death, a lockdown, and supply chain problems. But we have managed to figure out how to cope with our family and friends. By practicing what Jesus taught us, we are practicing kindness, patience, and treating others the way we want to be treated. People have come together to help each other. Institutional Racism

On Wednesday, January 19, two days after the holiday honoring Dr. Martin Luther King, the Senate was unable to pass the Voting Rights legislation that would have guaranteed access to certain forms of voting throughout the nation, ending some of the ever-increasing restrictions on voting that have been creeping up in individual states the last few years. The irony that the members of the Senate did this within a few days of Dr. King's birthday celebration cries to heaven for redress!



When we talk about racism, there is personal racism and there is institutional racism. Most people have a fairly good grasp of what individual or personal racism is and looks and sounds like. But I often hear people mystified by "institutional racism." If you are one of those persons confused by these categories, what happened on January 19 is a perfect example of institutional racism. Our governments (federal, state, and local) have, for many, many years, written legislation that encodes racism into our laws and the very fabric of our nation. The most egregious of these are the collection of laws enacted in the South after the Civil War and the Emancipation Proclamation collectively referred to as Jim Crow. Because this is the year when all the redistricting is done following the census, we also see the institutional racism in so much of the gerrymandering going on right now throughout the nation. All of these activities aren't simply political, they are moral or immoral choices and they perpetuate racism or attempt to put pieces of it to an end. What is going on now on a very large scale is immoral and, by its very definition, sinful. As people of faith, we are called upon to be aware of what is being done in our name and to take action to stop this kind of injustice. Failure to do anything is to be complicit in the evil that is being enacted.

It is not accidental that the many citizens of our nation who are supporters of the Big Lie are also supporters of white supremacy. All this is of one cloth. What is terrifying is that we are now seeing politicians willing to attack the Constitution to protect white privilege and continue building on our nation's Original Sin of slavery and racism.
