Weekend of June 25-26: 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time

There is a question in today's Gospel that we might want to inscribe in every place of public

gathering for as long as it takes to heal some of the great divisions in the country and church.

Having encountered a group of believers of a different faith, who will not welcome Jesus in their town because his destination is Jerusalem, his disciples ask the knee-jerk question that too easily slips into all our minds and hearts when we meet those with whom we disagree, "Lord, do you want us to call down fire from heaven to consume them?"

Talk about an overreaction! But it is part of what we have witnessed in the January 6th investigation. Nor is a surprise to anyone who deals regularly with those of far differing political persuasions in both our nation and our church.

That it is timely is without question. But that only increases the need to hear, reflect upon and follow the Lord's response, "Jesus turned and rebuked them, and they journeyed to another village." We might say in today's idiom, "Back off!" Whenever our self-righteousness rears its ugly head, we need to remind ourselves immediately, "Back off!" We are all different, we are all human, and none of us has a lock on "the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth."

Perhaps the wisdom of the ages is appropriate to these situations that are not going to away until we learn some important lessons from them. In the meantime, as the wise have told us for years, "When you are in serious disagreement with another person, rather than condemning them, say a prayer for them." This strategy both lowers the temperature, and it puts us back in touch with God at the center of our lives and the lives of others.

Weekend of July 2-3: 14th Sunday in Ordinary Time

As we celebrate our nation's Independence Day on July 3 and 4, I want to "cheat" and instead of reflecting on this weekend's scripture readings, I want to go back to June 26th's Epistle reading from St. Paul's letter to the Galatians.

The opening lines are, "Brothers and sisters: for freedom Christ set us free; so stand firm and do not submit again to the yoke of slavery. For you were called for freedom, brothers and sisters. But do not use this freedom as an opportunity for the flesh; rather, serve one another

through love." There is an epidemic of confusion around the notion of freedom. Some people mistakenly think that freedom means we can do whatever we want whenever we want whenever we want that is not freedom. In fact, that is the greatest for of enslavement.

The image of a person about to step out on a journey captures the way real freedom actually works. As we stand at the beginning of a new journey, we have before us all options. But until we make a positive decision to go one way or another, we are prisoners to our possibilities. We only become truly free when we make a decision, choose a direction, and set out. In that moment, we no



longer are bound up, but become free to move in a specific direction, doing a specific a task, etc.

Making decisions and living by them are part of what some call the "freedom from" activity of our lives. We are freed from indecision and uncertainly and are able to move. Which brings us to the second part, the "freedom for". Only after we make a decision are we free to move forward. It doesn't mean we will never make a mistake, revise, or change what we once decided, but it gives us the ability to live a certain way, doing something with our lives.

As St. Paul clarifies, "For the whole law is fulfilled in one statement, namely, You shall love your neighbor as yourself. But if you go on biting and devouring one another, beware that you are not consumed by one another."

What a great reminder of the true, divine purpose in the freedom we have been given: we are to love one another.

As we celebrate our national holiday, let us make every effort to bring the best of our Christian faith into how we live as active citizens of our nation.

I have undoubtedly forgotten some -- so please forgive me! But we want to acknowledge and thank all of our wonderful ministers and volunteers for their great service to the parish.


At the Masses on the weekend of June 25-26, we will have a special blessing of gratitude at the end of Mass and will share hospitality afterwards in the back of church. Please join us!


Commemoration of the 125th Anniversary of the Death of Venerable Augustus Tolton - Virtual Celebration on Friday, July 8 at 6:30 pm

Interested in Becoming Catholic?

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is a process by which adults learn more about the Catholic Church. This free



program begins in the fall and meets until Pentecost.

Many people who begin RCIA are non-Catholics seeking to become Catholic or at least to explore whether Catholicism might be a good home. Those who complete the process and decide to become Catholic are initiated into the Church at the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday. Others who take RCIA are already Catholic but want a deeper understanding of their faith foundation.

The RCIA process does not ask those who have been baptized in another faith to give up their denominational experiences. Rather, the RCIA process seeks to add new colors and designs to their existing faith life tapestry. In addition to attending Mass, the RCIA process includes weekly gatherings of breaking open the Word of God, sharing our stories, and learning about our faith traditions.
