Pastor's Column

At this Saturday's 5:00 pm Mass, we remember in a special way all those parishioners and relatives and friends who have died

this past year. During this Month of Remembrance let us call to mind and present prayers to God in thanksgiving for their lives, their love and friendship, their presence in our lives. The greatest honor we can offer in remembering those who have gone before us is in spreading their love and friendship to those who are in such need of it today.

Today's scripture readings each provide a strong example of encouragement in the face of difficulties. In the first reading from the Book of Maccabees, as well as in today's Gospel passage from St. Luke, we hear an almost-contrived set of stories about multi-sibling families getting caught in the religious law obligations of marriage upon the death of a spouse. In both cases, rather than crashing against this seemingly intractable situation, the Gordian know of the insoluble problem is sliced through with the blade of a much broader vision of reality. The laws we have created - often with very good purpose -- cannot always solve our problems. Sometimes we have to realize that we are less than perfect; our laws are less than perfect; and we need to turn to God and trust in God's loving mercy which resolves what we cannot because God's love is beyond our limitations and can, therefore, solve what we cannot.

Throughout history, great leaders and creators, when confronted with seemingly impossible-to-solve situations, have found that letting go, taking a step back, releasing personal responsibility for getting the answer, have found to their amazement, that in letting go they are often surprised that the solution suddenly makes itself known.

This week, what situation or problem might we practice letting go of and entrusting to God's care? Even if the answer doesn't suddenly appear, at the very least, our anxiety level will be lowered and we can more fully appreciate God's presence all around

us

Who Should Receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick?

At all the Masses on our parish Feast Day weekend, November 12-13, we will celebrate the Anointing of the Sick. To help everyone self-determine if they would like to be anointed, here is a brief article explaining the "rules" for this sacrament.

According to the Roman Ritual, anyone among the faithful "whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age" not only may but should receive the sacrament. Some examples include:

- Any person who is considered in danger of death.
- Any person who has a serious disease or medical condition (e.g. cancer, heart disease, mental illness, diabetes). The sacrament may be repeated if the person's condition becomes more serious.
- Any person preparing for surgery.
- Any elderly person, even if there is no particular serious illness present.
- Any seriously sick person.



St. Gertrude will once again host our annual Christmas greenery sale, with a limited number of balsam pine trees, wreaths, and garland available for purchase. Our Christmas greenery sale is a great opportunity for parishioners to get ready for the holidays while supporting St. Gertrude ministries.

Each 6' Christmas tree is \$45. Three different sized wreaths are available—the 18" wreath is \$20, the 24" is \$22, and the 36" is \$30. Garland is also available for \$35 per 5'

length.

The greenery team will do their best to accommodate your preferred delivery date and will reach out to notify you when to expect your order.

Please note, the boundaries for deliveries are north to Oakton, south to Irving Park, and east of the North Shore Channel.

What is Depression?

Depression is more than just feeling down or having a bad day. When a sad mood lasts for a long time and interferes with normal, everyday functioning, you may be depressed. Symptoms of depression include:

- Feeling sad or anxious often or all the time
- Not wanting to do activities that used to be fun
- Feeling irritable, easily frustrated, or restless
- Having trouble falling asleep or staying asleep
- Waking up too early or sleeping too much
- Eating more or less than usual or having no appetite
- Experiencing aches, pains, headaches, or stomach problems that do not improve with treatment
- Having trouble concentrating, remembering details, or making decisions
- Feeling tired, even after sleeping well
- Feeling guilty, worthless, or helpless
- Thinking about suicide or hurting yourself

The above information is not intended to provide a medical diagnosis of major depression and cannot take the place of seeing a mental health professional. If you think you are depressed, talk with your doctor or a mental health professional immediately. This is especially important if your symptoms are getting worse or affecting your daily activities.
