SEVEN GIFTS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

Review of our definitions of the Gifts of the Holy Spirit

Gifts of the Holy Spirit Wisdom	Group I Definition Saturday February 13,2021 Wisdom is to take past experiences and make them into good decisions	From St. Thomas Aquinas worked out in the thirteenth century in his Summa Theologiae https://www.catholic.com/magazine/print- edition/the-seven-girts-of-the-holy-spirit Wisdom is both the knowledge of and judgment about "divine things" and the ability to judge and direct human affairs according to divine truth.
Understanding	Understanding is to comprehend the truths of the Catholic faith and knowing how to follow them	Understanding is penetrating insight into the very heart of things, especially those higher truths that are necessary for our eternal salvation—in effect, the ability to "see".
Counsel	Counsel is to seek out advice from God	Counsel allows a man to be directed by God in matters necessary for his salvation
Fortitude	Fortitude is the strength to be yourself and do Gods work in the world	Fortitude denotes a firmness of mind in doing good and in avoiding evil, particularly when it is difficult or dangerous to do so, and the confidence to overcome all obstacles, even deadly ones, by virtue of the assurance of everlasting life
Knowledge	Knowledge is something you get from experience, learning, prayer and other people	Knowledge is the ability to judge correctly about matters of faith and right action, so as to never wander from the straight path of justice
Piety	Piety is being faithful to God	Piety is, principally, revering God with filial affection, paying worship

		and duty to God, paying due duty to all men on account of their relationship to God, and honoring the saints and not contradicting Scripture. The Latin word pietas denotes the reverence that we give to our father and to our country; since God is the Father of all, the worship of God is also called piety
Fear of God	Fear of God Is to worship and respect God	Fear of God is, in this context, "filial" or chaste fear whereby we revere God and avoid separating ourselves from him—as opposed to "servile" fear, whereby we fear punishment

Assignment 1. Gospel Refection

Please read the following Gospel passage and use the questions that follow to reflect on what you have read and what it means. Come prepared to talk about it.

1 Corinthians 12: 12-26

¹² For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

¹⁴ Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. ¹⁵ If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. 16 And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. 17 If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? 18 But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. ¹⁹ If all were a single member, where would the body be? ²⁰ As it is, there are many members, yet one body. ²¹ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." 22 On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; 24 whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, ²⁵ that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶ If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it.
