Holy Week Schedule/COVID Protocols/Special Collections

Below is the Holy Week and Easter schedule, as well information about each services' COVID protocols and the special collections on Holy Thursday and Good Friday.

Holy Thursday, April 14

- No morning Mass
- 7:30 pm Mass of the Lord's Supper (live-streamed)
- Church will remain open until 10:00 pm for private adoration.
- The collection on Holy Thursday will support both Bonaventure House Alexian Brothers AIDS Ministry and Catholic Charities efforts to help those living with and affected by AIDS.
- Pandemic protocols: The most evident restriction is the limited
 washing of feet. This year, we will have the candidates for entrance
 into the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil Mass (RCIA Catechumen
 and Candidates) represent various groups of people that Pope Francis
 keeps reminding us are on the peripheries, and it is up to us to move
 them into the center of our church and our lives.

Good Friday, April 15

- No morning Mass
- The Rectory office is open from 8:30 am-2:00 pm.
- 3:00 pm Stations of the Cross (No Stations at 6:30 pm)
- 7:30 pm Service of the Lord's Passion (live-streamed)
- The <u>collection on Good Friday</u> is in support of the work of the Franciscans working in the Holy Land.
- Pandemic protocols: The Good Friday Service will once
 again restrict the Veneration of the Cross to non-touching forms of
 veneration (e.g. a bow, a genuflection, a brief moment in silence
 before the cross).

Holy Saturday, April 16

- No morning Mass
- 11:00 am Blessing of Easter baskets
- 7:30 pm Easter Vigil Mass (live-streamed)
- Pandemic protocols: This year, everyone will once again receive a taper on their way into church. We will use the large crystal bowl for baptisms in front of the altar, instead of erecting the pool in the sanctuary.

Easter Sunday Masses

- 8:00 am
- 10:30 am in Church
- 10:30 am Gym Mass
- The Rectory office is closed.
- Pandemic protocols: Easter Sunday Masses should also pretty
 much look like pre-pandemic -- with the exception that Communion is
 still limited to reception in the hand (not on the tongue) and there will
 be no distribution of the Precious Blood.

The Rectory office is open from 8:30 am-2:00 pm on Good Friday, and closed on Easter Sunday and Easter Monday, April 18.

An Easter Message from Cardinal Cupich

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As we gather this year to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection, we cannot avoid our circumstances. Shadows of sin and death loom large over us. The pandemic, our experience of social unrest and daily violence on our streets, and, of course, the horrors of war in Ukraine and other parts of the world—all remind us how much we need the Lord's redemptive and healing power in our lives.

Our source of hope amid these challenges is anchored in all that we have witnessed in the liturgies of Holy Week. We have celebrated that the Lord Jesus entered into the fullness of our human experience. He went to the very darkest edges of that human experience. He entered into our suffering, struggle, and even our desperation, when he cried out on the cross, "My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?" He squarely faced sin and death on the cross.

And it was precisely in the moment he fully emptied himself, placing himself totally in the hands of God, that he was raised up from the dead victorious. But, his rising from the dead is not just a matter of his personal vindication. He came back from the dead for us, to give us a share in his victory. This is what takes place in our Baptism, which is confirmed in the Holy Spirit, and sustained by the Eucharist. He lives in us, and his victory over sin and death lives in us as well.

As Pope Francis reminds us, we need to share the victory of the resurrection with others, as Jesus did with us. We do this by being sisters and brothers to one another. As Church, we are a family of faith that walks with each other in moments of pain, struggle, and grief, keeping alive the promise that Jesus, the victor over sin and death, remains with us. We are never abandoned. My prayer for all of us in the Archdiocese of Chicago is that we will stand firm in hope, confident that the One who has gone before us in death has come back from the dead for us. May the peace of the Risen Lord be with you and those you love.


Thank you from the Peace and Justice Ministry

What a blessing this Lent has been to so many! The Peace and Justice Ministry would like to thank you for participating in various Lenten practices.

The Almoner program collected \$7,000, and at the time of this article being written, we have given out over \$5,000 in gift cards to those who are homeless and hungry. The true blessing came to those passing out the gift cards, meeting and learning more about the challenges so many on the street experience. To all those who distributed the cards, to those who donated so generously, and to those who prayed especially for the hungry and homeless, thank you. Any remaining money will be used to purchase cards to be given to Care for Real or to people who come to social services in need.

Along with the Almoners program, thank you to the many who participated in the anti-racism discussion groups. We learned that every day, each one of us can and should stand up against racial prejudices and disrespectful attitudes towards others. For six weeks, six groups met to share in discussions on racism. It wasn't always an easy conversation to have, but ones that were and are greatly needed. We are planning on further discussions and actions that we as a parish can participate in to reduce the impact of the racism that exists in homes and our society. Let us build a world beyond racism and discrimination where we all can recognize each other sisters and brothers in Christ.

Evening of Prayer for the Canonization of Dorothy Day

On Saturday, April 30, St. Thomas of Canterbury parish will hold a Holy Hour for the Canonization of Dorothy Day in the church, located at 4827 N. Kenmore.

Dorothy Day was a 20th century Catholic convert and one of the founders of the Catholic Worker Movement and a Benedictine oblate. Day's radical vision of societal renewal - based on the Gospels and the Church's social doctrine - has influenced generations of Catholics, including those who started the parish soup kitchen at St. Thomas of Canterbury.

The Holy Hour begins at 5:30 pm, presided over by Bishop Mark Bartosic, with sung Vespers by the Canons of St. John Cantius. At 7:00 pm, there will be a discussion on the Catholic Worker titled, "Dorothy Day: Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow".



Married Couples Needed to Work with Engaged Couples


As part of our marriage preparation program, St. Gertrude offers a parish-based PreCana classes, as well as the premarital inventory tool, FOCCUS. The FOCCUS tool measures the level of agreement between the engaged couple in about 11 different areas they will encounter in their married life. Couples fill out this questionnaire through a link provided by a facilitator couple and each party answers a series of questions online. The two sets of responses are then matched and scored, then a print-out of the level of agreement/disagreement between the bride and groom is shared. The facilitator couple, who has been trained in how to read the results, then meets with the engaged couple to discuss the results.

Right now, we have only one couple doing this important ministry, and we are hoping to get one or two more couples involved to share the load. As is

true with PreCana, the facilitator couple should be married for at least a few years, with or without children. Experience as a married couple is a prerequisite, but couples of any age are welcome.

<u>Update on Repair, Renew, Refresh</u>
<u>Projects</u>

With the arrival of milder weather, we will continue with or start projects to improve the parish buildings. Tuckpointing and masonry repairs, the final phase of the multi-year project to care for the exterior of the Ministry Center, should be finished in just a few weeks. The scaffolding will be taken down afterwards and that part of the campus will return to a more normal appearance.

Some of the roofing repairs on the church and rectory are scheduled to begin. These include removing some downspouts that have been the source of water getting inside parish buildings, affixing new gutters in other parts, and adding new roofing to sections of the buildings.

Here is the status of other projects funded by the *Renew, Repair, Refresh* campaign:

- We hope and expect the repairs/rebuilding of some of the outside stairs will get underway soon.
- The re-carpeting of church is also moving forward, albeit a little slower than we might have hoped.
- The handrails from the main floor of the church into the sanctuary have all been installed.
- And the Fund for Catholic Education at NCA for parish families with children attending NCA has been funded and all the school families have been made aware of that support possibility.

Please let me know if you have any questions or concerns. I will try to provide regular updates.

St. Gertrude Composting Program - List of Do's and Don'ts

With the arrival of spring, it's time to start thinking about our parish compost and garden projects. This year, we are going to use a compost tumbler. It's user-friendly and will produce compost at a quicker pace. I highly suggest going to www.mantis.com for more information and watch a short video demonstration. Additionally, our *Composting Do's and Don'ts* list has been updated and is outlined below.

A Zoom discussion was held last weekend on how to use the new compost tumbler and what can and cannot go into it. It was recorded and available for anyone who would still like to be a part of the program!

We plan to get the garden ready for planting in early June, I'll share details about that in later bulletins.

St. Gertrude Garden and Compost Project Compost Bucket Do's and Don'ts

DO's:

Collect in your buckets:

• 1/3 Brown:

- Leaves and dead-headed flowers
- Shredded paper
- SMALL sticks (This will not make heat.)

• 1/3 Green:

- Grass clippings
- Leaves of vegetables like broccoli and cauliflower, parsley, herbs, and spices (This makes heat.)

• 1/3 Food:

- Vegetables and fruit (Chopped up into small parts.)
- Egg shells (small pieces)
- Coffee and tea grounds (Tea must be taken out of the tea bag.)

DON'TS

Please do not add these to your bucket:

• Brown:

- Don't overuse this, break it up to only 1/3 of the bucket.
- No plastic or labels on shredded paper. (Remove the labels first because they won't decompose.)
- Break up shredded paper if it clumps together in your bucket.
 The materials must be able to breathe, and air must be able to circulate.
- Do not include magazines or glossy paper.

Green:

o Grass clippings must be chemical free at the time of cutting.

o Do not include diseased plants of any kind.

• Food:

- No MEAT, BONES, FAT, SKIN, BUTTER, OLEO! These will attract animals.
- No corn cobs
- No plastics of any kind
- No avocado pits or skins
- No flour products, grains, or legumes
- No nuts, seeds, and baked goods, or snacks
- No paper towels, napkins, and tissues
- No spoiled tofu/tempeh or spoiled tomato products
- No old jelly jams or preserves
- No organic house waste



Care for Our Common Home:

Appreciating God's Gifts

The Pope's encyclical, *Laudato Si'*, is basically an analysis of how humanity can use spirituality to improve our relationships with each other and with the natural world, all in service of caring for our common home.

When you see flowers pushing their way through the soil this time of year, do you immediately thank God for those gifts? The 52nd anniversary of Earth Day is Friday, April 22, 2022. This year, the

Earth Day theme is Investing in Our Planet. Please consider whatever athome project(s) you might do as a family, or by yourself, to help improve the health of our home, Mother Earth!

Perhaps planting a garden -- either in the dirt in the ground or in the dirt in the pots. Flowering plants not only bring delight to our sense, but they also increase the production of healthy oxygen.

Another possible project might be some form of cleaning up or out, perhaps preceded by a "Stuff Examination of Conscience" - just how much "stuff" have I accumulated? Do I really need all of it? If it is clothing or housewares, could I contribute my excess to those in need through donations to the Goodwill, St. Vincent DePaul Society, or Salvation Army shops?

One of the tricks in this kind of project is to plan, at the same time, to resist the "nature abhors a vacuum" syndrome, feeling the necessity of filling all those empty spaces by going out and purchasing more "stuff".

We pray for all those who are afraid; that your everlasting arms hold them in this time of great fear.


We pray for all those who have the power over life and death; that they will choose for all people life, and life in all its fullness.
