# **Fourth Sunday of Advent**

On Thursday, December 17 through December 23, the focus of Advent shifts to the proximate preparations for our annual celebration of Christmas.

On the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Advent, Mary is the central figure of the gospel reading and our celebration. As the bearer of our Savior and Lord, her "fiat" changed history and ushered in our salvation.

On the 17<sup>th,</sup> we begin hearing the "**O Antiphons**" each day -- the titles from the Hebrew scriptures (Old Testament) which came to be understood as the prophetic voices anticipating the coming of the Messiah.

Part of the enjoyment of the arrangement of the O Antiphons is found in their original Latin spelling, in which the first letter of each of the titles, when strung together, spells out "Ero Cras", which in English means, "I will be tomorrow" since the final O Antiphon was on December 23<sup>rd</sup> -- and the Eve was considered the beginning of the actual feast - thus announcing the birth of the Messiah.

Each Antiphon is divided into three parts: 1) a particular title of Jesus proclaimed in the Old Testament, 2) God's action in our lives, and 3) a prayer that we may respond to God's generosity.

Perhaps you could use them for your own reflections in these final days of preparation for Christmas.

- **December 17**: **O Wisdom**, O Holy Word of God, You govern all creation with your strong, yet tender care. Come and show your people the way to salvation.
- December 18: O Sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed himself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain: Come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free.
- December 19:O Flower of Jesse's Stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples: Kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid.
- **December 20**: **O Key of David**, O Royal Power of Israel, controlling at your will the gate of heaven: Come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death; and lead your captive people into freedom.
- December 21: O Radiant Dawn, Splendor of Israel, Sun of Justice:
   Come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death.
- December 22: O King of all the Nations, the only joy of every human heart; O Keystone of the mighty arch of man: Come and save the creature you fashioned from dust.
- December 23: O Emanuel, King and Lawgiver, Desire of the Nations,
   Savior of All People, Come and set us free, Lord our God!

Merry Christmas! May you and all those you love enjoy this celebration of God's love born into humanity!

One of the interesting things that are woven throughout our prayers in the Christmas season is how we switch tenses in the verbs we use --

celebrating not only the actual historical event of Christ's birth over 2,000 years ago but equally celebrating this present moment when Christ is born more deeply into each of our hearts and lives.

All the beautiful Christmas carols and wonderful Christmas music we so enjoy during these days brings us into an awareness beyond simple words of the amazing and wonderful things God has done and God continues to do for us because God loves us! As we continue this joyful celebration in the coming weeks, let us remember to share the joy and good news of this miraculous birth and the extraordinary gift each of us and our world has received and continues to receive each time we open our hearts and our arms to all our sisters and brothers.

In February, we will be inviting everyone to attend our virtual parish fundraiser: St. Gertrude Parish Auction 2021. This is a new, major parish fund-raiser that we hope will improve our financial standing during the pandemic.

We have been very fortunate that many of our parishioners have continued to make their weekly offertory contributions! Our weekly revenues have been at about 75% of our pre-pandemic Sunday offertory income. We have been relying on our parish savings to make up the difference. But that can't go on much longer. St. Gertrude Parish Auction 2021 will help us get closer to balancing the budget.

# **Growing in Faith**

# **Christmas Eve Mass Just Added**

This year, we will have a family Mass on Christmas Eve at 5:00 pm as well as a newly added 6:30 pm Mass in Church. On Christmas Day, we will have an 8:00 am Mass and a 10:30 am Mass. Please sign up to attend in person HERE.

Registration to attend the 5:00 pm Christmas Eve Family Mass in person filled quickly. If you are currently registered to attend the 5:00 pm Mass but would prefer to switch to the 6:30 pm Mass, you are welcome to do so. You can go to <a href="SignUpGenius">SignUpGenius</a> and make the change there, or call the Rectory at 773.764.3621 and our staff will make the change for you. Spots for the 5:00 pm Christmas Eve Mass may open up as people switch to the 6:30 pm Mass.

Here are some COVID protocols observed in church now:

- Enter the church via the Granville (handicap access) door.
- Everyone must wear a mask.
- Leave home early enough to allow for the check-in procedure.
- You must not exhibit any signs of COVID-19 related illness.
- Once you are admitted, your temperature will be taken and you will need to sanitize your hands.
- Your reservation will be checked and an usher or greeter will take you to a seat. (Those living in the same households can sit together.)
- Everyone in church is expected to maintain safe-distancing protocols by observing the markings on the floor and in the pews which give directions for spacing and traffic flow.

# Reading 1: 2 Sm 7:1-5, 8b-12, 14a, 16

When King David was settled in his palace, and the LORD had given him rest from his enemies on every side, he said to Nathan the prophet, "Here I am living in a house of cedar, while the ark of God dwells in a tent!"

"Go, do whatever you have in mind, for the LORD is with you."

Nathan answered the king,

But that night the LORD spoke to Nathan and said:

"Go, tell my servant David, 'Thus says the LORD:

Should you build me a house to dwell in?"

"It was I who took you from the pasture and from the care of the flock to be commander of my people Israel.

I have been with you wherever you went, and I have destroyed all your enemies before you.

And I will make you famous like the great ones of the earth.

I will fix a place for my people Israel;

I will plant them so that they may dwell in their place without further disturbance.

Neither shall the wicked continue to afflict them as they did of old, since the time I first appointed judges over my people Israel.

I will give you rest from all your enemies.

The LORD also reveals to you

that he will establish a house for you.

And when your time comes and you rest with your ancestors,


